Capitol News

Senators Whittling Steadily On Bills Pile; End Hearings

Lincoln—The Nebraska Legislature has begun to whittle steadily at a huge pile of bills up for initial debate. This has been made possible by conclusion of committee hearings, which since January have occupied time of lawmakers every afternoon, Monday through Friday.

Afternoon floor debate is becoming more frequent, with sessions from 2 a. m. to noon and 2 to 4 p. m. This has caused optimism among some observers that the session may wind up earlier than the last week in June as has been the forecast.

As a result of the all-day sessions, those interested in progress of legislation can't keep a score card accurately because bills often believed not in position for debate for some time are picked for argument and acted upon rapidly.

The Legislature's budget committee has completed its public hearings and has started the tremendous job of fashioning a budget for presentation on the floor. With the added work load of floor debate all day, tempers of senators become correspondingly thin. This situation in past sessions has produced some of the more readable copy from the Legislature. Advent of warm weather will hasten work and also wear on tempers of lawmakers, who have been battling with words since Jan. 6.

Brooks Illness

The illness of Gov. Ralph G. Brooks caused the armchair politicians to take another look at possible Democrat candidates for 1960 elections.

The physician of the governor, who suffered a slight stroke April 17, said he is "completely satisfied" with progress the governor is making on the road to recovery. Barring anything unexpected, he said he saw no permanent disability for the governor, who has a weakness in his right arm and

leg and on the left side of his face.

Some insiders say if the governor chooses not to seek another political office, Rep. Donald McGinley, Ogallala, might be a good bet to run for the U. S. Senate and Brooks' administrative assistant, Robert Conrad, for governor.

On the Republican side, sources say that State Sen. Terry Carpenter continues to gain strength in Nebraska and will be in a good position if he runs for governor. Some sources say Carpenter in recent weeks has become more acceptable to conservative elements of the GOP. Best information appears to be that the tax reform program which Carpenter has guided through the Legislature has been one thing which has boosted his popularity.

People from inside both parties will agree on one thing: The 1960 political campaign will be a hot one.

Air Conditioning

A problem of major concern during hot summer months to the 1,800 workers in the statehouse is air-conditioning. Since the use of air-conditioning became general, workers in the Capitol have hoped for some method of cooling the building after a baking in the summer sun.

Sen. Carpenter tacked an amendment in the Legislature to a bill which would allow funds to be used for cooling the building. Carpenter's amendment provides that 20 percent of the money earmarked for repair and improvement of the statehouse from an institutional

building levy should go for air-conditioning, in addition to 20 percent of the \$400,000 now in the fund. The senator had some difficulty pushing the amendment through. It carried by a 21-14 vote.

Health Board Member

The first member of the State Health board to live outside Lincoln has been appointed by Gov. Ralph G. Brooks. Appointed by the chief executive was Mrs. Laura Berge, Lisco, wife of the late Wendell Berge, who served as an assistant U. S. attorney in charge of the Federal anti-trust division.

The board was created in 1953 but a constitutional amendment, eliminated at the polls last November, required that all members of the board reside in Lincoln. The governor said he was pleased with Mrs. Berge's qualifications.

Obituary Air Chief

A Lincoln man, Jack Obitk, 39, has accepted the position of state aeronautics director. Obitk was offered the post by Gov. Ralph G. Brooks to replace Roland Harr, who resigned after blasting the governor for not making a decision on who should be director.

Obitk said he is going to put "past controversies on the shelf" and look toward producing the best aeronautics department possible. He told the Aeronautics commission he has been a pilot for 18 years and that he is extremely interested in aviation and will give the commission his full cooperation.

County Agent's Column

Good Quality, Early-Cut Alfalfa Three Times Better Feed for Dairy Cow Herds

A county agent is constantly exposed to much information which has value only if passed on to those who might make use of it. Here are a number of items gleaned from a meeting attended at the animal pathology department of the college of agriculture on disease-free swine.

"Disease-free" pigs are taken from the sow by surgical means and reared in isolation from other swine. They are free from major diseases because they did not have contact following birth with their mothers or other swine that might have been carriers of atrophic rhinitis, virus pneumonia and bloody scours. Pathologists working at the college estimate that about half of all hogs are infected with one or more of these diseases.

