# Baccalaureate Exercises Planned Sunday for Three of City Schools

## State Committee Deplores 'Do Nothing' Attitude of Some Western Area People

Four recommendations on the Western Area school plan were developed by the State School Reorganization committee following its second hearing on the proposal last Tuesday at Lincoln. These recommendations were included in a letter to the Wayne County Reorganization committee. Because the redistricting project has attracted such universal interest, the recommendations are reprinted below.

1. Your committee should support the plan that the new board of education, which would be appointed if the proposal were adopted, consider the wishes of parents for the continuity of education of present secondary children attending high schools other than Winside. No provision has been made to provide this assurance.

2. The State Committee deplores the statements and attitude of some of the people in the proposed district whereby they declare themselves favorable to redistricting but apparently do nothing, and actually obstruct any sound, comprehensive, well-balanced redistricting program. It is difficult for the Committee to understand why some people who appear to be that favorable to reorganization have not come up with a plan to help the county committee.

The committee recommends that all the citizens in Wayne county and in territory adjacent to Wayne county get together to work out their reorganization problems. The people cannot expect the county committee to function properly unless they cooperate with the county committee and give them the benefit of their knowledge.

3. In addition to the assistance of people in the proposed area who state they favor redistricting, but oppose this plan, the county committee should seek the assistance of the county committees in adjacent counties.

4. The committee felt that people motivated by the desire to continue one room elementary school were adversely affecting secondary plans. They strongly urged that there should be provided one teacher per grade in all elementary schools.

Your committee should, after considering the recommendations of the State Committee, proceed with the action necessary to bring this plan to election as provided in the statutes.

## Expect Committee to Set Election on Western Plan

Date for the election on the Western Area school reorganization plan for Wayne county will probably be chosen at a meeting of the County Reorganization committee Monday night at the courthouse.

Recommendations were received Friday from the State Reorganization committee on the proposal. The state group reviewed the plan at a meeting in Lincoln last Tuesday.

Text of these recommendations will be found elsewhere in this issue of The Herald.

Earliest possible date for the election is June 15. It must be held before July 14.

When the election is held, there will be two voting units: "Townships and the 24 rural districts" which comprise one unit; Winside, as a Class II school, will make up the other. The proposal must get approval of a majority of the voters in each of the units in order to go into effect.

## M. McGee's Graduation Good News for Distance Runners Opposing Wildcats

There's good news for college distance runners who will compete against WSTC in the future. That's the fact that Merle McGee is a senior this year. For four years the diminutive McGee, a Quimby, Ia. native, has dominated the mile, two-mile and cross-country races in Nebraska. He has won 50 of his 57 track races and set records in at least 18 of them.

In races he lost, he finished second five times, third once, fifth second and seventh once. One of his fifths was at the 1958 Drake relays, where he was timed in 9:25.5 in the two-mile, his best official time. The seventh was at the 1958 national NAIA meet, where he did the two-mile in 9:24 by his coach's watch.

McGee's cross-country record shows 14 firsts in 15 races. His lone loss came last November in the National NAIA meet at Omaha when, cold, wind, mud and snow proved too much for his small stature. He weighs only 140 and stands 5-6. He finished thirty-fourth in the national meet, but a week earlier on the same rough four-mile course he set a 21:24 record in the district NAIA-midwest AAU meet.

Nearing the end of this excellent college career, McGee ironically has lost his two most recent mile races. Finishing a close second in both, he beat his previous best time (4:23.5) in both races and the winners did 4:18.1 in the battles. In both these meets McGee came back later to win the two-mile, probably his best event, setting a meet record of 9:43.9 in the state college run at Kearney Friday.

Coach Don Emery rates McGee as one of the best competitors and hardest workers he ever coached. "He has done better than a coach could have hoped considering his size," says the coach. This week McGee will defend his Nebraska College conference mile record of 4:25.4 and will also defend his two-mile title. The mile should be one of the meet's top events with McGee attempting to even the score with Kearney's Larry Snell, who defeated him Friday.

The good news for competitors that McGee is graduating is somewhat dimmed by the fact Wayne has a replacement. Don Weitzenkamp, a husky Lyons sophomore, is already running the mile under 4:23, but still a few steps behind McGee.

## Wayne High Eighth in State 'B' Track Meet

Wayne High finished eighth in the state Class B track meet at Lincoln Friday and Saturday. The Blue Devils scored eight points on Roger Denesia's tie for first in the high jump and Bill Witt's third in the 440-yard dash.

Witt established a new school record in the 440 with a time of 51.2. This erased the previous mark of 52.4 held by Jerry Hendrickson. The race was won in 50.3, a new Class B record. Denesia got off his best leap of his career to share the high jump crown at 5-10.

### Capitol News

# Bovey-Governor Battle Again Puts State Pen in Spotlight

Lincoln—Attention has again been focused on the state penitentiary after a four-year death of controversy at the institution. The ruckus began when Gov. Ralph G. Bovey demanded the resignation of Warden Joseph Bovey from the post he has held since April, 1955. The job pays \$550 per month, plus food and shelter.

Brooks alleged mismanagement of the institution, but the Board of Control said it investigated statements of the governor and its findings "indicate that the governor's statement is insufficient to warrant the discharge of the warden. Bovey resigned after a week of controversy and charges by the governor's office. The warden said the governor, who is chairman of the state Board of Pardons, and the warden must work in "close relationship." In view of that and the present "situation," Bovey said, he insisted the board accept his resignation.

