## Field Day Planned Friday At Area Experiment Station

Arrangements are now complete for the spring field day at the NE Nebraska Experiment Station Friday, Sept. Dale Flowerday reported this week.

The event will start at 1:30 p.m. at the farm 1 1/2 miles east of Concord. Four stops will be featured. The discussion topics will include: 1) Alfalfa hay vs. alfalfa pellets for wintering heifers; 2) concrete tilt-up construction; 3) minimum tillage demonstrations; and 4) hay conditioner demonstration.

E. A. Olson, extension engineer, will discuss tilt-up concrete construction including steps in construction, cost comparisons and other uses of concrete construction. Dr. Paul Guyer will explain the recently completed wintering trials comparing the relative feed efficiency of loose alfalfa and pelleted alfalfa hay.

## Hodtwalker Under Doctor's Orders To Stay Off Job

State Trooper LeRoy Hodtwalker, whose six-day suspension and transfer in January touched off a storm of controversy, is still under doctor's orders to stay off duty. Safety Patrol Chief Col. C. J. Hodtwalker was suspended after ticketing the car of a patrol captain and sergeant for improper license plates.

Proett will give the invocation and Rev. S. K. de Freese the benediction. A senior trio will sing "Bless This House." The school orchestra will play the processional and recessional.

## Garage, Two Cars Burned in Blaze

A garage, two cars and workshop tools were destroyed by fire of unknown origin about 3 p.m. last Tuesday at the Lloyd Powers farm northwest of Wayne.

Damage was estimated at over \$5,000. The blaze was well under way before it was reported to Wayne firemen. Powers was working in a field and turned in the alarm when he saw smoke. The cars, a station wagon and sedan, were pulled from the garage by the firemen, but could not be salvaged.

About 140 persons and 60 planes were in Wayne Sunday for the annual flight breakfast sponsored by the Wayne Junior Chamber of Commerce.

First arrival was a Gréna flier, who landed at the local airport at 5:30 a.m. Breakfast for the out-of-town guests was served at Nyia's cafe.

Firing of small rockets was demonstrated by Robert and Orville Carlisle, Norfolk, during the morning program. Helicopters from the Sioux City AFB were also on display. High winds forced curtailment of plane flights for most of the day and also cancelled a demonstration of radio-controlled model planes. Keith Jech was Jaycee chairman for the event.

## County Bond Sales Top Half of Annual Quota

Wayne county savings bond sales tallied over half the annual quota in the first four months of 1959, Chairman Henry E. Ley announced this week. April sales were about \$71,000, bringing the year's total to \$331,000. This represents 57 percent of the quota. Percentages for other NE Nebraska counties were: Pierce, 47.4; Cuming, 61.8; Stanton, 52.4; Madison, 45.8; Dakota, 45.1; Dixon, 42.0; Cedar, 40.6; and Thurston, 36.6.

## Two New Teachers Named at College

Two faculty appointments at WSTC were announced today by President W. A. Brandenburg. James Day will join the faculty in September as a music instructor, teaching piano. Merlin Kleinbach will join the faculty at the same time as assistant industrial arts professor.

Day holds a bachelor of music degree from the Kansas City conservatory of music and a master of music degree from the University of Kansas. He studied one year at the Juilliard school of music, New York, and has appeared several times as soloist with the Kansas City philharmonic orchestra. Kleinbach has a bachelor's degree from Western college and a master's degree from Colorado State college, Greeley. He is a candidate for a doctor of education degree at the University of Missouri in June.

## June 1 Final Date For Price Support On 1958-Crop Corn

June 1 is the last day to obtain price support on 1958-crop corn, ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell said this week. The official closing date is May 31, but since that falls on a Sunday the deadline is automatically extended until the next business day. Corn price support may be obtained by means of a non-recourse loan on either farm-stored or warehouse-stored corn or through a purchase agreement with the government.

All 1958-crop corn is eligible for support provided it is of acceptable quality. In Wayne county the support rate is \$1.29 per bushel for corn produced in compliance with the 1958 acreage allotment or 99 cents per bushel for corn not produced in compliance with allotments.

To be eligible for price support, ear or shelled corn must grade No. 3 or better except that corn grading No. 4 because of test weight only will be eligible. The corn must meet certain moisture requirements and must be in adequate storage, either on the farm or in a warehouse or elevator.

