We were ordered to issue a minimum of 60 violation cards per month with a threat of suspension for failure to do so. Suspensions WERE invoked for this reason."

Wayne will be host to a dairy tour and regional Nebraska Dairy Princess contest Tuesday.

The dairy tour will start at the Wayne Gilliland farm 2 1/2 miles southwest of Wayne at 10 a.m. Gilliland has a purebred Guernsey herd and recently instituted a Grade A milk system. The visit here will highlight the milking stalls, pipeline milker and bulk tank. A milk delivery truck will be on hand to demonstrate how milk is transferred from tank to truck.

A visit to the Felix Dorsey farm is planned at 11 a.m. Dorsey is currently milking 50 Holstein cows. He uses the Herringbone system. His farm has a milking parlor with six cows on each side, six milking units, a bulk tank and pipeline system.

The group will visit the Elvis Olson farm at 1:30 p.m. to view a typical dairy farm setup. Olson milks 10 cows, separates milk and sells cream. A tour of the Burman dairy plant, Wakefield, is scheduled at 2. The dairy has a modern bottling plant and handles milk with a bulk truck from bulk tank producers.

Radovich will be returning to his alma mater, where he earned numerous basketball honors, including All-America honorable mention. He finished his basketball career at Wyoming in 1952, received a bachelor's degree there in 1955 and a master's in 1957.

For the past two years he has coached basketball and assisted in football at Wayne. He also taught physical education. His basketball team this year finished third in the Nebraska College conference.

Councilmen Lower Power Rates to Rural Customers

Rural power rates, additional stop signs and a proposed increase in water rates provided the main topics for discussion at a meeting of the Wayne city council last Tuesday night.

The council approved a resolution reducing electricity rates for its customers, beyond the city limits. The new rates will be the same as those for town consumers, but the rural patrons will read their own meters and report to the city clerk. Rural patrons previously paid a premium rate for city electricity.

The council received requests for additional stop signs on Pearl and Walnut streets. Carl Wright and Keith Boughn appeared to ask for installation of four-way stop signs at Tenth and Eleventh on Pearl. They cited the hazards of the two corners because of blind approaches.

A letter from Walter Peterson requested similar stop signs at Tenth and Walnut. Both requests were referred to the street committee for recommendations.

The proposed increase in water rates is expected to be discussed again Tuesday when the council meets. At last week's meeting, a report showed Wayne considerably under the rates charged by other towns of comparable size. The table below shows a comparison of rates between Wayne and Norfolk:

An application by B. W. Wright to move a 1 1/2-story residence into the city was approved but the council instructed City Clerk Howard Witt to notify Wright that connection to the city sewer system would not be possible.

About 150 former pupils and teachers of District 1 attended the school's homecoming and reunion Sunday. The rural school homecoming, believed to be the first held in Wayne county, was at the school five and one-half miles southeast of Wakefield.

The event also was the seventh anniversary of the school and several of the first pupils attended the fête.

Oldest teacher present was Mrs. W. F. Richardson, Wayne, who taught there 1899-1900.

Mrs. Ray Dilts, Wayne, was honored for having attended the school then serving as teacher there for six terms. Mrs. Dilts began teaching about 1901.

A family of two sisters and a brother all of whom attended District 1 in the early 1900's also were present. They are Mrs. Jake Johnson and Mrs. Anna Grier, Wayne, and Alfred Anderson, Atkinson.

Three members of the R. B. Leonard family who attended school in the 1890's returned to renew acquaintances and reminisce about school events of the early days. They are E. E. and Carl Leonard and Mrs. Ray Dilts. School history shows that District 1 originally included all of Wayne county. As populations increased other schools were built and now District 1 encompasses six sections.

Mrs. Will Hugelman, Wakefield, was oldest pupil present while Anne Leonard, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius Leonard, Wakefield, was youngest.

Mrs. Irene Hamilton, present teacher, and Mrs. Ellis Johnson were in charge of the program.

Following invocation by Mrs. Hamilton the group was led in singing "School Days" by Mrs. Howard Boeckenhauer, a former teacher.

A history of the school was read by Fannie Hugelman and 1959 students presented a pantomime of humorous incidents in the school's early days.

Letters from pupils and teachers who were unable to attend were read to the audience and Mrs. Hamilton read the poem, "A Teacher's Dream."




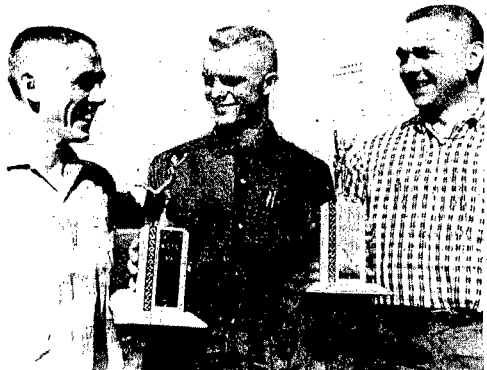

\$16,000 Available in Student Loans At Local College

WSTC has received an additional \$16,475 under the National Defense Student Loan fund, it was announced this week. This brings the total available to local students to about \$16,400.

