Four Die in Head-On Collision Tuesday Night

Four Killed Tuesday Night In Accident Near Concord

Northeast Nebraska's worst auto accident since November, 1955 took the lives of four persons near Concord Tuesday night.

Four other persons were injured in the head-on collision of two cars on a gravel road 6 1/2 miles east of Concord. The dead are:

Henry Erwin, 40, Concord; Barbara Erwin, 5, Concord; Leon Ekberg, 18, Wakefield; Myrna Schlines, 18, Wakefield.

Still listed in fair condition at a Sioux City hospital Wednesday morning was Mrs. Henry Erwin. Hospitalized at Wakefield are Merle Schlines, 16, Wakefield; Loene Anderson, 17, Wakefield; and Marcia Erwin, 14, Concord. The latter three all have broken legs. Miss Anderson also has a broken right wrist.

The accident occurred about 7:15 p.m. on a county road 1/2 mile west of Highway 9 between Wakefield and Allen. The cars, driven by Mr. Erwin and Mr. Ekberg, collided head-on on the down slope of a hill. The point of impact was about 150 feet below the crest of the hill.

The Erwin car was proceeding west. The collision occurred about four feet from the north edge of the road, according to Safety Patrol Lt. Harry Bri, who investigated the mishap. There were no skid marks from either vehicle, he said.

Mr. Erwin, his daughter and Mr. Ekberg died at the scene of

the crash. Miss Schlines died at the Wakefield hospital. Marcia Erwin ran a half-mile to summon help following the accident. Ambulances were summoned from Wayne and Wakefield.

The Ekberg car was reported to have been going to South Sioux City for a party to celebrate the engagement of Miss Schlines and Mr. Ekberg. The couple had just been at the Harold Anderson farm to pick up Miss Anderson.

Dixon County Attorney Merle Kingsbury, Ponca, said no request will be called on the accident.

The accident was the worst since 10 persons were killed on Highway 20 east of Laurel in November, 1955. Five persons were killed in an accident a mile south of Carroll in 1953.

Council Tentatively Okays Minimum Water Bill Hike

An increase in Wayne's water rates was tentatively approved at a meeting of the city council Tuesday night. Final action on the measure is expected at the council's June 30 meeting.

Primary aim of the increase is to increase the present minimum billing of \$1 per quarter. Under the increase the minimum would be \$1 per month or \$3 per quarter. Only about 100 consumers currently are billed at the minimum rate.

The rate change would cover the first 30,000 gallons used per quarter, under instructions issued by the council to Attorney Budd Bornhoff Tuesday night. The rate for the first 7,500 gallons would be 40 cents per 1,000 gallons. The next 22,500 gallons would cost 20 cents per 1,000. Present rates are 25 cents for the first 10,000 and 20 cents for the next 20,000.

Not only the minimum billing customers will be affected by the proposed increase. It would also result in a \$1 per quarter hike for any consumers using 30,000 gallons. The rate jump will increase the city's water revenue about \$4,000 per year.

The water rate increase came in for considerable discussion. Councilmen William Koerber and Wayne Mars objected to any increase except the minimum billing. Koerber said "There is no justification for raising water rates unless we have figures to show the water department is not paying its own way."

Second major topic at Tuesday's meeting was a report from the city's engineers on solutions to the sanitary sewer problem in the northeast section of town. The engineers recommended construction of a 10-inch relief sewer from Seventh and Dearborn streets to Second and Nebraska. They said this would solve the problem now experienced with overloaded and poorly drained sewer lines in the area. Estimated cost of the project was about \$15,000.

Action on the sewer project was referred to Bornhoff to determine a legal and equitable method of paying the cost. He said he will try to have an answer at the June 30 meeting.

The engineers also presented a survey for future construction of a relief sewer from the college campus south to Second and Nebraska. This project's cost was estimated at \$16,675.

The council authorized advertising for bids for a new boiler and burner at the city auditorium. The present boiler is broken. Estimated cost of the new boiler and burner is \$3,000.

Permits for two buildings in the city's fire zone were approved. They went to C. N. Olson for a \$7,500 photo-jewelry store at 211 Main street and to Marsh and Dr. L. A. Jensen for an \$18,000 store at 1024 Main street.

Majority is Needed in Two Units

Residents of western Wayne county will go to the polls in a special election Tuesday to decide the fate of the 25-district Western Area school reorganization plan.

The voters will decide whether the 25 districts will be consolidated into one large district. To gain approval, the plan must get a majority vote in each of two voting units. Mrs. first unit includes 24 rural districts. The second is the Winside district.

The plan calls for future construction of a new junior-senior high school building at Winside. If approved, another election would have to be called later to approve a bond issue for the construction.

Polling places for Tuesday's election will be the Hoskins city hall and the Winside city auditorium. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Districts which will vote at Hoskins are 3, 6 (Hoskins), 21, 36, 41, 46, 49, 55, 60, 78, 83, 85 and 88. Those which will vote at Winside are 11, 16, 24, 28, 29, 31, 39 (Winside), 53, 58, 63, 79 and 81.

Samples of the ballots to be used in the election are printed in the legal section of today's Herald. The official canvass of the election is scheduled next Thursday by the County Reorganization committee.

Judges at the Hoskins polls will be Wilbur Behmer, Raymond Johnson and Edwin Strate. Pete Moody and Richard Jones will be clerks. Winside judges are Mrs. Waldon Braggel, Maurice Lindsay and John Asmus. Mrs. Irene Dittman and Mrs. Harold Neely will serve as clerks.

Proponents of the Western Area plan predicted an enrollment of 500 students for the 1960-61 term. An estimated budget for the term just completed shows a tax levy of 24.50 mills. This includes 19.12 for general operation and .538 for retiring bonds to construct the junior-senior high school and purchase school buses.

Immediate plans would call for operation of grade schools at Winside and Hoskins. If the plan is approved, a school board to govern the new district (No. 30-K) would be appointed by County Supt. Gladys Porter until one can be elected at the regular election next spring.

Osmond Area Approves Reorganization Plan

Consolidating 14 Pierce county school districts into one was overwhelmingly approved in a special election last Tuesday. The total assessed valuation of the 14 districts, which include the Osmond town district, is \$4,280,000.

Rural people voted 211 to 88 in favor of the proposal. Those in Osmond favored the consolidation, 335 to 11. Approximately 300 pupils are in the area. An election on proposed construction of a school building at Osmond will be held at a later date.
