

RAISE IN WATER RATES OK'D

Councilmen Set Meeting On Traffic

A hike in Wayne's municipal water rates was approved by city councilmen at a meeting last Tuesday night. The principal change in the rate structure hikes the minimum charge from \$1 to \$3 per quarter.

A change in the rates for the first 30,000 gallons used in a quarter will mean about a \$1 per quarter increase for all residents on their water bills.

The new rates per 1,000 gallons used in a quarter are: First 7,500, 40 cents; next 22,500, 20 cents; next 20,000, 15 cents; next 50,000, 10 cents, and eight cents for all in excess of 100,000 gallons.

Council members will meet with a representative of the State Highway department Tuesday afternoon to hear results of a traffic survey made in the city in recent months. The state representative is expected to give recommendations on speed limits, stop signs and other traffic problems in the city.

In other action last Tuesday the council took steps to investigate the possibility of establishing a zoning ordinance, building code and planning commission for the city. Councilman Wayne Marsh asked the council to get an estimate of the cost for such a project from city planning firms. He said the cost "will be well worth the money instead of attacking the problem piecemeal as we have in the past."

The park committee was authorized to proceed with improving facilities at the local baseball park. This will include installation of new rest rooms and dugouts. The rest room project was estimated at \$350.

The council also passed a resolution transferring \$700 from the general fund to pay a hospital bond payment due. The transfer was requested by County Treasurer Leona Bahde. The money will be returned to the general fund when sufficient tax money is collected.

Light Plant Supt. N. H. Brugger reported a new oil filter is being installed on the Worthington generating engine. The firm will pay half of the \$800 cost of the filter. In addition, the company has installed \$2,500 worth of new bearings in the engine at no cost to the city.

John Ream, Jr., presented a petition objecting to the establishment of a trailer court south of his home at 1222 Pearl. City Clerk Howard Witt told the council a request to establish the trailer court had been voluntarily withdrawn.

Oscar Peterson was granted a permit to move the tenant's house from the old Von Seeger farm to 525 East Seventh street. He was required to post a \$1,000 bond.

Kurt Otte and John Eining, Jr., were asked to prepare an estimate on cost of constructing three tennis courts west of the municipal swimming pool. The courts would be convertible to an ice skating rink in the winter.

Also expected at Tuesday's meeting is a report from the city's engineers on the light plant.

Open House Scheduled at Experiment Farm Sunday

Open house will be held at the NE Nebraska Experiment station from 2 to 5 p.m. Sunday, Supt. Dale Flowerday announced this week.

Flowerday said persons attending will be shown results of the oat drill box survey and oat and barley variety tests. Other buildings and facilities will also be open to the public.

Representatives of the Nebraska Crop Improvement association may be present to discuss the drill box survey, the superintendent said.

Summer Enrollment Now 845 at WSTC

Summer enrollment at WSTC shows a slight gain over last year, Registrar M. B. Childs announced this week.

The total of resident students this summer is 845 compared to 832 a year ago. The total does not include 93 in correspondence study or 219 in Wayne Prep kindergarten through eighth grade.

Only two previous years have had larger enrollment than this summer — 889 in 1956 and 847 in 1950.

The breakdown of this year's enrollment shows 89 freshmen, 232 sophomores, 245 juniors, 158 seniors and 121 graduates. Last year the graduate enrollment was 110.

Unlike the fall and spring terms, women far outnumber the men — 617 to 228. Most of the students are teachers working toward higher certificates or degrees.

Wayne Prep had 182 in the elementary classes through sixth grade and 37 in seventh and eighth. The school closed Friday for the summer.

Tour Planned to Point Up Problems Of Soil Fertility

A tour designed to point up problems and solutions of maintaining general soil fertility in eastern Nebraska has been scheduled July 27-28, it was announced today.

University of Nebraska extension and research agronomists will conduct the tour of experimental and demonstration crop plots and fields at various locations in the eastern third of the state. Some plots were established in Wayne county.