The money is available primarily to needy students, including incoming freshmen. Freshmen must have been in the top 25 percent of their high school class. Students in college must have a 1.75 (B minus) grade average to qualify.

The loans are not payable until one year after the student leaves college. They can be repaid over a 10-year period at three percent interest. There is no interest charged during college attendance. Students who go into teaching may deduct 10 percent of the loan a year, up to five years—thus repaying only half the loan if they remain teachers for that period. The law provides a maximum of \$1,000 a year on loans.

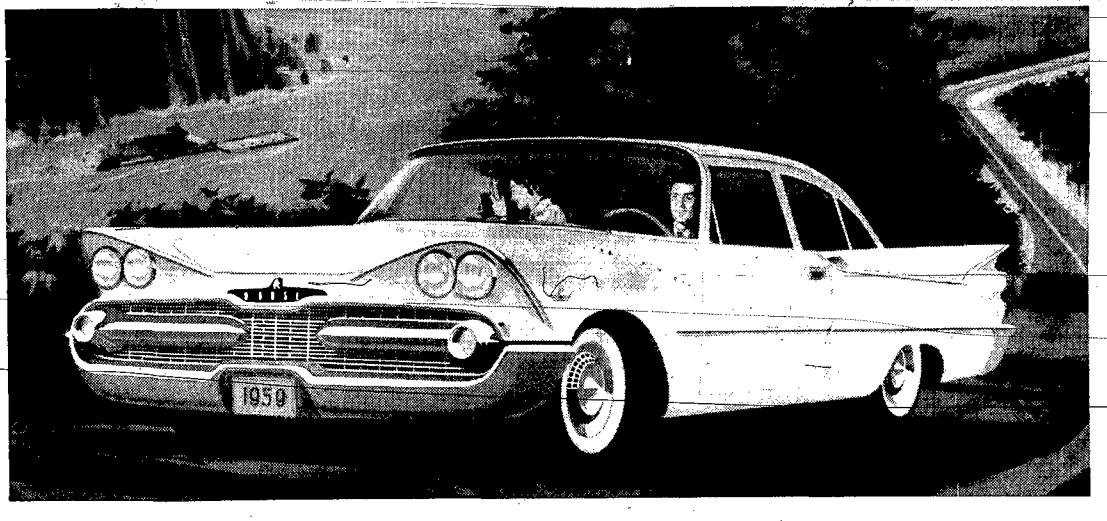

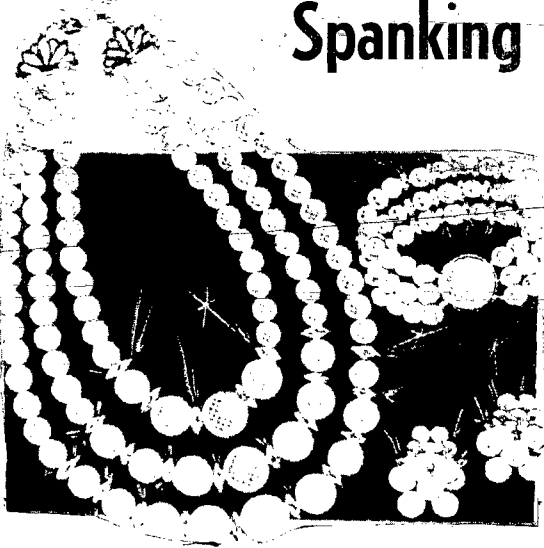

State Employees Most Talked Of People by State Senators

Lincoln—Probably the most talked about group of people in the current session of the Legislature is state employees. The subjects under discussion range from pay to politics.

Actual beginning of the matter came when several bills were introduced in the Legislature to boost the pay of some department heads and deputies. Some bills were passed by the Legislature. Others did not make the grade.

Then Gov. Ralph G. Brooks began exercising his veto power on salary hikes authorized by the Legislature. In the meantime, Richard E. Speltz, Jr., Grand Island, issued a statement saying that 30 state-employee changes changed their political party affiliation from Republican to Democrat, indicating this was necessary for them to keep their jobs.

Atty. Gen. C. S. Beck, a Republican, leveled a blast in a letter to Speltz, against Brooks and the Legislature. Beck said the governor's veto of salary bills is a political maneuver and members of the Legislature should recognize this and act accordingly.

State senators are elected on a non-partisan basis, but Beck says they should have party loyalty on legislation that is strictly political. There are 31 Republicans among the 43 members of the Legislature. Brooks then called a press conference and stated that it makes no difference to him when employees change party affiliation or not. Ninety-five percent of the capitol workers are Republican, Brooks said, and all he wants them to do is "their job." A change of registration will not protect the inefficient employee, the chief executive, a Democrat, said.

One thing Brooks said should not be done by state employees. That is they should not campaign against the administration while they are employed by it.

Interstate Fuss
The Interstate highway in Nebraska continues to be a bone of contention, as it has since the program began in this state.

The Advisory State Highway

commission, by a 5-2 vote, recommended the controversial section of the Interstate be built on the north side of the river between Grand Island and North Platte.

