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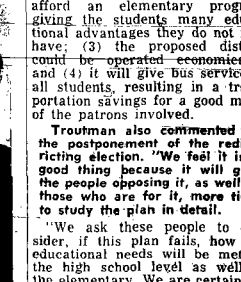
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37 Superior Ratings Awarded Local Students in District Fete

70-Year-Old Wayne Man is Descendant Of Famed Pioneer Scout Davey Crockett

Ralph Crockett, 70-year-old Wayne resident, is a descendant of the original Davey Crockett, famed Indian scout and trail blazer. The Crockett family originated in England and Wales. Four brothers settled in Maine when they first came to the U. S. Later one of the four moved to Georgia. It was from this line that Ralph's father, Preston Columbus Crockett, is descended. Ralph is 100 years younger than the original Davey. As a boy, Ralph often heard his father relate the Davey Crockett saga. When the original Crockett home in Maine burned several years ago, all important data and photographs were destroyed, with the exception of the family Bible. This Bible is in the possession of one of the women of the family or her descendants, but Ralph has never been able to track it down. Besides the Wayne man, there is only one other descendant of the famous Crockett alive. He lived in California. Neither has any children to carry on the family line.

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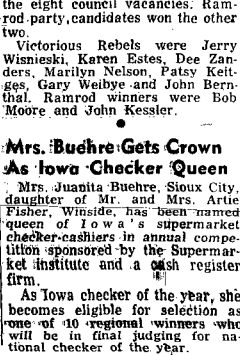

Western Area Proponents Ask Close Scrutiny of Plan

Four advantages of the proposed Western Area school reorganization plan were advanced this week by James Troutman, Winside, one of the strongest backers of the re-districting proposals. Troutman listed these four reasons why he considers the plan a good one: (1) It will assure the people of the area a medium-size high school located in a community made up of rural students and controlled by local people; (2) it will afford an elementary program giving students many educational advantages they do not now have; (3) the proposed district could be operated economically; and (4) it will give bus service to all students, resulting in a transportation savings for a good many of the patrons involved. Troutman also commented on the postponement of the re-districting election. "We feel it is a good thing because it will give the people opposing it, as well as those in favor, more time to study the plan in detail. "We ask these people to consider, if this plan fails, how our educational needs will be met on the high school level as well as the elementary. We are certain the more study they give to the plan, the more convinced they will be that it will give the people of the area the kind of education they want for their children and at no extra rate in taxes." The Winside spokesman cited reasons why the proposed district could be operated economically. He said the main one is the fact that the Western Area has a large valuation and will not be burdened with an oversupply of students. He said that in many school districts in Nebraska with an equal valuation include a city of around 3,000 people and double the students the Western Area plan would have to educate. Troutman commented on the transportation savings afforded to patrons if the Western Area is approved, he said those savings could pay a large share of the taxes. Winside Supt. Lawrence Retzlaff also offered several comments on the proposal. He said "We know there are those who oppose the plan because they have a strong desire to keep their rural schools. We certainly respect the thinking of these people because we feel they are sincere in their belief. "However," Retzlaff added, "a better school system for western Nebraska with fewer than 10 pupils per district in Nebraska would be the goal of every taxpayer in this proposed district. To have this better educational program, I feel the only answer is reorganization that will give the best facilities, program and organization each child needs and truly deserves." The Winside superintendent pointed out that Wayne county is one of the many in the state that have done little toward re-districting. He said there are nearly 1,800 schools in the state with one teacher instructing fewer than 10 pupils. Over 400, he said, have fewer than five students. About 4,100 schools have inadequate or obsolete facilities. See WESTERN AREA—page 2.

Over 3,300 elementary teachers are required to teach all grades from kindergarten through eighth, he emphasized. He said 50,000 children go through elementary school without the opportunity to associate with other children in their grade, study with a fully prepared teacher, participate in a music or art program, study science with science equipment or use a library.

