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Dixon County Fair Opening Set Wednesday at Concord

Record Enrollment Expected at WSTC For '59-60 Term

A record number of 4-H entries is expected for the annual Dixon county fair next week. Secretary Roy E. Johnson announced today. The fair will open Wednesday at the Dixon county fair grounds in Concord. It will continue through next Friday. Johnson said the 4-H hog entries should be well over any previous total. About 80 calves will compete in the 4-H baby beef show. Wednesday is scheduled as entry and general preparation day. Gates will be thrown open to the public at 8 next Thursday morning. Judging will start at 9 a.m. Exhibits and departments will be open to the public at 11. Thursday afternoon's program will open at 1 p.m., with the flag raising ceremony by the Auen Legion post and high school band. The Emerson high school band will play a concert at 1:30. A 4-H talent program is planned at 2. It will be followed by a horse show which offers cash and ribbon prizes. Closing the program will be a baseball game between the Emerson and Laurel Junior Legion teams. The Emerson band will play another concert at 7 p.m. Thursday. The grandstand show at 8 will feature a 4-H pantomime and skit and vocal selections by the Dixon County Extension chorus. Judging of 4-H demonstrations will be held at 9 a.m., Friday. The song contest is scheduled at 4 p.m. The girls' judging will be held at 9 a.m., Friday and the dress revue at 4 p.m. Friday's boys' work judging will also be at 9 a.m. A tractor derby is scheduled at 11. Friday afternoon the Laurel high school band will play the opening concert at 1 p.m. Flag raising will be at 1:15. The grand parade of prize-winning livestock is scheduled at 1:30. It will be followed by the 4-H style show and another horse show. The Wakefield and Allen Junior Legion teams will play a game at 3 p.m. The Laurel band will play again Friday night. The grandstand show at 8 will feature a skit, "Jolly-Joe," by county 4-H and extension clubs. A carnival, rides and concessions will provide added entertainment Thursday and Friday.

District 51 Votes To Build School

School District 51 patrons voted to purchase a site and construct a new building Friday. The action was approved in a special meeting at the district's school. Construction of the new three-room school is expected to start in the near future. It will contain about 1,900 square feet and the cost is estimated at \$15,000. It will be built on land purchased from Marvin Dunklau one mile east of the old District 51 school on Highway 25. The patrons voted a special tax of 3.25 mills to pay for the new building. The tax will be levied 10 years. Construction of the building is expected to be completed in two or three months. School will be held in the old District 20 school until then. 11-Year-Old Youth Killed Thursday in Auto Accident; Services Held Monday

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the First Baptist church for David L. Erdmann, 11, Wayne county's first traffic victim of 1959. Young Erdmann was killed about 6:15 p.m. Thursday when hit by a car driven by Alvin B. Peterson, Wayne, on Highway 15 about 1/4 mile north of town. The youth darted across the highway and was struck by the right front fender of the Peterson car and hurled 37 feet into a ditch on the west side of the road. Brian Erdmann, 8, tried unsuccessfully to warn his brother of the approaching car. Sheriff Don Weible, County Attorney Charles McDermott and State Patrol Lt. Harry Birt investigated the accident. The opinion of the authorities was that there was no negligence on the part of Peterson. Skid marks from the Peterson car measured about 146 feet. The two Erdmann boys were walking along the road looking for a garter snake when the accident occurred. They had just declined a ride home with RayDelle Erxleben, who stopped his car a short distance north of the youths. Peterson, who was driving south, said the boys appeared to dart

from behind the Erxleben car. He applied his brakes and swerved to the left in a last minute attempt to avoid hitting the youth. Rev. Russell Dackel officiated at Monday's services for the Erdmann boy. W. C. Swanson sang "Nearer My God to Thee" and "Safe in The Arms of Jesus," accompanied by Mrs. Swanson. Pallbearers were Dale J. Paul and Dale John Erdmann, Mark Grein, Nyle Erxleben and Morris Boeckenhauer. Burial was in Greenwood cemetery. David Lee Erdmann, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Erdmann, was born July 11, 1948 at Wayne. He attended Wayne Prep. Survivors include his parents; two sisters, Linda and Carol; two brothers, Bryan and Keven; and his grandfathers, Stief, Hebron, and A. E. Davidson, Wayne.

District Dissolved at Public Hearing Saturday

Mrs. Porter also learned this week that Districts 38 and 82 have been annexed to Randolph through proceedings before the Cedar county organization committee.

Superintendent Names Winners In Fair Exhibit

Winners in the school exhibit at the Wayne county fair were announced Monday by County Supt. Gladys M. Porter. First prize winners were Wayne High in the town division, District 1, taught by Mrs. Irene Hamilton, in the rural and St. Mary's, Wayne, in the non-public category.