Corn loans and purchase agreements being entered into now will mature July 31. Between now and that date, the corn may be redeemed at any time. At maturity, the grain may be resold for a profit, kept in storage for an additional period.

## Fair Board Seeks Pioneer Families

The Wayne County Fair board is seeking the identity of local pioneer farm families. President Leland Herman said today. The who qualify will receive the Nebraska Pioneer Farm award during the Wayne county fair.

The special award, now in its fourth year, was designed to pay tribute to pioneer Nebraska farm families who have owned the same land for 100 years or more. The program is a joint venture between Ak-Sar-Ben and the Nebraska Association of Fair Managers. Walnut and bronze plaques and framed certificates will be presented to each family that qualifies.

Eligible families are urged to contact Al Bahe, county fair secretary, who will submit the nominations from this county to the state committee. Deadlines for receiving nominations is July 1. In the event there is no 100-year award, Herman added, the county fair is looking for the family that has owned the same farm for the greatest number of years, and for the individual who has lived on the same farm the greatest number of years.

## Topeka Educator to Speak At Commencement Friday

WSTC seniors will reach the end of their college undergraduate careers at commencement exercises Friday morning at the Willow bowl. Ringing of the victory bell at 9:45 a.m. will signal the start of the student-faculty procession to the amphitheatre. The exercises start at 10.

Guest speaker will be Dr. Kenneth McFarland, Topeka, Kan., nationally known educator and lecturer. Seats in the Willow bowl, or Rice auditorium if the ceremony is forced indoors, will be reserved for all participants. The graduating class numbers 112 seniors, three candidates for master's degrees and 69 receiving two-year diplomas.

Lessons will start June 22. A second group will be started July 13. Any persons wishing to take senior living should contact Kern immediately. Registration for other lessons will be held after the pool opens.

## Reorganization Group Accepts Petition on Two-School Merger

Petitions for a proposed merger of School Districts 20 and 51 were accepted by the Wayne County School Reorganization committee at a meeting Monday night at the Wayne courthouse.

Marvin Gunderson, District 51, appeared as spokesman for the proposal. He said the plan would involve construction of a new two-room school one mile east of the present District 51 school on Highway 35 west of Wayne.

The merged school would employ two teachers and have an enrollment of about 20 students, plus others that might transfer in. Gunderson said nearly 100 percent of the voters in each district had signed petitions requesting the merger. The merged district would have a valuation of about \$600,000.

The committee also accepted a plan which would detach a half-section from District 13 and merge it with District 1. Students in the half-section are presently attending school in District 1 because they are closer to that school.

## Koerber to Receive National Award at Northwestern U

Bill Koerber, son of Dr. and Mrs. William Koerber, Wayne, has received a scholarship to the national high school institute sponsored by Northwestern university, Evanston, Ill. June 28-Aug. 1.

Outstanding juniors and seniors from the U. S. are selected to participate in one of five areas: speech, journalism, engineering and science, music or education. Koerber will be enrolled in the music session and do work under Northwestern and Chicago symphony instructors.

A Wayne High junior, Koerber is active in all phases of school life. He is solo clarinetist and president of the school band, played first clarinet in the Nebraska all-state band the past two years and found time to be a regular on the varsity basketball team.

## Koerber, Olson Named For Dramatic Awards By Thespian Society

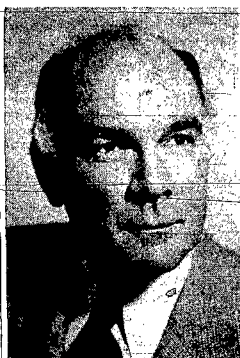

## Locate Polls At Hoskins, Winside

Residents of western Wayne county will get an opportunity to vote on the Western Area school reorganization plan. The election is scheduled June 16.

Date for the election was selected at a closed meeting of the County Reorganization committee Monday night at the Wayne courthouse. The committee worked out details of the election in an executive session called by Chairman Gordon Nuernberger. The latter move was attacked strongly by Herb Hult, opponent of the redistricting plan.

Western Area residents will vote on whether to approve or disapprove the 25-district reorganization plan which calls for construction of a new junior-senior high school building around Winside.

There will be two polling places in the June 16 election. Residents of the area will vote in two units. Winside, as a Class II district, will be one unit. The other will be made up of the 24 rural districts, which includes Hoskins.

