City Council Extends Fire Limits at Tuesday Meeting

Extension of the fire limits and a possible raise in water rates provided the main business at a meeting of the Wayne city council Tuesday night.

The councilmen adopted an ordinance extending the fire limits to include property one half block west from Main street between Ninth and Eleventh streets and 125 feet south from Tenth between Main and Nebraska.

The action was taken after the council determined that the areas involved are mainly commercial in use.

An increase in water rates is being contemplated for the August billing. The major change would be to raise the present minimum of \$1 per quarter to \$1 per month.

Under the schedule, cost of 100,000 gallons would rise from \$14.50 to \$18 per quarter, an increase of 24.13 percent.

Mayor Willard Wiltse was authorized to sign a contract for gas service at the light plant.

The park committee reported plans are underway for improvements at the baseball park.

Two requests by Max Hendrickson were taken under advisement for further study.

He also asked the council to have ambulances conform to traffic laws while operating in the city limits.

They are Lyle Sheppard, Alvin McElhose, Ned Williams, Harlan Gillespie and Darold Kraemer.

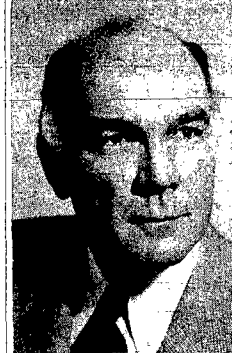

Earliest Date For Election Is June 15

Further action on the Western Area school redistricting plan is now up to the Wayne County Reorganization committee, Chairman Gordon Nuernberger announced today.

The proposal, which includes 28 districts in the western portion of the county, was returned to the county committee today by the State Reorganization committee.

The State committee reviewed the Western Area plan for a second time Tuesday in Lincoln. The state group had given qualified approval to the proposal earlier but ruled that it had to be considered a new proposal when a resolution was added.

In returning the plan a second time, the State committee did not go on record as approving or disapproving it.

Nuernberger said a meeting of the county committee is tentative scheduled May 25 to consider the state recommendations.

State law says the County committee must call an election on the plan no less than 30 nor more than 60 days after the plan is returned by the State committee.

When the election is held, there will be two voting units, Winside, as a Class II district, will comprise one unit. The 24 rural districts, which include Hoskins, will make up the other.

Wolfe explained the general tone of the state recommendations in a telephone conversation with a Herald reporter Wednesday morning.

1. The County committee should recommend to the Western Area school board, if the plan is approved in an election, that consideration be given to students who have started education in another high school system.

2. The County committee should seek more cooperation from persons in the area who favor reorganization but are opposed to the Western Area plan.

3. The County committee should seek assistance from committees in surrounding counties to make sure that the Western Area proposal is the best possible plan.

Six persons appeared before the State committee Tuesday to oppose the plan. They were State Senator David Tews, Norfolk, Ralph Olson, Enos Williams, Er-

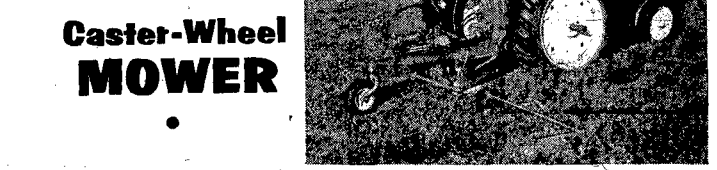

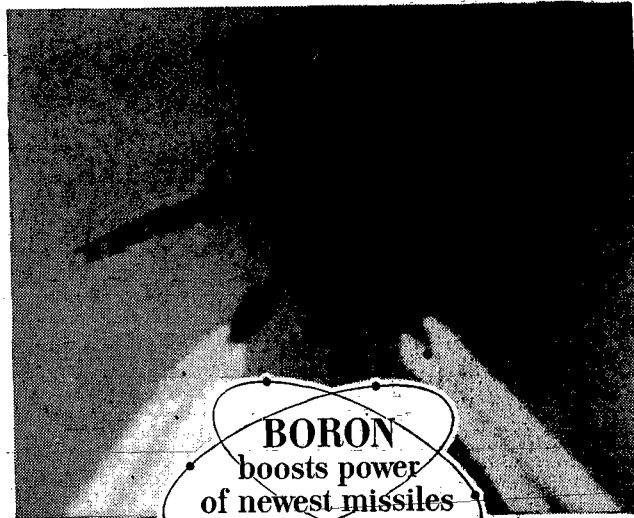

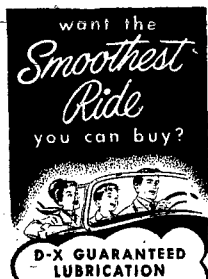

# Capitol News Legislature Committee Plans Hearing Monday on Bingo Bill

Lincoln—The Legislature is going to make another try at passing a bingo bill this time it is the one proposed by Gov. Ralph G. Brooks as a substitute to the measure he vetoed on grounds it lacked proper enforcement.

