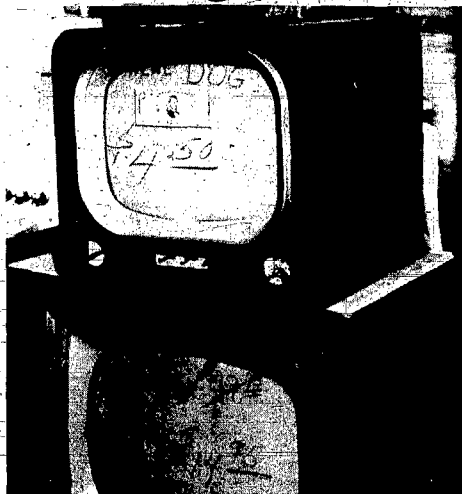


Stoppers Jam Sidewalks During Annual Dog Days Sale Friday



CRAZY BARGAINS were common in Wayne Friday as merchants cooperated to stage their annual Dog Days promotion. Buyers in Northeast Nebraska took forward each year to taking advantage of ridiculously low prices asked for "dog" merchandise. Crowds

began jamming the sidewalks before 8 a.m. to wait for merchandise to be moved to the sidewalk display racks and get first choice of items. An extreme example of the bargains offered Friday was this television set (center) for sale at Swanson TV. The set was

marked "a real dog" and was priced at \$4.50 but included a \$5 bill taped to the picture tube. At the height of the sale, about 10:30 a.m. sidewalks were so crowded that foot traffic often was nearly impossible. Street scenes here show the east side of Main

street north from Second. The crowd took on a holiday atmosphere as buyers vied for items that took their fancy and merchants made further markdowns on slow-moving merchandise.

COUNTY FAIR TO OPEN MONDAY

Sewer Use Fee Rates Studied At Tuesday Council Meeting

Would Pay Cost of City Sewer Plant

Various rate structures for a proposed sewer use fee were considered by the Wayne city council at a meeting Tuesday night. The fee is being studied for the possibility of creating a fund to defray costs for future construction of sewage disposal plant. Three suggestions for rates were proposed to the council by an Omaha bonding firm, which has been hired to serve as fiscal agents for the city. A majority of the council appeared to favor a fee based on a percentage of the winter quarter water bill. Under this method the sewer use fee for a home owner whose winter quarter water bill was \$4.50 would be \$2.25 if a 50 percent rate is established. The other suggestions by the bonding firm were minimums of \$1.50 and \$3 per month based on the amount of water used. The latter two methods would raise considerably larger amounts each year. Jack Reece, the bonding firm representative, told the council it

should not set the rate too low in order to avoid hitting local residents with a heavy fee when the disposal plant is eventually constructed. Cost for the disposal plant was estimated at \$250,000. The council estimated a rate based on 50 percent of the winter quarter water bills would raise about \$12,000 per year.

In other action the council purchased a new boiler for the city auditorium. Tiedtke Plumbing and Heating submitted the only bid of \$3,986 for the project. The amount would be reduced by \$800 if the present burner firing the boiler can be used. Council members will schedule a meeting with the State Aeronautics commission to discuss future improvements at the local airport. The commission wrote the city that funds are available for such work. They estimated cost of blacktopping the main runway here at \$50,000. Only one-fourth of the cost would be paid by the city. The remainder would be paid by the State and Federal governments.

Specifications and estimated costs for proposed tennis courts at the swimming pool park will probably be studied at the council's Aug. 25 meeting. Plans for the courts, which would convert to a winter ice skating rink,

were viewed by the council Tuesday. A problem of water drainage at First and Main street was also referred to the engineers when a delegation of merchants in the area appeared before the council. Part of the project was completed two years ago but further enlargement of the storm sewers draining the area is felt necessary to prevent flooding of Main street basements.

An ordinance providing for licensing of bingo games in the city was approved. It had been requested earlier by St. Mary's church, which recently applied for a state bingo license. A petition was received from Wayne Kiwanis club members urging the council to take steps for fluoridation of the city's water supply. No action was taken on the petition.

Mayor Willard Wiltse reappointed R. M. Olds to a five-year term on the Library board. Bob Johnson was named to succeed Dave Ewing, who resigned.

Rifles for Thomas Lute Planned at Laurel Friday. Funeral services for Thomas Lute Laurel, will be held at 2 p.m. Friday at the Laurel Methodist church. Mr. Lute died Tuesday night at the Wayne hospital.