The board unanimously agreed that the charges of the governor were insufficient to warrant dismissal of the warden. Vice Chairman Charles Leeman said, Deputy Warden John Greenholz was immediately named acting warden and Bovey was given permission to remain in the warden's residence until July 1.

After a long meeting attended by the board, Robert Conrad, administrative assistant to Gov. Bovey, who is recuperating from a light stroke, and Bovey, three terse statements were handed out. One was Bovey's, another the board's and the third was under the name of the governor.

The governor's statement said: "I have conferred with the Board of Control relative to my statement about the penitentiary. I recognize their administrative authority in such matters and I am confident that they have been prompt and fair."

### Billboard Ban

A bill to ban billboards on the right-of-way of the Interstate highway was killed by a legislative committee. The measure, LB 714 which has the support of Gov. Ralph G. Bovey, hit the dust after a public hearing by the Legislature's banking, commerce and insurance committee.

Sen. Joe T. Vosoba, Wilber, introduced the legislation at the request of the governor. Another sponsor was Sen. Harold Stryker, Rising City. Vosoba said the bill was designed to take advantage of a bonus offered by the Federal government which would have been in the vicinity of \$1 million.

Outdoor advertising signs, and Max Towle, a Lincoln attorney representing outdoor advertising interests, opposed the bill. Towle said about 20 states had already rejected similar legislation. One of the main proponents was former Gov. Robert Crosby, who said he would like to see "just one highway in Nebraska not cluttered up with billboards so the public can look at the rolling landscape."

### Brooks Conference

Gov. Ralph G. Brooks held his second news conference since suffering a light stroke Apr. 17. He appeared fit and had gained about 5 pounds, he said. The governor showed no evidence of a paralysis of the left side of his face, and moved his right arm awkwardly by the stroke. However, it is known the governor has difficulty walking a distance because of a weakened right leg. His left foot has been braced since early in his campaign. The right leg was weakened by the stroke. But the governor says he goes up and down stairs.

### Water Pollution

A tentative plan has been okayed by the State Water Pollution Control council. The plan is designed to encourage large upstream towns to take the lead in a seven-year program of stream pollution abatement. T. A. Filipi, state sanitation engineer, said planning is going ahead on the assumption that Nebraska will get \$668,000 in Federal aid for the 1959 fiscal year. In seven years, he added, Nebraska

ka's pollution problem could be pretty well under control. The Federal government foots 30 percent of control projects and communities the remaining 70 percent. Filipi said applications for 1960 funds can be received no later than July 15 of this year.

### Politics

The Republican party is looking for a new state chairman to replace Richard E. Spelts, Jr., Grand Island, who says he plans to resign as soon as a successor can be found. The Democrats, meanwhile,

### County Agent's Column . . . Nationwide Farm Census Set in October; Beef Cattle Improvement Meet Scheduled

What's been happening on the farm in the past five years. The Bureau of the Census will start getting the answer to this question in October through the seventeenth nationwide farm census.

The big count of crops, acres, equipment and the like will start right after harvest this fall. Every one of the nation's 4,600,000 farms and ranches will be visited by one of the 30,000 census takers now being lined up for this job. Each numerator will be local resident and will be required to take a qualifying test for the job. He will also get 12 hours of special training and swear to keep all census information confidential.

The act of Congress providing for the census prohibits making census information of an individual farmer or farm available to any tax or investigating agency.

Since many facts and figures will be needed for accurate reporting farmers are urged to start assembling records now. Three kinds of information will be needed for an accurate picture of the current farm situation and changes which have been taking place. The facts to be recorded will include a count of farm resources—crop acres, livestock numbers,

etc. and the kind and amount of products harvested and sold. The third type of information will relate to such selected activities as days worked off the farm, amount of fertilizer and lime used and the cost of farm labor, custom work, feed, gasoline, oil, etc.

About two weeks before the farm census gets underway in an area, the postoffice will distribute the questionnaire to each boxholder on rural routes and in rural post offices. Farmers will be asked to fill out the forms and give them to the local census taker when he calls. A two-day conference on "beef cattle improvement" will be held June 1-2 at Ft. Robinson Beef Research station. A variety of speakers will discuss goals in improving beef cattle, the role of genetics in attaining these goals and the measurement of economically important traits. Those attending also will get a chance to see breeding cattle at the station, which is operated cooperatively by the University of Nebraska and the USDA. ### Farm News and Views . . . Early Cut Oats Silage About Equal to Corn Silage in Feed Value; Hold Wool

**OATS FOR SILAGE** should be cut early in order to make high quality forage. For highest feed value, cut in the bloom or early-heading stage and add 200 pounds of ground ear or shelled corn per ton. Oat silage when made in this manner is about equal, in value to corn silage.

**HAY AND GRAIN DRYING** equipment increases fire hazards on your farm. If you have installed such equipment be sure to clear it through your insurance company. Operation of such equipment without approval from your insuring company could invalidate your policy or cause you to receive less than full payment in case of fire.

**HOLD WOOL** for price gains later this year, advise agricultural editors. Several factors are expected to bring about price improvements: 1) improved business will favor


