## County Extension Club Tea Scheduled at Wayne Friday

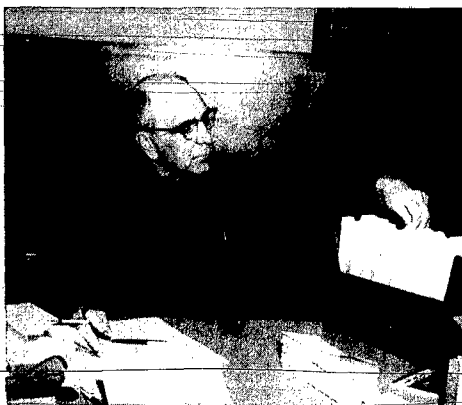

## City Clerk Says Reading 2,400 Meters Is Easiest Task

To the ordinary citizen, reading 2,400 water and electric meters seems like a tremendous job. But that isn't true of Walter S. Bressler, who is completing 37 years today as Wayne's city clerk. Bressler thinks the meter reading is the easiest part of his job. After 37 years in the post, he ought to know. He says the toughest of his duties is hearing and trying to solve the complaints of local citizens on a multitude of matters, mainly their electric light bills. The clerk says these complaints have been reduced considerably in recent years. The city clerk will be succeeded in his post after today by Howard Witt, who was appointed by Mayor Willard Wiltse at a city council meeting Tuesday night. Bressler is resigning and he and his wife plan to visit their son, Hazen, and family, Eugene, Ore., early in June. They will continue to make their home in Wayne. Wayne has undergone innumerable changes since Bressler took office for the first time May 1, 1922. Most recurrent of these were the changes in city administration. Bressler has served under six mayors for periods varying from three to 10 years. Bressler first served 10 years under W. M. Orr, who was succeeded in 1932 by Martin Ringer. After the latter completed 10 years, Herman Lundberg was mayor from 1942 to 1946. He was followed by L. W. McNatt, who gave way to



Glen Houdersheldt in 1950. The present mayor, Willard Wiltse succeeded Houdersheldt in 1956. The city clerk's post is now an appointive one with the mayor making the appointment with the approval of the city council. Prior to 1958, the job was elective. ## Alert Farmers to Redeem Corn and Soybean Supports

Farmers with corn, soybeans or both under 1958 price support loans should watch market prices closely in the next few weeks for opportunities to redeem their crops above the loan level, according to County ASC Chairman Carl Sundell. Prospects for redemption are particularly good, Sundell said, in the case of corn which is under non-compliance loans. Loans on soybeans mature May 31 and on corn July 31. To compare the loan value with the market price—the farmer needs to make allowance for various settlement factors such as interest, shrinkage, delivery charges and, in the case of corn, cost of shelling. If a farmer is in any doubt about how to figure these factors, questions can be addressed to his precinct ASC committeeman or the county office. Sundell points out that a farmer who redeems his price support loan when the local market will return him a profit is using the price support program as it was intended. The support rate, he said, puts a floor under prices to protect farmers from low harvesttime prices and enable them to hold for higher prices that usually exist later in the marketing year.

## Letters to The Editor

**Dear Sir:**  
Yes, my wife and I were among the group of people who made the ill-fated trip to Henderson to gaze at the beautiful school. To our utter amazement we discovered the sides of the building simply bulging with knowledge, good management and all of the educational facilities necessary to offer a good education.

First of all, I want to state that their average school mill levy was not 13.12 before they built, but 18. Also, they have 22 teachers, not 21, and they have 500 students in the school. They were so pleased with their ability to give all the students in the 4-area district equal education that they voted 3 to 1 for an additional bond levy of \$167,000 to build on in order to accommodate their growing enrollment. I was also told that two doctors came to town because of the good educational facilities.

We were greeted on our arrival at Henderson by the superintendent, who in my way of thinking, was a prince. He answered any question asked of him.

I went to Henderson with an open mind to find out what I was getting into in the way of reorganization. I asked him every question I could think of, pro and con, and they were all answered intelligently. I asked the man if he felt they could give as good an education as a Class A school. He answered that he definitely felt they could. Their top student last year is a medical student at Nebraska Wesleyan university and is also a top student there.

I asked him about opposition. He answered that he would give me the names of all opponents, but for every one he could give me 20 names for it.

I showed the superintendent the budget proposed for the Western Area and he stated the only thing too low was \$5,000 additional teachers' salaries.