Judging the exhibits was Roscoe Shields, Jr., University of Nebraska assistant art coordinator. Judging was based on craftsmanship, learning process, creativity and originality and clearness and completeness. Mrs. Porter said 51 superior ratings were given to rural entries, 19 to town entries and nine to non-public exhibits.

Winside and Hoskins trailed Wayne High in the town division. Second and third, respectively, in the non-public division were Trinity Lutheran, Altona, and Trinity Lutheran, Hoskins. Trailing District 1 in the rural division were District 6, taught by Mrs. Althea Johnson, and District 88, taught by Marcia Witmer. Districts 41, 46 and 64 received honorable mention.

Free High Levy Lower Despite Higher Rate

Wayne county's 1959 free high school tuition levy will be about half a mill lower than 1958 despite the fact free high was hiked to \$15 a week by the Legislature. County Clerk C. A. Bard said Tuesday the 1959 levy will be 6.14 mills compared to 6.54 a year ago. Supt. Gladys Porter said she had to increase her request for funds by only \$1,000 because there are over 50 fewer free high students. Another reason for the reduction is an increase of about \$2 million in the county's assessed valuation.

Wayne's Tax Levy Increase 23 Percent; Up 1 1/2 Mills

Taxpayers in three of the four Wayne county towns will face tax increases varying from nine to 23 percent for 1959. County Clerk C. A. Bard said this week. The increases will come in Wayne, Carroll and Hoskins. Winside taxpayers, on the other hand, will be greeted with a 10 percent reduction. Wayne's increase will be the largest of the three jumps, largely because of the necessity of levying for two years' payments on the \$225,000 school bond issue. This was brought about by the fact the bond due dates are in March, prior to the time the bulk of tax money is collected. Wayne's 1959 levy will be 61.74 mills compared with 50.08 last year. It includes increases in the state and county levies. The only reduction, which is true in all levies, is a 7-mill drop in the county levy. The state levy is up about half a mill. The Wayne city levy increases

1.3 mills. The school levy, which also is levied in Carroll, is 18.04 mills compared to 15.95 last year. In addition there is an 8.60 levy for the school bond issue in both Wayne and Carroll. The total increase in levy for Wayne is 11.66 mills. This means city taxpayers will pay \$11.66 more for each \$1,000 of assessed valuation. Thus, taxes on a house assessed at \$3,000 would increase about \$35. Carroll residents will pay \$10.36 more for each \$1,000 of valuation. This year's Carroll levy is 79.24 mills. The 1958 levy was 68.88 mills. Both figures are still well below the 100-mill levy which the village had prior to consolidation with the Wayne school district. The Carroll increase is in the state and school levies. The village levy remained at 38 mills. The total levy hike represents a 15 percent increase. See TAX LEVIES — page 4.

Sept. 30 Deadline For Applications On Dependent Pay

Dependents of disabled workers may lose monthly Social Security benefit checks if they do not file an application for dependents' benefit payments by Sept. 30, Norfolk Kittelson said this week.

When disabled workers become entitled to monthly benefit payments, their children under age 18, if these children became, totally disabled before age 18, wife regardless of her age if she has in her care children who are eligible for dependents' benefits, a wife at age 62 whether or not she has children in her care or a dependent husband age 65 may also receive benefit payments.

September, 1958 was the first month in which payments of this type could be made.

Dependents who were eligible in September, 1958, have until Sept. 30, 1959 to file for payments retroactive to September, 1958. Thereafter, they will lose a months payment for every month they delay filing, Kittelson said.

Capitol News

Behind-the-Scenes Activity Highlights the State Politics

LINCOLN—There is considerable behind-the-scenes activity in the Democratic party in Nebraska. This likely will continue for a while until candidates begin getting their bids in for the U. S. Senate and governor.

Gov. Ralph Brooks has been talked about as a possible candidate for the Senate and his administrative assistant, Robert Conrad, for the governor's post. Neither flatly denied the reports. It is obvious that there is considerable enthusiasm in the party, which also is in better financial position than in two decades.

Other behind-the-scenes talk centers around the favorite national figure in the presidential picture. It appears, from talking with Democratic leaders, that Sen. John Kennedy, Massachusetts, plans to enter the Nebraska preferential primary.

Kennedy himself has indicated this and stated further that he considers Nebraska a "key" state in the presidential picture for 1960. The reasons, Kennedy says, include its location geographically, the fact the state has both agriculture and industry and that it has indicated a trend to the Democratic party.

Another important factor is that delegates to national party conventions from Nebraska are not bound by law to support the winner in the state's preferential primary.

Bernard Boyle, Democratic national committee man, who is probably the most powerful man in the party in the state, says as far as he knows no Democratic leaders in Nebraska have committed themselves to support any candidate.

Boyle held an informal gathering for Kennedy in Omaha and says he will do the same for other candi-

dates who indicate an interest in such an event.