The new bill is slated for public hearing Monday before the Agriculture Department committee. A similar bill was introduced in the other proposal, LB 86, Brooks vetoed LB 86 and the Legislature sustained the veto. There was little or no fussing on the floor over the original bingo bill. This time only on a move to override the governor's veto.

Passing of bingo was authorized last November by voters who approved a constitutional amendment.

The new bill submitted to the Legislature by the governor is LB 87. It proposes the State Agriculture Department as the enforcing agency. Brooks, as the bill is drafted after conferences with interested persons, would prohibit playing of the game of Sunday and require games to start no earlier than 10 a. m. and last no longer than midnight. The proposal calls for a mandatory tax of 10 percent of the gross receipts, with half to the city or county involved and the remainder to the state.

Numbers of bingo licenses could hold no more than 10 daily sessions per month, with the limit on amount of prizes per session at \$50. The operator could have no more than \$1,500 per session in cash receipts.

Only persons 21 years old or more could play the game. Winners could take cash instead of prizes. Licenses could only go to groups in existence five years or more who are non-profit in nature and so recognized by the Federal government.

Churches, the state fair and county fairs also could be licensed under the bill.

### Secondary Boycotts

The bill to outlaw secondary boycotts in Nebraska is causing as much or more controversy after it became law as during its stormy life in the Legislature. The measure began when Gov. Ralph G. Brooks let the bill, LB 500, become law without his signature.

He then issued a statement blasting the State Sen. Ray Simmons, Friedman, principal backer of the bill, and said the measure is "opposed against labor and tries to substitute something already taken care of by Federal laws. Simmons

### County Agent's Column . . . Weed Elimination One of Most Important Steps Toward Increasing Pasture Returns

Each year weeds rob many Nebraska farmers of 1/4 to 1/2 of the desirable forage some pastures are capable of producing. This makes weed elimination one of the most important steps a farmer can take toward increasing returns from an unproductive pasture, a University of Nebraska College of Agriculture publication points out.

The bulletin, "Pasture Weed Control," which can be obtained at the county extension office, notes that weeds can be controlled by using chemical weed killers, mowing, reseeding and proper management.

Experimental results show 75 to 90 percent control of most troublesome broadleaf weeds from early June application of one pound of 2, 4-D. One of the principal advantages of chemical control lies in the fact that one to two years of chemical treatment will eliminate many broadleaf weeds. It may be necessary to treat for three or four consecutive years to eliminate 75 to 90 percent of the hard-to-kill perennial broadleaf weeds, the circular adds.

Troublesome pasture weeds and recommended chemical control are described in detail in the circular, which was produced as a part of the College's continuing campaign toward more productive pastures in the state.

Based on eight years of experiments by the Agricultural Research Service and the University of Nebraska agricultural experiment station, it is revealed that mowing does not result in satisfactory control of any species of perennial pasture weeds. Mowing caused a decrease of total forage production from the pasture. However, some annual weeds were

### Farm News and Views . . . Farm Economists Expect Net Farm Income To Decrease Five to 10% from '58 Record

FIRST QUARTER farm income kept pace with the first three months of 1958, but USDA economists are afraid it can't be maintained. Last year net income increased to the highest level in five years.

Economists say higher costs plus elimination of the acreage reserve program and a smaller wheat crop will probably cut net income five to 10 percent below last year's \$13.1 billion. Total income from marketings of farm products should equal or perhaps exceed last year's \$38.0 billion.

HOT WEATHER came faster than usual this season, especially in the northern part of the Corn Belt. Livestock gains will drop unless shade is provided so cattle and hogs out on pasture get some protection.



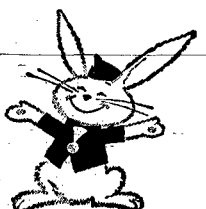