In order to go into effect, the proposal has to be approved by a majority of voters in each voting unit. The polls will be at the Hoskins city hall and the Winside city auditorium. Polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m. Districts which will vote at Winside are 11, 16, 24, 28, 29, 31, 39 (Winside), 53, 58, 63, 79 and 81. Those voting at Hoskins will be 3, 9 (Hoskins), 21, 36, 41, 45, 49, 55, 60, 78, 83, 85 and 88.

A delegation from District 55 approached the Reorganization committee Tuesday night to request voting be carried out in precincts as in a general election. The committee rejected this request, stating that it would add considerably to the cost of the election.

Election officials were also named at Tuesday's meeting. The official canvass of the election results will be made by the Reorganization committee June 18. Judges at the Hoskins polls will be Wilbur Behmer, Raymond Jochens and Edwin Strate. Pete Moody and Richard Jones will be clerks. Winside judges will be Mrs. Walton Bruggar, Maurice Lindsay and John Asmus. Mrs. Irene Dittman and Mrs. Harold Neely will serve as clerks.

## 113 Farmers Ask Incentive Payments In Wool Program

A total of 113 Wayne county wool growers have applied for incentive payments under the national wool program for the 1958 marketing year, according to ASC chairman Carl O. Sundell. The deadline for applications was April 30.

On the basis of wool applications received throughout the country, the national percentage rate of payment will be calculated and payments will then be made to growers through their county ASC offices. Payments are expected to be made some time after July 1.

Payments will be made at the percentage rate necessary to bring the national average farm price of wool up to 62 cents a pound, which is the announced incentive level. That percentage will be applied to each grower's marketings to calculate his payment. On unshorn lambs payment is made at a rate based on the wool rate.

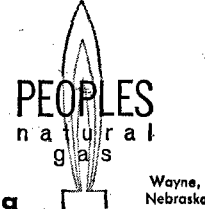

Needle Cast Plagues Pine Trees in Area; Recommend Spraying

Many NE Nebraska pine trees are being plagued with a disease known as "needle cast." Extension Forester Biehard Gavit said today: Prolonged wet weather is ideal for the disease, he added.

In checking plantings and older trees, Gavit said the owner must look for brown or dead needles if some needles are found to have elongated brown spots.

If the brown and dead needles are found, the trees should receive a good spraying of 4-4-50 Bordeaux. This formula means four pounds each of copper sulfate and spray lime in 50 gallons of water. Dissolve the copper sulphate and lime in water. When thoroughly dissolved, add enough water to make 50 gallons. In spraying the tree, wet it thoroughly.

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# Wildcats Fourth in League Meet; Break Two Records

Four WSTC trackmen accounted for nearly all of Wayne's 68 points as the Wildcats finished fourth in the annual NCC meet at Lincoln Friday and Saturday.

The four, Merle McGee, Fred Kjer, Don Weitzenkamp and Harley Gesirich, will go to Cozad Saturday for the midwest-AAU track and field championships.

Kearney captured the conference meet with Chadron and Hastings in that order. It was Kearney's sixth straight title.

Wildcats contributed two of eight new records established. McGee clipped 16.9 seconds off the two-mile mark, winning by nearly 150 yards in 9:29.3. It was his third straight win in the conference event.

Fred Kjer ran a blazing 49 flat 440-yard dash to better by one flat of a second the record he set a year ago. He also finished a close second in the 220, won by Chadron's Virgil Meyer in a record 21.8.

Earlier McGee ran the fastest mile of his career, 4:16.2, but finished second behind Kearney's Larry Snell, whose 4:14.7 is one of the best small college times in the nation this year.

McGee and Snell ran even for more than three laps until Snell broke ahead to win by seven yards. Wayne's Don Weitzenkamp was third in 4:24.5.

Weitzenkamp placed fourth in the 880 although he broke the old record by half a second. His time was 1:58.3. Kearney's Martin Mason, the winner, posted a 1:51.8.

Freshman Rod Elkins contributed a third place in the high jump with a six-foot leap and Lowery Hunter was sixth in the event. Other Wayne points came in the relays, second in the two-mile, third in the mile and sixth in the 880.

Wildcats set four school records—Kjer's 440, McGee's mile, Weitzenkamp's 880 and the mile relay's 3:22.9.