Corn Support Set At \$1.05 for '59

Prices for the 1959 corn crop will be supported in Wayne county at an average of \$1.05 per bushel, ASC Chairman Carl Sundell announced today. Average county rates are based on the national average price of \$1.12 per bushel announced last February, with adjustments for location and historical price patterns. Only the \$1.05 rate will be used in the county this year. Rates last year were \$1.29 per bushel for corn produced within the farm allotment and 99 cents for non-compliance corn. As approved by 71.2 percent of growers voting in a referendum last November, the corn acreage allotments and the commercial corn-producing area of earlier programs are not in effect for the 1959 program.

As in the past, corn prices support in 1959 will be carried out through farm and warehouse storage loans and purchase agreements.

Nebraska Tourists Pooh-Pooh Highway Report by AAA in Pan-American Travels

Two NE Nebraskans were members of a trio which received national publicity this week when they protested a recommendation against travel over the Pan-American highway beyond Mexico City.

The three bearded young men Clifford Peters, 25, Wakefield; Donald "Butch" Wightman, 20, Wayne; and Robert Shockley, 27, Paxton, drove their 1947 second-hand panel truck across the Guatemalan frontier into El Salvador in protest to an American Automobile association report.

The AAA report called travel beyond Mexico City and Panama a nightmare of broken springs, rivers without bridges and extremely bad roads.

Peters, a Wynot high school teacher, said the trio didn't even have a flat tire, that authorities were helpful, that the route is worth seeing and that "every one is very friendly and wants to help."

He also said they had expected to find steaming jungles and snakes in Guatemala but that the good-looking girls took their minds off all else.

The trio made the trip from Wayne in the Guatemala-El Salvador frontier in one week, with a two-day stopover in Mexico City. Thus far, the jaunt has cost \$70. They will continue their travels to Costa Rica and plan on getting back here about Aug. 29.

Normal Board Approves Financing for New Dorm

A trust agreement to provide tax-free financing of \$73,300,000 dormitory project at WSTC has been approved by the State Normal board. The dormitory will cost about \$950,000. The remainder of the fund would be used for furnishings. The dormitory will house 328 men and is to be finished by Sept. 1, 1960.

Announce Extended Corn Loan Program

Another year's extension of farm-stored loans on 1955-crop corn now under extended resale was announced today by County ASC Chairman Carl Sundell. Storage payment will be 16 cents per bushel for the full year of 1959. The program will be prorated for corn redeemed prior to that date.

Predict 100 4-H Entries In Calf Show

Officials were busy with last-minute details this week in preparation for the Monday opening of the annual Wayne county fair. The three-day event will run through Wednesday.

Work will be completed today on the new pole-type building to house overflow entries in the 4-H beef division. County Agent Harold Ingalls said he expects at least 100 entries in this class, about the same as last year when a tent was erected to handle the calves.

Monday will be entry day with all judging slated for Tuesday. Don Engle, University of Nebraska livestock specialist, will judge baby beeves and open class beef. Robert Weir, Hartington, will judge dairy animals. Archie White, Fremont, will judge swine and C. H. Morris, Carroll, will judge sheep.

Tuesday night prize-winning livestock will be paraded before the grandstand at 7, led by the Winside band and VFW and American Legion color guards.

Monday night fair-goers will see the Queen of the Fair selected in a Wayne Jaycees-sponsored contest to select an entrant for the state contest at Lincoln.

Tuesday and Wednesday night programs will feature Brenda Lee, recording and television star, in grandstand performances. Brenda, a teen-age singer who is playing to record crowds throughout the nation, will have a different show each night.

Election Planned Friday Night on New Schoolhouse

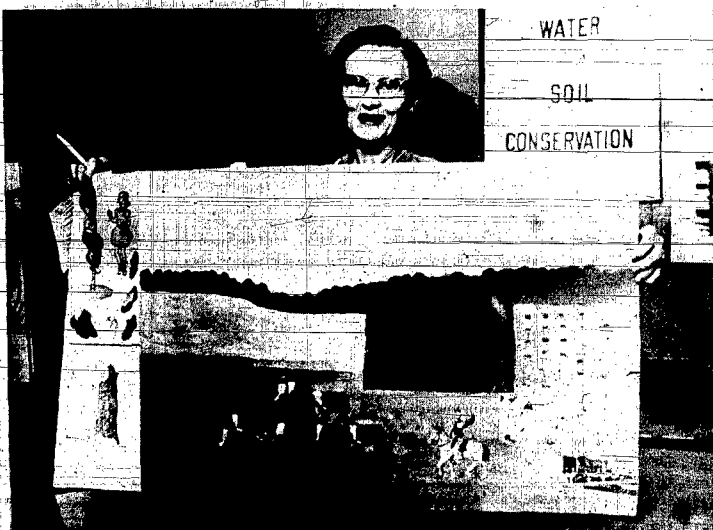
School District 51 patrons will vote Friday whether to authorize a special tax to construct a new schoolhouse and are also expected to pick a site for the school if the tax is approved.

