


Farmers Can Apply For Gas Tax Refund

Farmers and ranchers can apply hetween July 1 and Oct. 1 for a refund of Federal tax on gasoline used for farming purposes from July 1, 1958 to June 30, 1959.

The Federal tax on gasoline is now three cents per gallon. The procedure is the same as in previous years. Farmers who filed claims last year will receive Form 2240 and instructions by mail from the Internal Revenue service. New farmers can

botain forms from the county extension office.

This refund is allowed on gasoline used on a farm or ranch for crop production, handling and condition and caring for livestock. When custom work is done on the farm, the refund is claimed by the farmer who hires the work done, not by the custom operator whose charges include the entire cost of the gasoline,

Claims can be filed only by the owner, tenant or operator of a farm. A refund cannot be claimed following a heart attack.






