Beef Cattle: Boom and Bust?

Slaughter of cattle in January-April was about seven percent below a year earlier and calf slaughter was 21 percent less. The combined reduction amounted to around 1.2 million head. This combined reduction amounted to dround 1.2 million head. cout-occurred even though the number of cattle on farms at the beginning of the year was up three percent from Jan. 1, 1958, equaling its previous record. Beef heifer, beef calf, and steer inventories were up sharply, each to a new high.

Cattle going to market this year have been the best and the worst — highly finished fed cattle, and cull animals. Fed cattle slaughter has averaged seven to nine percent above last year, and has made up an unusually large proportion of all cattle slaughtered—probably more than half. Cow slaughter in January-March was 24 percent below last year and the smallest for the period since 1952. It appears that almost all animals that offer any hope of returning a profit are being retained

All these are the characteristics of a cattle boom — small slaughter in the face of an increased inventory of classes available for slaughter, withholding of cows and calves, and an upswing in prices.

It brings with it the sobering prospect of a price decline in the future when marketings catch up with production.

Inventory Numbers Likely to Rise 4 to 5 Million

The January-April slaughter rate suggests that cattle numbers on farms could increase four to five million head by next January. An increase of that size would not be far below the rate of expansion in 1951 and 1952, when numbers rose six million each year.

A four to five million increase far exceeds the rate of growth in the U.S. population, It represents a substantial build-up in the beef supply for the future.

Yet the real danger in the cattle outlook lies not in the current rapid expansion itself, but in the likelihood that it will continue its momentum.

Much of the increase in cottle numbers to date has represented young stock held back. Of the three and one-half million added to herds last Jan. 1, only 19 percent were cows. A much larger part of the future increase will consist of cows. As cow numbers rise, the capacity for annual beef production also will increase.

Projections To 1964
Two alternatives projections illustrate how much difference the

herd expansion could make in beef supplies by 1964. In one projection, the expansion rate would begin to slow after this year. Numbers would be 110 million in 1964, of which 55½ million would be cows.

This is probably the slowest rate of expansion that can be expected if no severe drought occurs in the meantime. Beef output would reach about 17 billion pounds in 1964. This would provide 90 pounds for consumption per person, four and one-half pounds more than the 1956 record.

Such a beef supply would bring a sizeable reduction in prices of beef and of cattle, but it might not be unmanageable, as demand for beef seems still to be growing. But if cattle herds continue upward at a fast pace, with another four and one-half million added during 1960 and four million during 1961, the numbers peak would be 115 million, with 58.6 million cows, or five million more total cattle and 3.1 million more cows than under slover expansion. slower expansion.

Beef supplies in the near future would not differ greatly under rapid than under slower expansion, but by 1964 the more rapid rate would lift them to 94½ pounds per person. An output of this size would unquestionably result in a demoralized market for

These data demonstrate the utimate consequence to be expected if cyclical expansion proceeds too fast, as it gives some sign of doing. The next six to 12 months could be critical ones in the cyclical outlook for cattle.

Beef production will increase so much under even the slower expansion rate—and even more under faster rate—because the expansion of this new cycle begins from a high level. Cattle inventories fell only three million head in a two year reduction before turning upward again.

BRIEF and IMPORTANT

BEEF CATTLE: Prices of fed cattle during the rest of 1959 will follow much the same pattern as last year. Some weakness is expected during the summer months but without a major price break. Prices will strengthen this fall and remain fairly high for both fed cattle and feeders. The increase in cattle on feed is offset by the decline in cow and calf slaughter as the inventory build-

GAS TAX REFUND: Farmers can apply after June 30 for refund of the federal tax on gasoline used for farming purposes in the period July 1, 1958 through June 30, 1959. As in previous years, I.R.S. Form 2240 will be used. Forms will be mailed directly to farmers who filed applications last year. Others can get them from Internal Revenue Service and from County Agents. Records should be kept to substantiate claims. should be kept to substantiate claims.

HOGS: The high prices for the year will be reached in late June or early July. After that, a decline to a November low can be expected. Prices will average \$6-8 below 1958 levels this year but will not go as low as in 1955-56. The hog cycle and feed prices indicate further expansion and low hog prices in 1960.

CROPS: The late planting of corn and grain sorghum in Nebraska-this year increases the possibility of high moisture grain at harvest time. This would make it difficult to store and to obtain price support on these crops. This risk should be considered in making plans for the rest of the growing season. Farmers who can use crop dryers as a regular part of farming operations may want to buy before the last-minute rush. Some adjustments can also be made in livestock programs for feeding high-moisture grain before warm weather in the spring of 1960.