Clinton A. Hoover said attention will be focused particularly on corn, sorghums, soybeans and some types of pastures. Those going on the tour will be able to see differences in corn treated with minor elements, Hoover stated.

Another experimental planting involves placement of phosphorus as part of a starter fertilizer at various rates and in various locations with respect to corn kernel.

All farmers, fertilizer and seed dealers and other interested persons are welcome to participate in the tour.

Sorghum Applications For Certification Due Friday at Lincoln Office

Applications for certification of both hybrid and variety sorghums are due in the Nebraska Crop Improvement association office, Lincoln, Friday.

Application blanks for certification may be obtained at county extension offices.

Applications for second-crop alfalfa seed and red clover are also due Friday, Aug. 1 is the deadline for applications on warm-season grasses, sudangrass, soybeans, third-crop alfalfa seed and millet.

Registrants from 17 Towns Enroll For Music Camp

WSTC's annual summer music camp for high school musicians has 142 enrolled with two weeks to go before camp opens July 28.

Director Russel Anderson said every student is an enrolling every day and others are still welcome to sign up for the week-long camp.

Band and choral enrollment is open to students who will be in freshmen through senior classes next fall, plus 1953 graduates. Orchestra also is open to junior high students. The musicians will live in dormitories and eat at the college cafeteria.

Seventeen Nebraska towns are represented in the enrollment thus far: Bellevue, Carroll, Dakota City, Elgin, Franklin, Emerson, Hartington, Hooper, Mason City, Ponca, Pierce, Thurston, Wakefield, Wayne, Wausa, Omaha and Wynot. There are registrants from six Iowa towns and one each from Kansas and South Dakota.

Truck Damaged in Blaze Near Dixon

Dixon—A semi-trailer truck was damaged early Friday morning when it caught fire on Highway 116 between Dixon and Highway 20. Damage was estimated at \$1,500.

Dixon and Concord fire departments were called to extinguish the fire in the truck owned by Roy Landholm, West Point. The truck was enroute to Sioux City with a load of hogs. None of the livestock was lost.

The fire developed in one set of rear wheels and was discovered by driver Lyle Fenske, West Point, when he stopped to change a flat tire. He tried unsuccessfully to extinguish the fire and then went to the Louis Abts farm to telephone for aid.

Early College Grad Renews Friendships at Reunion

Assessor Reports County Valuation Up Five Percent

Wayne county's 1959 assessed valuation is about \$27,700,000, Assessor Henry Arp reported Wednesday morning. This represents about a five percent increase over a year ago.

Arp added that his office has still to receive railroad and franchise valuations from the state tax commissioner.

The 1959 total is approximately \$1¼ million over the 1958 valuation. Bulk of the increase came in higher personal property valuations, due largely to increased numbers of cattle on county farms. Individual personal property schedules increased better than 25 percent over a year ago.

All phases of the valuation showed increases with the exception of specials for railroads, pipelines and telephone companies. These dropped nine percent because the railroad spur between Wayne and Carroll was dropped from the tax rolls after it was salvaged. This caused a drop of about \$31,000.

As reported last week, county taxpayers will also pay more in grain and intangible taxes. Grain tax will total about \$23,600 compared to \$14,600 a year ago. Intangible taxes total about \$17,600 this year as against \$12,400 in 1958.

Arp's report showed over 600 more assessment schedules were completed in the county this year than last. The total of personal, business and special schedules in 1959 is 4,305, compared to 3,683 in 1958.

Expense of operating the assessor's office also increased with this added number of schedules. Office expenses totalled slightly over \$16,000 from last July 1 compared with \$13,100 the previous year.

Lightning Destroys Barn Near Wisner

Fire caused by a lightning bolt destroyed a large barn on the Kristian Kvols, Jr. farm one mile east of Wisner early last Tuesday morning.

The loss was estimated at \$7,200, most of which was covered by insurance. The loss included the building, farm equipment, six saddles, electric and workshop tools and baled hay stored in the barn. No livestock was lost.

