Work Progressing on Highway 35 West of Wayne

Fails to Carry Rural Areas

Residents of 25 school districts in western Wayne county Tuesday rejected the Western Area plan for reorganization. The measure failed by 103 votes.

Ballots cast by residents of 13 rural districts at Hoskins proved the decisive factor in the election. The measure got the needed majority approval in both rural and town district voting at Winside. A majority was needed in both rural and town voting units to put the reorganization proposal into effect.

The unofficial vote tally showed only 272 of 646 voters approved the plan in the rural voting unit. This represents 42.1 percent of the votes cast. Winside district voters overwhelmingly supported the plan in the town voting unit. The vote was 213 "For" the plan to only 15 "Against". This is 93.4 percent for approval.

Official results of the election will be determined at the canvass by the County Reorganization committee tonight at Wayne. Nine mail ballots will be counted then. They can have no effect on the final outcome of the election.

Reorganization Committee Chairman Gordon Nuernberger said Tuesday he did not know what the next action would be by his committee. Herman Opler, Hoskins, a committee member, suggested the group wait to see what action is taken by the Madison county committee with its plan.

A map distributed earlier this year by the Madison county committee included all or part of 10 districts in the southwest portion of Wayne county. They are Districts 3, 9, 11, 16, 21, 41, 49, 60, 85 and 88.

June 30 Deadline for Applications on New '60 Wheat Allotments

Farmers on land which had no wheat history in 1957, 1958 and 1959 may apply for a 1960 wheat acreage allotment, according to County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell.

The owner or operator of such a farm must apply in writing to the county ASC committee by June 30, Sundell said. Otherwise a 1960 wheat acreage allotment will not be established for the farm.

Sundell further explained that wheat seeded on a farm for 1958 or 1959 which did not have a 1958 or 1959 allotment does not qualify as wheat history for the purpose of establishing acreage allotments.

A 1960 wheat acreage allotment will not be established for a farm without wheat history acreage in 1957 and on which wheat was planted for grain in 1958 or 1959 without a wheat acreage allotment unless an application is filed by June 30, 1959.

11 1/2-Mill Jump Estimated in Wayne School District Taxes

Bonds Due Date Cause of Double Levy

An 11 1/2-mill increase in school taxes for the Wayne district was estimated this week following filing of the district's annual budget and tax certificate with County Clerk C. A. Bard.

This represents an increase of five mills over the tax levy estimated when the local school board adopted its budget a month ago. The hike is necessary because untimely maturity dates on bonds for the new elementary school, Board President Mrs. Don Wightman said today.

The bond maturity date, Mar. 15 each year, makes it necessary to levy for two year's interest in 1959, Mrs. Wightman explained. This must be done since the bulk of taxes is not collected until after May 1 each year.

Had the bond maturity date been June 1 or July 1, the double levy for bond interest would not have been necessary, she added. The board president emphasized the fact that the double levy would be necessary for only one year.

Based on present district valuations, the tax levy necessary for 1959 would be 27.46 mills. This includes 18.60 mills for general operation and 8.86 mills for retirement of bonds and interest.

The new estimate means school taxes for 1959 will be increased about \$11.50 per \$1,000 of valuation over the levy for 1958. Thus, taxes on a home

with an assessed valuation of \$3,000 would increase about \$34.50.

Mrs. Wightman said the bonds for construction of the new elementary school were issued Mar. 15 and will come due Mar. 15 each year starting in 1961. She said \$15,000 worth of bonds will mature then. Meanwhile, a year's interest will be due Mar. 15, 1960 and another half-year's interest on Sept. 15, 1960.

Both these interest payments will have to be included in this year's tax levy since the bulk of 1959 taxes will not be collected until after May 1, 1960.

In addition, the board must levy for the \$15,000 in bonds that will mature in March, 1961 since the 1960 taxes will not have been collected in time to meet the obligation.

Electricity Use Hits New Record

Electrical consumption in Wayne reached a new record 24-hour total Tuesday. Light Plant Supt. N. H. Brugger reported Wednesday.

Brugger said a total of 30,500 kilowatts was generated at the municipal plant. This exceeded the previous record of slightly over 28,000.

