

Wayne Police and State Patrol-man O. J. Knotwell Wednesday were investigating the theft of about \$300 in cash and some nar-cotics at the Griess Rexall store, Wayne.

about solo in tesh and some nat-coltes at the Griess Reall store, Wayne. --The theft was discovered by A. H. Reikofski, store employee. when he opping the store about 8:15 a.m. Wednesday. The cash and two bottles of morphine and opium were taken from the store safe. Methods used in the theft were almost identical to another rob-bery in Norfolk Saturday night. That robbery netted about 82.500 in merchandise, \$150 in cash and \$2,000 in government bonds. First losses at the Wayne store were estimated at over \$700. How-ever, when Knotwell made his in-vestigation he found over \$400 in checks the burglars had left be-hind. He also found a loth sact which contained a major portion of the missing narcotics. The sack was found on a shelf just beneath the hole in the root owhere the the vere able took the sack of nar-cotics to Lineohn Wednesday after-noon for fingerprint tests. Also dis-covered near the damaged safe were a blood-stained handkerchief and a rubber-coated chisel used to open the safe. Store Owner Wilmer Griess said the missing narcotics include two



Knotwell theorized the thicves might flave dorgotten the sack of narcotics when alerted by activity in the area. Policeman S. C. Thompson said he stopped directly in front of the store about 3 a.m. to pick up a child's tricycle that had been left on the sidewalk. Police patrol the alley behind the store at least once each hour, but it was impossible to detect any unusual activity. The rear storage room has no windows and the rear door was secured by a might latch when Reikofski made the discov-ery of the theft. The area around the hole in the roof is not visible from the alley.