The election is scheduled at 8 p.m. in the old District 20 school house. County Supt. Gladys Porter declared Districts 20 and 51 merged following a hearing at her office Saturday morning. The new district will be known as District 51.

Hearings on two other schools are scheduled at the courthouse Saturday. Mrs. Porter and Bess Waring, Stanton county superintendent, will conduct a hearing at 10 a.m. on the dissolution of District 85 under the five-year contracting law. Bulk of the district would be attached to District 9 (Hoskins).

The 10:15 hearing will be on the merger of District 37 to District 5. Mrs. Porter will hold this hearing to determine the sufficiency of petitions requesting the merger filed by eligible electors in the two districts.

Contracts under the conservation reserve may run for as long as 10 years. During the time of the contract the farmer will receive an annual rental payment on the reserved land for the life of the contract. He will also receive cost sharing help in establishing an approved conservation practice.
For Nebraska the basic per-acre rate under the 1960 program is \$12.50, the same as the 1959 program.

Wool Vote Ballots To County Farmers Aug. 20 - Sundell

Ballots for voting in the September referendum on the lamb and wool marketing development program will be mailed to Wayne county producers Aug. 20. ASC Chairman Carl Sundell announced today.

The referendum will determine whether or not deductions will continue to be made from producer payments earned under the wool incentive program. Funds collected are used by the American Sheep Producers Council to carry out a program of advertising, promotion and related activities under an agreement with the secretary of agriculture.

The agreement, which has been in effect since the 1955 marketing year, will be extended three years if approved in the September referendum. Producers having two-thirds of the volume of production represented in the referendum must approve if the agreement is to be extended.

Deductions from wool and lamb payments under the new agreement would not exceed one cent per pound for shorn wool and five cents per hundredweight for unshorn lambs. Deductions at these rates have been made from payments for each marketing year since 1955.

Producers may vote throughout September. The entire month has been designated as the voting period to encourage as large a turnout as possible. Any producer who believes he is eligible to vote and does not receive a ballot should get in touch with the county ASC office.

To be counted, ballots must be received in the county ASC office not later than Sept. 30. Sundell urged producers to mark and return their ballots as soon as they are received.

Aug. 24 Scheduled As Start for 1960 Soil Bank Signup

Farmers who wish to put cropland in the soil bank's 1960 conservation reserve must ask the county ASC committee to set a basic annual rate per acre for the offered land. Chairman Carl Sundell said today.

The period for filing such requests is Aug. 24 through Sept. 10. No requests will be accepted after Sept. 10, Sundell emphasized.

In setting the basic annual per-acre rate for land offered, the county committee will take into consideration the productivity of the land and the rate will be limited to the local fair rental value of the land, based on the crops harvested from it during the past five years.

When all-eligible cropland on the farm is offered for the conservation reserve, the rate will generally be set 10 percent higher than the rate for only part of the eligible land.

After the basic rate has been determined, the farmer may apply for a contract at any figure below the basic rate established for the land offered in the request for rates. If necessary, a priority system will be used to determine which offers are accepted.

Farmers who applied for but could not be offered contracts in 1959 because of lack of funds will be given first consideration for contracts under the 1960 program if they are otherwise eligible. Five Wayne county farmers could not

1/2 teaspoon salt
1-6-oz. can tomato paste
1-7-oz. can tuna, drained; flaked
2 tablespoons finely chopped parsley

Cook onion in butter in top of double boiler until tender. Blend in flour. Gradually stir in skim milk, add onion and seasonings. Cook over hot water until slightly thickened. Stir in tomato paste and tuna. Heat until hot. Serve immediately. Garnish with egg whites with parsley.

Capitol News

Highway Slowdown Could Cut Into Every Corner of State

LINCOLN — Slowdown of the highway building program could reach economically into all corners of Nebraska.

This was the reason for immediate concern in the state's capital when the House Ways and Means committee in Washington said there ought to be a cutback in Federal spending from the trust fund.

State Engineer Roy Cochran temporarily halted all obligations of Federal money until the Congress had made up its mind on the rate of spending.

An ironic twist to the matter is that the trust fund is short \$400 million—exactly the amount of funds allocated by Congress last year for a "crash" road program.

Contractors who do Nebraska road work are vitally concerned. They had over-estimated the speed of highway work anyway and many are loaded with equipment and men.

The longer the problem continues without a solution the closer many contractors come to financial trouble. Also affected are the hundreds of workers in related cement and petroleum industries who furnish material for road building.

Three Nebraska railroads served notice they will let the State Supreme Court decide whether they are valued too high for tax purposes.

Union Pacific attorneys claim the line is assessed \$19.3 million too high. Burlington representatives say their over-assessment is \$14.1 million and the Northwestern said it is valued at \$3.3 too much.