"By reorganizing," Retzlaff said, "the school would have adequate classrooms equipped with tables and chairs, plenty of tack and chalk boards, work counter space, good lighting, acoustical treatment and adequate materials. In addition a complete academic program including organized physical education, guidance, music and art would be offered. There would be a well-equipped library, a hot lunch program and bus transportation. Each elementary grade would have between 25 and 30 students at Winside and about 10 at Hoskins."

Both Winside spokesmen urged Western Area residents to analyze carefully the operation of their present schools and consider what they are meeting the educational needs of their children. They also asked that the people consider the Western plan, its budget, valuation and superior educational program.

The legume depends on the soil for nutrients just as the oats crop does. If there is an inadequate supply of nutrients in the soil, the oats crop competes with the legume for these nutrients and may actually starve the small legume plant, the University specialist said.

Soil samples should be tested to find out whether or not phosphate and lime will be needed for the legume. Lime, where needed, should be applied just before seeding the legume and may be applied a year or two ahead of the legume seeding. For best results, phosphate fertilizer should be applied just before seeding and disked in or applied at seeding time with the crop attachment on the drill, he recommended.

Oats will respond very well to carry-over fertilizer from the past year, Hoover added. This means that by adequately fertilizing the crop the year in which it is usually corn or sorghum, the fertility level of the soil can be raised for oats.

Fertilizer use on corn or sorghum, according to soil tests and amount soil moisture, will not do the result in better, more profitable yields of these crops, but will improve the fertility level of the soil for oats the following year. In this way less fertilizer will be needed on the oats crop.

This can mean more profits from crop production in view of the fact that corn and sorghum are more profitable cash crops than oats at this time, he concluded.

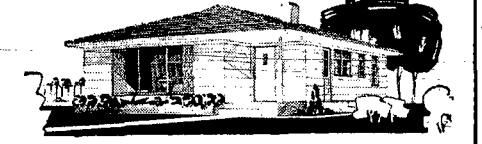

Do we only desire to do it as inexpensively as possible, hire the cheapest applicant, then hamper her with antiquated and insufficient books and supplies and have the teacher and pupils spend the day using facilities most of us would not tolerate for long in our own homes?

Or do we want to prepare the child to meet the complexities of present day living by making available not only rudiments of learning, not alone the information on how to make a living, but the broadest understanding of the culture and life of our fellowmen, an appreciation of music and other arts, competition within each grade which sharpens the ability to question and learn and the benefits of an educational system which functions as a unit for 12 grades with

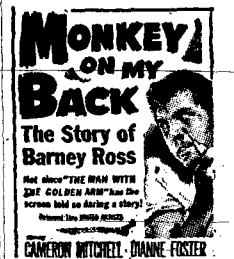

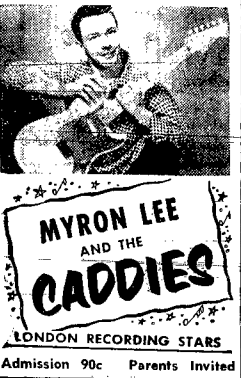

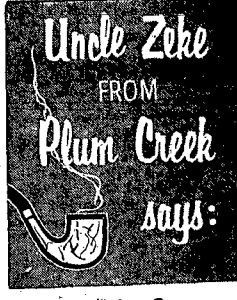

(Makes 4 1/2 dozen)
1/2 cup butter
1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
1 egg
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
2 cups sifted purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup dairy sour cream
1 1/4 cups salted whole cashew nuts

Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with sour cream mixing well. Carefully fold in cashew nuts. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto greased cookie sheet. Bake at 400 degrees for 10 minutes. Cool and frost with butter icing. Top each cookie with a cashew nut, if desired.

Golden Butter Icing
Lightly brown 1/2 cup butter; remove from heat. Add 3 tablespoons cream and 1/4 teaspoon vanilla. Stir liquid into 2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar until smooth and thick enough to spread.