I'm sick and tired of listening to this dictatorship that is going around in Hoskins. Let the people vote the way they want to. This ballyhoo reminds me of when I lay in the foxholes in Germany and leaflets dropped on our lines: "Is your sweetheart going with another man? Is your wife sleeping with another man?" I thought I was fighting to preserve democracy and to do away with dictatorship.

They said it couldn't be done! Remember when Wright invented the airplane. Fulton the steamer and Whitney the cotton gin? Now they are shooting for the moon. Give this bus situation a little thought. I know of a young lady from Winside who was asked to go on the trip. She is definitely against the plan and wouldn't even take the trip for fear she might like it. This kind of people are willing to spend thousands of dollars for machinery with no thought of their children's education.

Also, among the members of the "Committee for the Preservation of Rural School Independence" is a man who is definitely against the small school. He is the one responsible for stirring up the hornet's nest in Hoskins. How can anyone so set against the small school have enough gall to sign the paper for the "preservation of small schools." I believe they should clean up their own backyard first before they give any advice to anyone else.

I forgot to mention we also ate a meal in Henderson which consisted of "Mexi-burgers," baked potatoes, peas, milk and ice cream. This hot lunch program, incidentally, is independent from the school and hasn't cost the school one dime. They charge 20 cents a day or a dollar a week. You can't pack a cold lunch for that.

**Dear Editor:**  
During the last two or three weeks you have been printing letters in regard to our school reorganizing problems in the Western Area of Wayne county, so here is mine.

Friday Winside high school held Eighth Graders Day. The eighth grade pupils were picked up at Hoskins by the Winside school bus. Upon arrival at high school they received a warm welcome from the teachers as prospective students for the 1959-60 school term.

There were 20 in attendance. They were told there are 22 eighth grade pupils in the proposed Western Area who will be freshmen next fall. There are three in the Hoskins parochial-school who will be attending church schools or moving, so that cuts the number down to 20. In all probability there are some others in the large area who will be doing the same. From these figures you can see the actual number of freshmen will be around 26 or 27. Multiply this by the four grades in high school and it will be 108. Aside from this we know all freshmen do not finish high school, some drop out for one reason or another. In this area where you need only to look around your neighborhood and see the empty farmsteads, you can see for a certainty the number of students will not increase.

Even by adding the seventh and eighth grades it will not be a good and economical school. There will not be a large enough number of students in all classes to give good competition, especially in the subjects taught which are not needed to graduate. We are asked to build a half million dollar high school building for this small number of students and vote bonds that will take us and our children 20 years to pay. We now have available high schools in our area which offer our children an education such as they cannot receive from a small high school and I am sure a competent education will back up this statement.

In a letter sent out by the supporters of the reorganizing group they make the statement, and I quote, "The bus service will amount to 10 times over any small increase in taxes." We have repeatedly asked, "How long will our child have to be on the bus to and from school? How many miles will they have to travel a day?"

When the bus gets stuck on our country roads will the children be counted tardy or asked to make up the classes they have missed thru no fault of their own? What happens to the little tots while they must wait for the high school students who are sometimes held up by athletic activities, etc.?"

The best answers we have received up to date are, "We'll have to work out those problems later." Not now, before we vote, but after we vote when there is nothing we can do about it.

It would be very educational for those parents who think it would be a perfect arrangement for their children to ride a school bus if they could make the trip as an invisible person. What about the teenagers on the bus who do not smoke, simply because they don't care to. Must they inhale stale cigarette smoke morning and night on that long bus ride or do what one boy said Friday when he got off the bus at Hoskins. "The only way one could stand that is to join them." Should our teenage boys and girls start smoking for such a reason? I know our teenagers must grow up, but what about the little folks who will have to ride on the bus with the high school students? It will surely not do anything good to their formative years to inhale cigarette smoke, listen to suggestive stories and songs morning and night.

I'm sure a good brisk walk to school or a few minutes in the family car will do more for their health and the money spent for transportation will be health and happiness insurance.

Governor's Stroke Fails to Interrupt Affairs of Office

Lincoln — Almost immediately after his stroke, Gov. Ralph G. Brock had begun light duties connected with his office.

As early as Apr. 20, the governor had signed some bills. He apparently suffered his light stroke Friday night, after returning from a week-long air age conference in Las Vegas, Nev.

Robert Conrad, administrative assistant to Brock, emphasized that the governor was making decisions on his own and had none of his faculties impaired. However, the Democratic chief executive has a weakness in the right arm and leg, Conrad said, but no paralysis.

News men, visiting the governor, detected the weakness of the arm, although the shock hands were there. There also was some weakness in the left side of his face which caused some difficulty in speech, although this was slight.