The superintendent said a burned-out electric gas valve control was responsible for two interruptions of services Monday night in Wayne. The first outage lasted 10 minutes. The second lasted about five minutes.

Social Security Agent Slates Visit Next Week

A representative of the Norfolk Social Security office will be at the Wayne courthouse from 9 a.m. to noon next Thursday. A person reaching retirement age this year and expecting to earn \$1,200 or less is urged to apply for Social Security benefits about a month before his birthday.

NE Nebraska county superintendents, town school officials and teachers are expected to attend the annual event, which opens at 10 a.m. in the old auditorium. Dr. Joe Nichols, head of the WSTC education division, will be moderator.

Speaker will be Dr. Merle Stone-man, member of the University of Nebraska education faculty and chairman of the NEA's regional committee on rural education. He will talk at the morning session and take part in afternoon discussion groups.

Intermediate unit refers to the county (or larger area) school administration, where school districts have merged into large units. Dr. Nichols explained that the intermediate unit will need an administrator to provide liaison among the unit's various officials. It is expected that county superintendents can fit this role.

Teen-Age Boys Handle 50-Cow Milking Operation in 45 Minutes on Felix Dorcey Farm, Wayne

Milking nearly 50 cows is only a two-boy operation at the Felix Dorcey farm 1 1/2 miles west of Wayne.

Using a herringbone stanchion system, automatic feeders and a six-unit pipeline milker, Mark Dorcey, 17, and his brother John, 15, handle the whole chore.

Big secret of the speed is that once milking starts the boys never leave the pit between the stanchions and never lift or carry milk pails or cans. Six cows are milked at once on one side of the pit while the boys ready the next six on the other side. With 12 cows in the stanchions, the boys are busy all the time.

While Mark lets the cows into the milking parlor from the loafing shed, John is yanking handles on the automatic feeders as each cow seeks her spot in the stanchions.

Only two gates are used to hold each group of six cows. The cows are placed at an angle to the center pit to expose their udders for easier accessibility to milking units.

The pit is sunken so that milkers can be attached to cows without the operator having to stoop. The

herringbone pattern permits six cows to be milked in the space three cows would occupy spaced head to tail. There is no need to walk between cows.

Once the cows are locked in, John starts down the row washing udders with a hose. Mark follows and washes them again with a sanitizer. Then each boy starts connecting milking units. When the six units are connected the two-inch glass pipeline often surges full of milk.

Milk never touches the air on its trip from the cow, through the pipeline, filter and pump to where it is stored in a refrigerated stainless steel 375-gallon tank to await the bulk truck. Warm milk reaching the tank is constantly agitated and cools almost instantly down to the required 40-degree mark.

When milking is completed, the pipeline is disconnected from the bulk tank and put on washing cycle where the entire system receives a cold water rinse, then a wash in hot detergent water followed by a hot rinse to disinfect and dry the glass pipes.



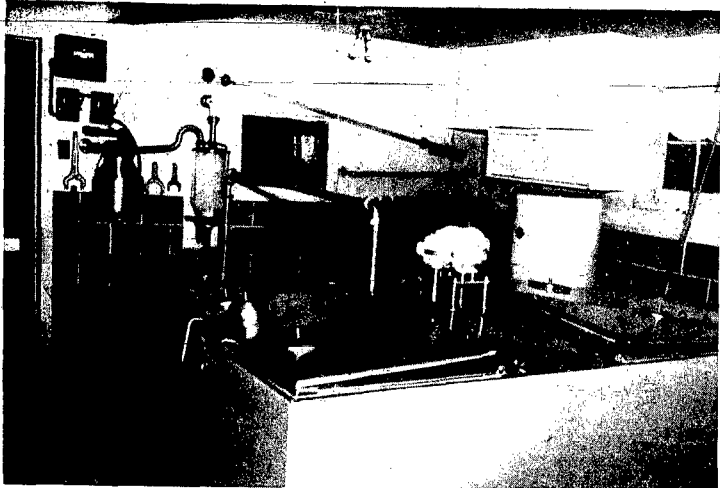

Report of the last sanitary inspection shows the Dorcey operation rated at 98 percent. Eighty-five percent is considered satisfactory.