At Cozad Kjer will enter the open 440, McGee the open two-mile and Weitzenkamp the open 880. The three, plus Gesirich, will run the two mile relay.

A week later Kjer, McGee and Weitzenkamp will go to the national NAAU meet at Sioux Falls, S. D. They were among 10 Nebraska College conference performers chosen by coaches to represent the league.

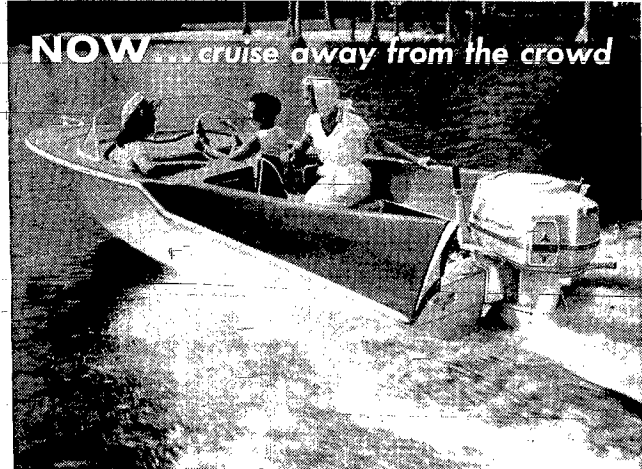

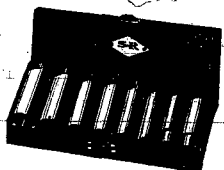

Capitol News

State Senators Asking Study Of State's Higher Education

Lincoln—A group of state senators want a between-sessions study of higher education in Nebraska.

The proposed study would include facilities, faculties and enrollments of the public and private colleges and universities, their relationship to each other and the total picture of higher education in the state.

Signing a resolution calling for the study were Sens. Richard Marvel, Hastings; George Syas, Omaha; Norman Otto, Kearney; Joseph Vosoba, Wilber; George Gerdes, Alliance, and David Tews, Norfolk.

The study, the senators said, should be conducted by the Legislative council. This is composed of all senators who split into study committees between sessions.

The senators want the study to include anticipated educational needs for the next 10 years and ways of financially meeting them. In the resolution the senators said the need for higher education is becoming increasingly important and demands for additional funds continue to grow.

No recent study has been made, the resolution said, "toward the eventual goal of the establishment of an integrated plan for considering the higher educational needs and facilities of Nebraska."

It was suggested the council employ professional survey personnel for the study.

Salary Study
A two-year study of the problem of state salaries has been called for in a resolution in the Legislature.

The legislative council should make the study, said resolution introducers—Sens. K. L. Bowen, Red Cloud; Richard M. V. Hastings, and Hans Jensen, Aurora.

The resolution noted that the matter of adjusting salaries is constantly before the Legislature and that there is a maze of laws and practices involving amounts given. Some are set by the governor, others by heads of departments, state law or the budget bill itself.

Moon Removed

Charles Moon, administrative assistant to Dr. E. A. Rogers, state health director, has been dismissed.

Action was taken by the State Board of Health which said it did so "regretfully." Rogers said the question of Moon's status under the Merit system was involved.

Involvement was possible loss of federal funds, Rogers said. The Merit System council raised the question. Agencies using the council are health, welfare and labor.

Mansion Floors
Sheet lead and sponge rubber will be used to help alleviate "shaky" floors in the governor's mansion, the State Capitol commission decided.

The commission voted to have an architect lay sheet lead over the cement first floor of the mansion, then put a half-inch sponge rubber pad over this, covered by a carpet.

Gov. Ralph G. Brooks had complained that the first and second floors of the east wing, which includes his living quarters,

"tremble." Bar joist and cement construction was used.

Burney-Brooks
Lt. Gov. Dwight Burney a Republican, and Democratic Gov. Ralph G. Brooks have had a sparring match.

Subject of the tussle was a bill passed by the Legislature hiking Burney's pay from \$1,700 to \$3,000 per year. Brooks vetoed the bill, hours after Burney had faced into Democratic claims of legislative achievement, which Burney said were actually accomplished by Republican members of the Legislature.

The members of the Legislature are elected on non-political tickets, but politics has entered into many phases of debate this session. After the veto, the lawmakers promptly overrode the governor and Burney got his pay boost.

