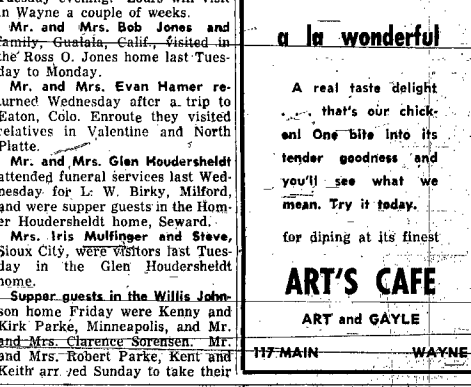

# Expect 100 to Report for Opening Practice Tuesday

Football practice opens Tuesday at Wayne State and coaches expect at least 100 prospects to report, about 18 of them lettermen.

New Head Coach Gwynn Christensen lists 36 returning squad members, plus about 65 freshmen and transfers. Other hopefuls who want a crack at the squad should report to the stadium Monday afternoon when equipment will be checked out and physical examinations given.

With those formalities done, a rugged grind of two-a-day practice will begin Tuesday—the first day permitted under Nebraska College conference rules.

The first game will take the Wildcats to Sioux Falls for a night tilt with Augustana college Sept. 12. That's two days before college classes start.

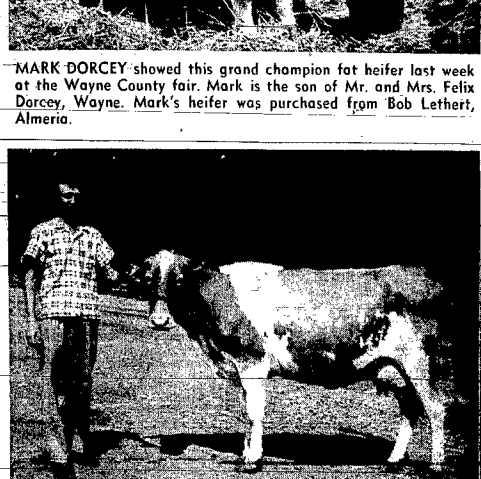
