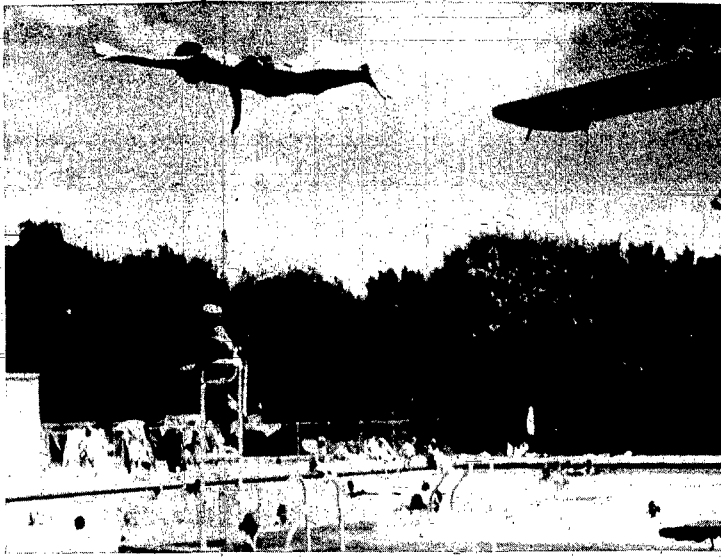

State Recommends Dropping Two Main Street Traffic Lights

Traffic Load Said Too Low

Recommendations for alteration of Wayne's traffic system were presented to city council members at an informal meeting with R. L. Meyer, state traffic engineer, Tuesday afternoon at Hotel Morrison.

The engineer's report was made in an effort to improve and modernize the traffic-carrying features of the street system in the city. It can also be used in planning future improvements.

The significant recommendations by the state in its traffic engineering survey were:

- 1) Revision of the existing system of speed limits, retaining the present 25-mile limit in the congested downtown area but raising the limit to 30 miles per hour in outlying areas.
- 2) Removal of the stop lights at Second and Fourth street intersections with Main street and modernization of the Third and Main signal through installation of another light.
- 3) Reconstruction of the Seventh and Main streets intersection to

provide adequate space for highway travel.

4) Revision of parking in the downtown area to make more sight distance available to cross-street motorists and provide two lanes of approach to traffic signals. This would also include reduction of angle parking on side streets to 30 degrees as used on Main street.

5) Removal of the flashing school stop at Eleventh and Main streets and installation of the state-standard school-lane-signing series. The same signing series would also be used at Tenth and Logan streets and Seventh and Walnut streets.

6) Establishing additional preferential streets along which all side street approaches would be controlled by stop signs. Third, Lincoln, Windom and Tenth or Eleventh streets were suggested.

Meyer told the council all the recommendations "are for the common good on the basis of facts determined by this traffic survey. They may disagree with some of the present practices which have come to be semi-sacred."

The state engineer said a bulk of the country's current traffic problems are the result of too many traffic signs. "Too many

of them have come to mean nothing," he stated. "You can fool a motorist only once or twice; then he'll disregard a sign which means nothing."

Mayor Willard Wiltse questioned Meyer on the reconstruction of the Seventh and Main intersection. Meyer replied that the law does not allow the state to share the expense of construction in cities, but advised the council to meet with District Engineer George Koster, Norfolk, and talk with the State Highway department about possible solutions to the current congestion problem.

The traffic survey conducted by the state consisted of five major elements of investigation. They were: 1) A sampling of vehicle speeds at several different locations on Highways 15 and 25 in the city; 2) study of the spacing of vehicles on Main street near the school stop at Eleventh; 3) a series of manual and mechanical counts of vehicle and pedestrian volumes along Main street; 4) a review of accident records in Wayne for a three-year period as reported to the State Accident Records bureau; and 5) a sampling of parking habits

Two school reorganization plans involving Wayne county districts were not approved at a meeting of the State Reorganization committee Tuesday. Another was approved.

The two plans which were not approved would attach District 20 to District 51 and District 37 to District 6. County Supt. Gladys Porter had not received reasons for the state disapproval at press time Wednesday. Hubert Wolfe, acting secretary for the State committee, could not be reached for comment.

The plan approved would attach Districts 39 and 62, Wayne county, to Cedar County District 45. (Randolph). Both districts have just completed five-year contracts with Randolph during which time no school was held in either district. Petitions requesting the merger were signed by about 90 percent of voters in the districts.

Feb. 14, 1913 he was married to Nina Kruse. They were the parents of seven children. In 1949 they moved into Wayne. Mr. Dunklau was confirmed in 1897 in the Immanuel Lutheran church, Laurel. He was a member of the Wayne Redeemer Lutheran church.

He was preceded in death by a sister, Mrs. Henry Mau, sr. Survivors include the widow, two daughters, Mrs. Harvey Kammann, Holdrege; Mrs. Eldin Roberts, Wayne; five sons, Lloyd, Randolph, and Edward, Marvin, Kenneth and Alden, Wayne; and 21 grandchildren.

Crop Outlook Good as Oats Harvest Begins



SCENES LIKE THAT pictured above were fairly common in NE Nebraska this week as the oats harvest got underway. Wilbur Nolte is pictured above withdrawing his field 3 1/2 miles northwest of Wayne. He reported his oats crop as spotty, an opinion reflected by Ass't County Agent Everette Rieck for most of the county. Rieck added, however, that NE Nebraska oats were the best he saw following a 2,500-mile trip to Arkansas, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Illinois and Missouri. Corn throughout Wayne county looks good. Some bottom fields are starting to tassel. Rieck warned farmers that the second brood corn barbers are now emerging from the egg stage. He recommended spraying with a five percent DDT solution at 20 pounds per acre when 50 to 70 percent of corn plants in the field show pin holes in leaves. Work is also well along on the second cutting of alfalfa in most parts of Wayne county.

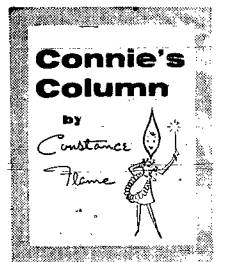

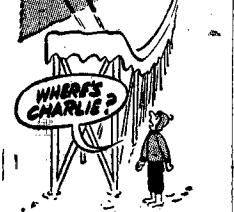