For more information on how these disease-free pigs are being placed on farms, ask for EC 1903 available at all Nebraska county extension offices.

Antibiotics are a poor substitute for good sanitation practices. At the North Platte station the incidence of virus pneumonia and rhinitis was cut from 65 percent to 10 percent when litters were farrowed and kept isolated on clean ground.

Numerous abscesses are found at slaughter as a result of injecting iron solution in the ham area. Placing of clean sod in the pen or squirting a few drops of iron solution in the pig's mouth (a penny's worth will do) has been as effective as any other treatment.

New-born pigs, when placed in a clean brooder box, will learn to drink milk on their own. The formula used at the university is one beaten egg added to one quart of pasteurized cow's milk plus a few drops of iron-solution. Start pigs on 1/4 pint per feeding at 8 hour intervals. More pigs are lost from chilling than any other cause. Starting temperature should be near 95 degrees. This temperature is gradually decreased to 85 degrees at four weeks of age, when pigs are transferred to farm pens.

Alfalfa Hay Good quality early-cut alfalfa hay has three times the feeding value of average hay for dairy cows. The average daily intake of the better kind for a 1,200-pound cow would be 35 pounds daily. Of this, 17 pounds will be required for maintenance, leaving 18 pounds for production. This amount will produce enough energy for 32 pounds of milk and, in addition, will have enough protein and calcium for 80 and 220 pounds of milk, respectively.

On the other hand, if given hay of average quality the same cow would eat but 25 pounds daily. Because this inferior hay has lower digestibility, 19 pounds would be required for maintenance, leaving only six pounds available for milk production. This hay would only have enough energy to produce the 22 pounds of milk. To be equivalent to the good quality hay about nine pounds of grain would be required.

Most important single factor in obtaining maximum corn yields with minimum tillage is plant population. A good seedbed in the row and planting one-half inch

to one inch deeper than normal will help to obtain this population. The need for deeper planting is due to rapid drying of the upper inch or two in the soil. Germination was not seriously retarded in tests where corn was planted to a depth of 2 1/2 inches or more.

While corn under minimum tillage conditions occasionally grows

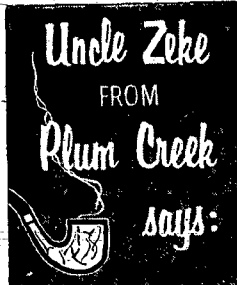
In Bookland

Farm News and Views . . . Ag Service Advises Selling Corn Rather Than Market Through \$15 Feeder Pigs

SELL CORN rather than market it through feeder pigs costing \$15 or more — an agricultural service advises its clients. You will get just about enough for your hogs to pay for your pigs and feed. Prices of feeder pigs vary but \$15 for a 35 to 40-pound pig is typical. Pigs bought at that weight will sell in the fall for about \$15.75 a hundred pounds.

HOLD MILK PRODUCTION up through the summer by following these tips. Continue to feed hay and grain to cows after they go on pasture. New grass won't

provide all needed nutrients. Consider seeding Sudan grass this month for temporary pasture in late summer when regular pasture gives out. Use strip grazing or a pasture rotation plan for best utilization of pasture. Start now to control flies by cleaning up fly breeding areas and by spraying the buildings and lots regularly with an insecticide approved by the FDA for dairy use. MARKET 500 HOGS a year. That's the minimum number farm economists say must be fed out in order to pay for a complete confinement hog raising setup. Success with a confinement system depends on close attention to details such as sanitation, feed formulation and timely breeding of sows. Otherwise you'll run into trouble when a larger number of animals are kept in a small area. Gains are just as good as on pasture and land will return \$30 to \$35 more per acre in crops than it is worth as pasture.

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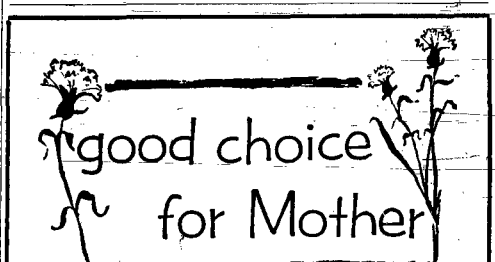
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