Brooks said he vetoed the bill because the people had indicated they did not want to increase legislative salaries. The lieutenant governor is presiding officer of the 43-member Legislature.

Welfare Payments
Persons on Nebraska's old age assistance rolls got more than \$1 million during April, the Board of Public Welfare reported.

The money went to 15,823 recipients. As compared with April, 1958, the rolls were down 648 this year, but costs were up \$21,121. Money for payments comes from federal, state and county sources. The average payment per person was \$69 for the April of this year and \$65 for the same month in 1958.

County Agent's Column

June 5 Order Deadline for Yearling Ewes In New Program Offered Area Producers

The extension service is assisting in a program to supply good, large white-faced western ewes for producers in this area.

These ewes will be yearlings from Montana and Wyoming, carefully selected by extension livestock specialists, experienced commission men and order buyers. This kind of ewes produces desirable market lambs when crossed with mutton-type rams. Ewes will be dipped and cleared with a health certificate before entering the state.

Sheep men normally expect that a ewe will return her purchase price with produce (lamb and wool) each year. Many do considerably better than this. A yearling ewe will be good for six to seven lamb crops. Ewe flocks of 75 to 150 head could well increase net farm income from \$1,000 to \$2,000 annually. It does not require a lot of pasture to carry ewes. Likewise, they are good cleaners of waste forage after harvest. There is no mystery or special talent involved in raising sheep.

These ewes will be available in July or August at approximately \$27 per head. Those interested may contact your county extension agent. The deadline for July delivery orders is June 5.

Rapid Fertilizer Response
Do you want quick returns from fertilizer investment? If you do, bromize pastures should be your

target. When 80 pounds available nitrogen and 40 pounds available phosphate per acre were applied Apr. 23, conservative estimates of observers May 19 were that growth had been more than doubled over the unfertilized area. In addition, cattle preferred grazing the fertilized area almost exclusively.

This fertilizer demonstration on bromine pasture is located on the Reuben Puls farm 1 1/2 miles east of Hoskins on Highway 35. The fertilized plot just east of the pasture windmill on the south side of the road can easily be seen from the highway.

Farm News and Views

Oversized Mowers Increase Speed, Slash Operating Cost of Hay-Making Operation

NEW OVERSIZED MOWERS can be a real help to Midwest farmers in speeding up hay-making operations.

According to an agricultural report, you can get mowers with cutter bars up to 10 feet in length. They can permit you to mow 10 to 15 percent more hay per hour at about 20 cents less operating cost per acre than with a standard seven-foot mower.

IMPROVING EGG QUALITY is one method by which egg producers can get the best returns possible.

During summer egg quality can drop fast and, according to poultry specialists, will often result in a difference in paying price of five to eight cents per dozen. However, you can prevent this loss through proper egg handling from nest to market. Gather often—at least three times a day—and cool eggs fast. A special cooler-cabinet or room which holds temperature at 55 to 60 degrees and humidity at 75 to 80 percent is your best bet. The increased return from better quality eggs can soon more than pay off the added investment.

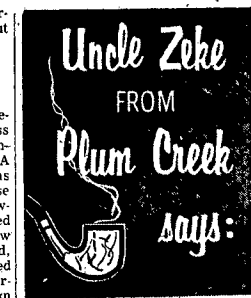

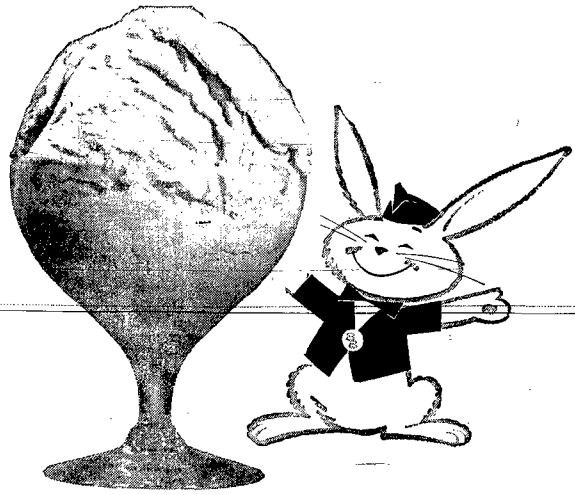
