Gas Company To Make June Rate Increase of 12 Percent

Added Costs, block.

Gas rate increases varying from 5.8 to 15.3 percent will go into effect for Wayne retail consumers with the June billing, Peoples Natural Gas Manager Warren Ruskell announced Tuesday.

Ruskell presented information on the increase to city council members at their meeting Tuesday night. Ruskell said the increase will average about 12 percent for most local users.

The gas company manager pointed out that there has been no increase in Wayne gas rates during the past five years. He also cited the 200 percent increase in field cost of gas in the past five years. He said that although the cost of almost every item has more than doubled since World War II, the average-bome-owner here pays only one-fourth more for this gas than he did 10 to 12 years ago.