Three state senators, meanwhile, Richard Marvel, Hastings, Don Thompson, McCook, and Kenneth L. Bowen, Red Cloud, told Gov. Brooks a great many people, including those in the South Platte area, feel the decision on the North Platte-Grand Island segment was based on inadequate information. Also, the senators said, they feel the decision was made before public hearings.

The vice chairman of the commission, J. R. McBride, Minden, and an advocate of the south of the river route, said the people had been "double crossed" in that the decision already had been made before public hearings at Kearney and Corral.

State Engineer Roy Cochran denied this. He said there was no evidence brought out at the hearings that contradicted the Highway department's economic study of the two routes. Cochran said department personnel went through the hearings with "open minds" on the question of the location of the road.

Early Cutting Increases Alfalfa's Value Drop in Dairy Cow Prices Seen Next Year

FIRST STEP toward insect control in stored grain is to spray the walls, floor and ceiling of bins 10 to 14 days before harvest. Use premium grade 57 percent malathion concentrate at a rate of 10 ounces in five gallons of water and completely coat the bin just to the dripping point. Then, as the grain is being austered or elevated into the bin, apply a fine spray of malathion to the grain using one pint of chemical in 2 1/2 gallons of water for each 1,000 bushels of grain. After the bin is filled, level the grain surface and coat it with the same spray mixture for protection from the Indian meal moth. Grain treated with malathion will not harm livestock.

ALFALFA MAY be worth up to 17¢ a ton more than later cut hay can be obtained by cutting early, according to an agricultural digest report. Alfalfa cut when it is the bud stage rather than the one-tenth to one-half blossom stage will produce a more palatable, nutritious roughage. By cutting early you may also be able to make an extra cutting this fall.

FARMERS PLANNING to sell dairy cows should do so within the next 12 months if they want to profit from the present high cow prices, advise farm economists.

Cows are now selling at record levels, mainly because of high fed beef prices and the active demand for cows by other dairymen who want to increase their milking

herds. But cows probably won't be worth as much in the summer of 1960.

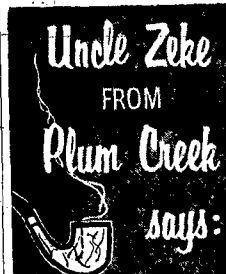

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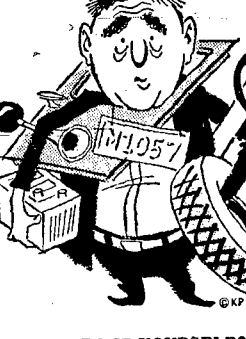

Dear Sir:
 At a school redistricting meeting held at the Wayne County courthouse May 25 it was stated in The Wayne Herald by a reporter that I threw in the opposing attack against Chairman Nuernberger. I shall state what the attack was.
 There were 10 in all in the group I was with. The redistricting committee had an informal meeting at which they asked whether we wanted anything. We answered, "We would like a voting place in each precinct," but the committee thought that too costly. Then Mr. Nuernberger asked the committee to their closed door meeting. I made the statement, "As an American citizen and taxpayer, why not have the meeting here in the open?" To this Nuernberger replied, "This is an executive meeting."
 I was not the only one there who was either for or against this plan. We all wanted to know what was being said and done at the meeting. I believe where the public is involved as we of the 22 school districts are and as taxpayers, should not be barred from a meeting that concerns us all. Whether there are laws or no laws in a project like this there should be no secrecy. Is this justice? Another thing if the public was not welcome at the meeting—why was it put in the paper that a meeting was to be held.
 Here are a few reasons of the opposition of why we are opposed

to redistricting:
 1. Our homes are in the country, that's where our schools belong.
 2. Without our schools our land would decrease in value. Who wants to buy land miles from a school.
 3. How can anyone think of putting small children on a bus in these hills.
 4. We are satisfied with the schools we have and we also know where our little children are.
 5. What the public is trying to sell our children is the idea that after they have an education they don't have to work. This fact was emphasized in a recent editorial in the Scott City, Kan. News-Chronicle. It quoted Dr. Robert Hutchins, youngest university president in the U. S. He said, "College degrees are becoming increasingly important as an aid to finding a job and requirements for a degree have correspondingly sunk lower and lower. One solution to this might be to award a bachelor of arts degree to every person when he is born."
 The editorial went on to say: "This would be the proper solution to the educational problem of the U. S. today. Employers will not hire a person unless he has a college degree, regardless of whether he is skilled or even intelligent."
 "Education is a wonderful thing—but it is not necessarily gleaned in halls of ivy. And an education system which fails to teach that manual labor is honorable is a failure indeed."
 "Education without purpose is like a runaway horse and certainly is just as wasteful."
 6. We like to be able to put districts together as we see fit and not have a six-man committee tell us what to do, when all the

education they had was gotten in our small schools.
 7. There will be school but the buses will not run. Does this stand for better education?
 It was stated in the Herald I made an attack on Mr. Nuernberger, now I shall counterattack. If he is so interested in redistricting why doesn't he do so in his own community.
 My final statement is this, if the Winside school cannot operate as they are why don't they contract their high school students out and run the grades or bring the grades out in our country schools, then they will see what transportation is.