The herringbone system, Dorcey explained, is comparatively new in the U. S., coming here from Europe little more than a year ago.

Fedders on each stanchion hold about 90 pounds of feed and require filling every four days. This year, Dorcey said, he expects to produce about 700,000 pounds of whole milk, nearly double last year's production of 356,000 pounds. The 1958 figures could be doubled, he explained, if heifers coming fresh this fall turn out to be good producers.

Present plans are to work the herd up to 125 head, providing 100 head of milkers the year around. Most of the cows are artificially bred and produce a calf crop that is worth several thousand dollars a year in addition to the milk income. Felix plans to keep the best calves to build his herd and mar-

ket the rest.

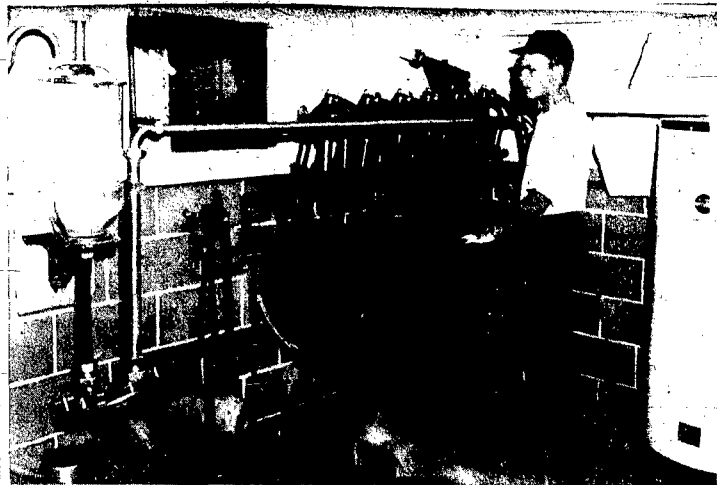
Farming is a family operation at Dorcey's with a job for each of five boys. While Mark and John do the milking, 14-year-old Tom has charge of 40 odd head of calves and Jerry, 16, handles the hog chores. The job of keeping the cows in the loafing barn before milking falls to 8-year-old Kevin.

Cost of the milking parlor and milk room was about \$8,000, Dorcey said, but included about \$1,000 for a well that was needed anyway.

He receives a premium price of \$1 cwt. over regular market price for bulk milk under this system because of its high degree of sanitation. Premium payments alone will pay for the system this year exclusive of the well.

The Dorceys farm 275 acres this year and pasture their cattle. At milking time cows are fed a commercial feed for dairy cattle. Dorcey does not grain or mix feed for their cattle, preferring rather to convert crops to hay and silage and feed ready-mixed rations.

State Spending Highlighted As Senators Consider Budget

Lincoln—State spending is in the spotlight this week as senators consider the budget for 1959-61. Generally, the budget as reported out by the Budget committee headed by Sen. Otto Liebers, Lincoln, parallels the recommendations of Gov. Ralph G. Brooks.

The figure of most concern to Nebraskans is the amount needed from the general fund, which is supported by state property taxes. The committee recommends expenditure of some \$72 million, not including carryover funds from the current biennium which ends June 30.

Brooks says he is "speculating" but he feels there probably will be no state property tax increases as a result of the committee recommendations. The reason he calculates this way, the governor said, is that the amount of miscellaneous revenue going to the general fund will be increased and property valuations, against which the levy is applied, are going up.

Recommended by the University of Nebraska by Brooks and the Budget committee was a \$4 million hike in general fund money. University Chancellor Clifford Hardin says this will enable the school to compete in the national market for qualified instructors.

Final passage of the budget bill will await disposition of pending measures in the Legislature which required an appropriation of funds. In Nebraska, all funds—cash and Federal included—cannot be spent until the budget bill, enacted by the Legislature, appropriates the money.

The budget committee has been working for six months on the budget bill and Gov. Brooks praised the group for its efficient, thorough handling of the complex spending situation.

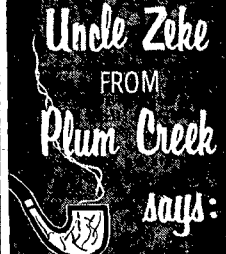
