## College President Names Six New Faculty Members

Six new faculty members will join the WSTC staff in September. President W. A. Brandenburg announced this week.

They are Gerald Gullickson, Dr. Christine Gullickson, Frayne D. Anderson, D. James Frey, Jr., Nina Youshkevitch and Allen Svenningson.

Dr. Brandenburg also announced three resignations: Lou Ann Gowallock, assistant professor of women's physical education; Burr Standley, building and grounds superintendent, and Michael Keran, economics instructor.

Gullickson will be a languages instructor. His wife will be an assistant professor in foreign languages. Both are now teaching at Luther college, Iowa. Anderson will be assistant librarian. He is now completing a master's degree in library science at the University of Denver.

Frey will be a science education instructor. He is a candidate for a master's degree at Colorado State college, Greeley. Miss Youshkevitch will be a part-time instructor in dance. Svenningson succeeds George "Moe" Radovich as head basketball coach.

Dr. Brandenburg also announced that the college has contracted with a Philadelphia food service management company to manage both the cafeteria and grill starting Sept. 1.

The company will have charge of buying, preparing and serving all the food and will also hire the personnel. Present employees will be retained. The firm currently has contracts with nearly 100 colleges and schools all over the nation.

Starting next fall, all new students and former students returning after a semester or more absence will come under a required room and board plan. They will pay \$80 a semester for dormitory rent and \$160 for cafeteria meals. Students not living in dormitories may eat in the cafeteria for \$170 a semester.

The cafeteria will be open for Monday breakfast through Friday lunch. It is expected that the grill will expand its hours to include the weekend and also will serve light meals. Previously it has provided only fountain drinks and sandwiches.

Students who were in school this spring may adopt the board plan if they wish, but are not required to do so as long as they stay in college (not including summer sessions). Students must adopt the semester board plan in order to eat in the cafeteria.

## WSTC Alumni Group Plans Reunion at Campus Friday

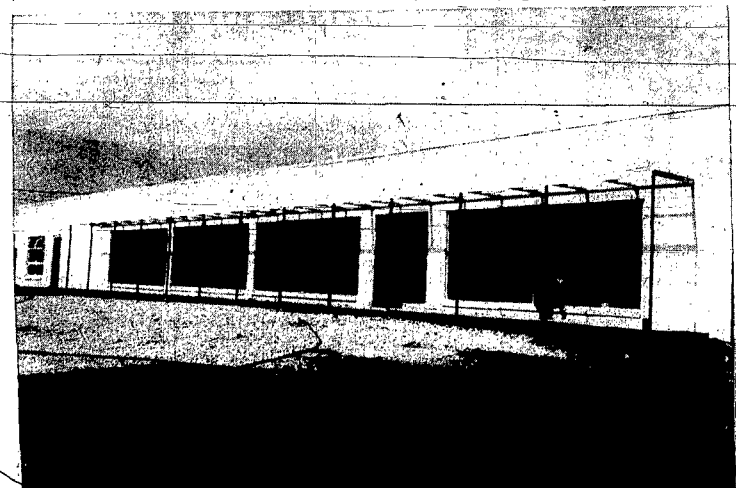
WSTC graduates attending the annual summer reunion Friday will see old movies of campus scenes, receive the new alumni directory and elect one director.

## Griess Rexall Store Target Wednesday

Wayne Police and State Patrolman O. J. Knottwell Wednesday were investigating the theft of about \$300 in cash and some narcotics at the Griess Rexall store, Wayne.

The theft was discovered by A. H. Reikofski, store employee, when he opened the store about 8:15 a.m. Wednesday. The cash and two bottles of morphine and opium were taken from the store safe.

Methods used in the theft were almost identical to another robbery in Norfolk Saturday night. That robbery netted about \$2,500 in merchandise, \$150 in cash and \$2,000 in government bonds.

First losses at the Wayne store were estimated at over \$700. However, when Knottwell made his investigation he found over \$400 in checks the burglars had left behind. He also found a cloth sack which contained a major portion of the missing narcotics. The sack was found on a shelf just beneath the hole in the roof where the thieves gained entry to the store.

Knottwell and County Sheriff Don Weible took the sack of narcotics to Lincoln Wednesday afternoon for fingerprint tests. Also discovered near the damaged safe were a blood-stained handkerchief and a rubber-coated chisel used to open the safe.

Store Owner Wilmer Griess said the missing narcotics include two dozen demerol ampules, a bottle of elixir of morphine and a bottle of opium.

Overlooked by the thieves in their haste was about \$250 in cash contained in small envelopes within the safe and several government bonds.

Police Chief R. H. Hansen said the burglars gained entrance by cutting a hole in the roof of a rear storage room. They used a brace and bit to cut holes. The opening measured only 10 by 16 inches.

The thieves then wheeled the 750-pound safe back to the storage room from its regular position under the store's prescription counter. The chisel was used to punch out the safe dial, but failed to open a safety lock. The thieves then pried open the safe door and rifled the contents.

Knottwell theorized the thieves might have forgotten the sack of narcotics when alerted by activity in the area. Policeman S. C. Thompson said he stopped directly in front of the store about 3 a.m. to pick up a child's tricycle that had been left on the sidewalk.

Police patrol the alley behind the store at least once each hour, but it was impossible to detect any unusual activity. The rear storage room has no windows and the rear door was secured by a night latch when Reikofski made the discovery of the theft. The area around the hole in the roof is not visible from the alley.

## Name Former Prima Ballerina New Dance Instructor at College on Part-Time Basis

A former prima ballerina who danced with several famed ballet troupes will teach dance at WSTC this fall.