The lightning knocked out electrical and phone service at the home and Kvols had to drive to Wisner to summon firemen. By the time they arrived, the barn was almost destroyed.

The firemen had the blaze under control within 30 minutes, but remained almost two hours at the farm. Some water had to be hauled from town to fight the blaze.

Wool Payments Total Over \$9,000 in County

Wayne county producers earned over \$9,000 in payments under the wool incentive program for the 1958 marketing year. ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell announced this week.

Checks were mailed to county farmers this week. They totalled about \$8,885. Another \$430 was deducted from payments for the promotion fund, bringing the total earned to county producers to about \$9,315.

About 65,390 pounds of shorn wool was sold by county producers in the 1958 marketing year. Net proceeds from these sales was about \$19,675. Payments under the wool incentive program were based on 70.3 percent of the net proceeds, less a promotion fund deduction of one cent per pound.

County producers marketed about 156,000 pounds of unshorn lambs. Incentive payments were made on the basis of \$1.02 per hundredweight.

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

Board Changes Pay Plan, Policy For Substitute Teachers

Salary increase and a change in policy for substitute teachers was approved Monday night by Wayne City school board.

Pay was raised to \$15 per day from \$10. Difficulty in obtaining substitute teachers was cited as the main reason for the increase.

Many women who are called on for substitute teaching are mothers of small children and must obtain baby sitters on short notice, Supt. E. W. Willert said.

This, coupled with the fact that substitute teacher's pay is much lower here than in comparable towns, make it difficult to get teachers on a substitute basis.

In cases where a substitute is needed for more than 20 consecutive teaching days, the board will

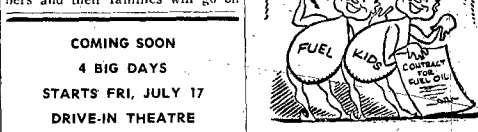
set a different salary after the twentieth day. Such cases would be rare, Willert said, but explained that on a short-term basis of just a few days the substitute is working on plans prepared by the regular teacher, while after a month the substitute is doing all the planning, grading, testing and other work normally done by the regular teacher.

In other business the board approved bills totaling \$2,976.72 and discussed a revised teachers' salary schedule. This action followed study of a tentative salary schedule submitted by a board of teachers at the April meeting of the board.

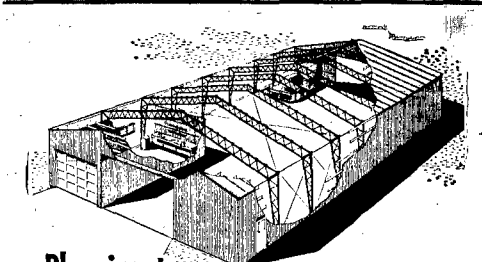



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Spice Cake Recipe Uses Buttermilk

If your picnic menu calls for a cake you will find this recipe for old fashioned spice cake sent to us by Ray Kling, local salesman of the Meadow Gold Dairy especially adaptable to carrying in a basket. It is a tender, nicely flavored cake and with nutmeg and spices which can be taken to a picnic site right in the pan in which it is baked.

Even the topping is a good "carrier," says Beatrice Cooke, director of the company's Chicago test kitchens where the recipe was created, for it is baked on the batter, making a buttery, crumbly coating.

Old-fashioned Picnic Spice Cake (12 by 9 in pan)

- 3 cups sifted cake flour
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
- 1 cup butter
- 2/3 cup sifted cake flour
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon cloves
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon allspice
- 1 cup buttermilk

Combine three cups flour and sugars; cut in butter until mixture resembles fine crumbs. Reserve one cup for topping. To remainder, add eggs; beat until light and fluffy. Sift remaining dry ingredients together; add to creamed mixture alternately with buttermilk, mixing well after each addition. Pour batter into greased pan and sprinkle crumb mixture on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes. When cool cut into 24 squares.