Boyles Dies

Owen Boyles, secretary of the State Highway Commission, died in Lincoln after a short illness. The 53-year-old Boyles, formerly had been director of the motor vehicle division of the State Highway Department from 1941 until 1956 when he joined the commission, except for a brief spell in private business. Born at Ericson, Boyles was a former Wheeler county clerk and was widely known in the motor vehicle world in Nebraska.

Legislature Cost

It cost 19 percent more to run the 1959 Legislature than the one two years earlier. Figures compiled by Clerk Hugo Sbr showed the \$241,600 tab for 1959 was only slightly higher than the cost of the last two-house meeting in 1955, when the bill was \$202,593. The increase was due to more employees, longer session, more bills and higher pay for workers. Cost of material also was higher.

No Special Session

There is no need for a special session of the Legislature to set up a clearing house in the Capitol for state banking business. That's the conclusion of Gov. Ralph G. Brooks to a suggestion by State Sen. Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff.

Carpenter claimed a state clearing house would give Nebraska \$20 million more to invest in bonds that could put money into the state general fund. But the governor argued that the six banks now clearing state warrants and the federal reserve system are adequate.

Establishment of a state clearing house would be too expensive and not do the job any better, Brooks noted. He also said his administra-

tion, under State Treasurer Richard Larsen, already had invested more money in bonds than any other administration.

Concluded the governor: "Above all, however, we are not going to jeopardize the ability of the state to transact its business by curtailing its supply of cash to a degree which would prevent proper business procedures."

Mental Clinic

The problem of the mental health clinic at Scottsbluff has temporarily been solved after a fuss involving the two Democratic members of the State Board of Control.

The board's chairman, Charles Leeman, and Mrs. Ethel Kirwin, Scottsbluff, a member, got into a public scrap over who caused loss of the clinic.

Mrs. Kirwin blamed Dr. Cecil Witson, state mental health director, for "unwise" planning in opening a clinic that could not be staffed because of the shortage of psychiatrists. Leeman blamed the Legislature's budget committee and said Witson is doing a good job.

The clinic closed July 1. But Leeman announced that a psychiatrist from the Nebraska Psychiatric Institute, Omaha, would visit Scottsbluff weekly using funds from the Institute's Community Services unit.

Farm News and Views... Agricultural Specialists Feel Increase In Fall Swine Farrowings Bound to Occur

MILK PRODUCTION and consumption are holding in a close balance this year, say agricultural editors. Heavy culling of dairy cows is the main reason. With high feed prices farmers have found it more profitable to sell marginal milkers and keep only the best cows. All this is resulting in milk prices generally higher than a year ago.

With this situation expected to continue for some time, you'll be wise to take advantage of the situation and make needed changes in your dairy operation now. Cow pools are currently attracting interest, but most observers agree they will not replace the well-run, owner-operated dairy farm. If your annual production per cow is now above 7,500 pounds you stand a good chance of remaining competitive if continued improvements are made.

INDICATED INCREASE in fall farrowings of nine percent is bound to occur, agricultural economists predict. First the hog-corn ratio has been high enough in recent months to prevent real pessimism among farmers. In mid-July 100 pounds of live hogs would buy nearly 12 bushels of corn, indicating some profits are still being made.

Also a survey of farm managers indicates farmers are "holding tight." There's little interest in breeding stock but no one seems anxious to sell either.

Many producers seem to feel the government intentions estimate of a nine percent increase won't pan out. Odds are that if you are one of these, you'll be wrong. It may be wise to plan accordingly.

County Agent's Column... Serious Drought Conditions May Require Feed Importation; Seeking Hay for Sale

A request has come from Doyle Busby, South Dakota state department of agriculture, asking for names of farmers having hay for sale.

Farmers interested in selling hay are asked to inform the County Extension office, Wayne, as to the kind and amount to be offered. This listing will be forwarded to the South Dakota department of agriculture.

Busby says that serious drought conditions in much of South Dakota will necessitate importation of feed if livestock breeding herds are to be maintained.

Know Your Buy Farmers, Don't guess—ask for performance records on the next boar you purchase. This is the advice which Don Engle, swine specialist, gave to farmers attending a swine backfat probing demonstration at the Harold Wade farm last week. He says improvement within a herd can come only by using superior performing seed stock.

Since a sire is half the herd, Accept boars with birth, Engle suggests. There are three important economic traits to look at in a sire, the University specialist said. They are growth rate, backfat thickness and efficiency of gain.

Some rules of thumb: Select a sire that has made rapid growth to 200 pounds. A minimum to keep in mind is 200 pounds weight at 154 days or 1.3 pounds daily gain from birth, Engle suggests.

Feed efficiency data, although important, may not always be available. Efficient-gaining boars should produce 100 pounds gain on 300 pounds feed or less. Generally, the rapid-growing, lean boars are efficient feed converters.



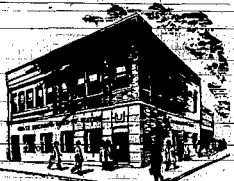

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
