The money is available primarily to needy students, including incoming freshmen, Freshmen must have been in the top 25 percent of their high school class. Students in college must have a 1.75(B minus) grade average to qualify.

The loans are not payable until one year after the student leaves college. They can be repaid over a 10-year period at three percent interest. There is no interest charged during college attendance. Students who go into teaching may deduct 10 percent of the loan if they remain teachers for that period. The law provides a maximum of \$1,000 a year on loans.