She is Nina Youshkevitch, known here as Mrs. Robert G. Johnson, wife of an assistant speech professor at the college. He joined the college faculty in September and she came here from New York late in the fall. They have one son, Robert Jacques, born last winter.

President W. A. Brandenburg expressed pleasure that Miss Youshkevitch is available for part-time teaching of classes in dance that have been in the WSTC curriculum for years.

Miss Youshkevitch was born in Odessa, Russia, the daughter of a Russian author and playwright, Simeon Youshkevitch. She studied art at the Sorbonne and Ecole du Louvre and music at Ecole Normale de Musique in Paris. She was graduated from the Lycee Racine and the Lycee Jules Ferry.

A protegee of the great choreographer, Bronislava Nijinska, Miss Youshkevitch also studied with such ballet greats as Prochorska, Egorova and Leo Staats.

At the age of 14 she began her professional career as prima ballerine of the famed Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo. Later she danced in the major cities of Europe, England, Australia, Canada and the U. S. as prima ballerina with such companies as the Original Ballet Russe, the Bronislava Nijinska ballet and the Polish National ballet.

In 1941, after a guest appearance at Jacob's Pillow, Miss Youshkevitch decided to make the U. S. her permanent home. In 1942 she became premier danseuse at the Metropolitan opera. In 1945 she danced the role of Aurora in "The Sleeping Beauty" at the San Francisco opera house, the first time this ballet had been done in its entirety in this country.

Retiring from the footlights in 1951, she became director-choreographer of her own group, the Nina Youshkevitch Ballet workshop, in New York City. Along with this work, she filled teaching and lecture assignments at the

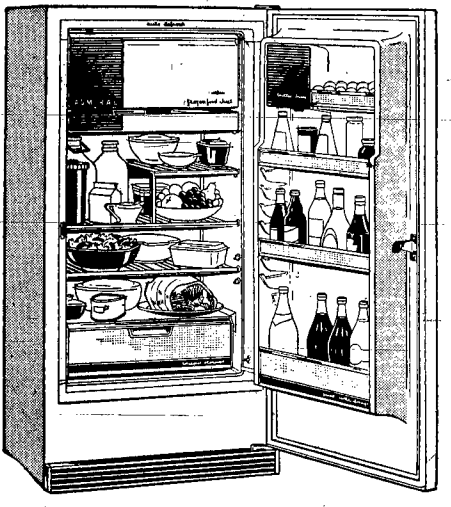

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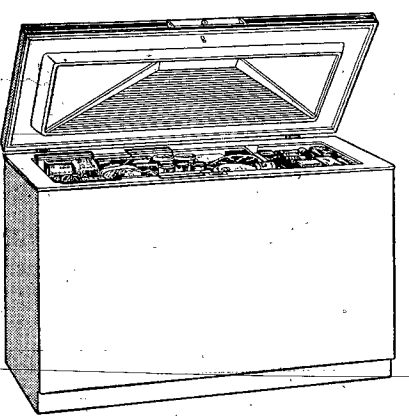
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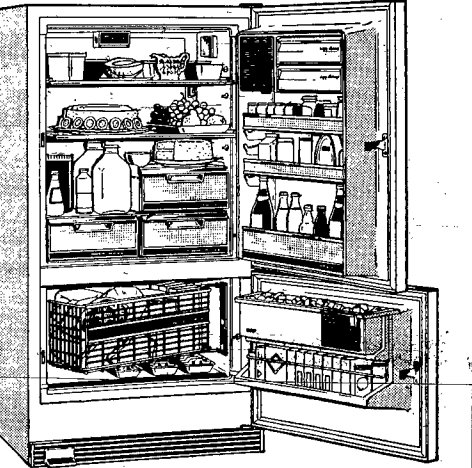

Capitol News

Senators Completing Longest Session in Nebraska's History

Lincoln—The Nebraska Legislature is winding up its longest session in history and two men are particularly glad. The two men who have carried a heavy load during the entire six calendar months the lawmakers have been convened are Lt. Gov. Dwight Burney, Hartington, and Speaker Harry Pizer, North Platte.

They alternate at presiding over the debate of senators. This is an exacting and difficult job. By law, the lieutenant governor is the presiding officer of the Legislature. The speaker is elected by members, and this is a high honor among state senators. He relieves the presiding officer in governing.

level for 1959-61 was of somewhat more intensity than had been expected. Lawmakers scrapped over the budget for two days and preliminary skirmishing on how they were going to debate the measure consumed about as much time. After the smoke had cleared, the senators sent the bill on its route through the legislative mill, thus paving the way for adjournment. The bill calls for expenditure during the next two years of \$75.9 million from the general fund, 60 percent of which is composed of money raised through the state property tax.

Of the general fund figure, the budget committee estimated about \$43.5 would have to be raised through property taxes. The remainder comes from miscellaneous fees, licenses and charges. Big user from the general fund is the University of Nebraska, recommended for \$25 million for the next two years, up \$3.9 million from the current biennium which ends June 30.

**Study Approved**  
The Legislature approved 26-6 a study by the legislative council of all higher education in Nebraska. Under terms of the resolution authorizing the study, experts would be employed to aid a seven-member committee composed of state senators.

Because of the length of the current session of the Legislature, a bill had to be introduced in final days appropriating \$25,000 to pay expenses of operating until adjournment.

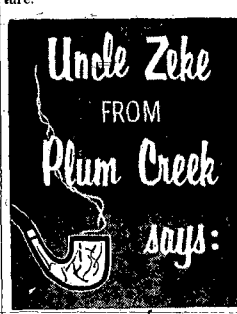
