## Activity Resumes at WSTC; Student Reception Tonight

Wayne State's campus came suddenly to life Tuesday after the August lull as hundreds of students checked in and settled in their dormitory rooms. For some 400 freshmen the arrival began a busy and sometimes bewildering round of orientation activities. The freshmen and new students took a series of placement tests Wednesday to show their aptitudes in English, mathematics and other subjects. Today and Friday new students will be introduced to various phases of campus life. Freshmen will meet the faculty in the annual reception today at 7:30 p.m. in the student union lounge. A similar reception for upperclassmen is planned Monday night. Upperclassmen will enroll Friday and freshmen Saturday. Then the important business of classes begins Monday. The annual president's convocation is scheduled at 10 a.m. Tuesday in the Willow bowl. Seventeen new faculty members were introduced to the staff Tuesday.

Among the student arrivals is Kirsten Larsen, Denmark, who will assist in teaching foreign languages at Wayne Prep. She comes to WSTC with high recommendations from Val Peterson, ambassador to Denmark and a WSTC graduate. Traffic congestion posed a problem at times this week as dozens of drivers tried to find a way through the campus to parking places. Two paving projects are still underway on the campus. When both paving jobs are done, new traffic rules and parking stalls will be established. Major change will be reversing flow of one-way traffic through the campus. The new road at Twelfth street will serve as the college entrance. The present entry-exit just north of Thirteenth street will become an exit only. Traffic on the east side of Wayne Prep will remain southbound. Traffic will be routed in both directions on the north campus road by the Rice auditorium.

## Charles Sherman Rites Held in Wakefield Church

Charles Samuel Sherman was born Dec. 9, 1880 in Illinois. When an infant, he came with his parents in a covered wagon to Ponca, where he grew to manhood. He farmed for several years near Ponca and then owned and operated a store at Table. He lived in Dixon for a time before moving to Concord in 1919 where he served as cashier of the Farmers' State bank until 1932. He then moved to Wakefield to become a partner of Henning Hallin, real estate broker. He served as Concord mayor several years and was a charter member of the fair board.

While living in Dixon, Mr. Sherman was a member of the Methodist church. Later in Wakefield, he joined the Presbyterian church. He was a member of the Laurel Masonic lodge and received his master's pin in 1931. Jan. 24, 1906 he married Minnie B. Lisle at Ponca. They observed their golden anniversary in 1956. Besides his widow, he is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Norman Anderson, Wakefield; a sister, Mrs. Emil Lindell, Arnold, and eight grandchildren.

## Big Feed Supply Puts Emphasis on Adequate Storage

With another big feed supply in the making, ASC Chairman Carl Sundell today reminded farmers who want to participate in the price-support program this fall and winter that adequate storage must be in place.

Pointing out the advantages of on-farm cribs and bins as an important supplement to warehouse storage, the chairman reminded local farmers that (1) they cannot obtain a price-support loan on their crop unless they have a place to store it; (2) holding back part of the crop instead of rushing it all to market at harvesttime may result in a better price, and (3) storing feed grains on the farm means greater convenience for the farmer since the crops are on hand when needed for livestock feeding.

Sundell urged farmers to look over their farm storage carefully and plan on buying or building more structures if they are needed. Under the government farm storage facility loan program, a farmer may obtain a loan of up to 80 percent of the cost of a new grain storage structure (exclusive of concrete costs) at four percent interest. The loan runs for five years and may be repaid in annual installments after the first year.

Production of the four feed grains—corn, oats, barley and sorghum grain—is expected to be nearly equal to last year's record crop of 16 million tons. Carry-over stocks of old grain into 1959 are expected to increase to around 80 million tons, nine million more than in 1958-9.

## Three Winners Named in Soil Conservation

Three Wayne county farmers are winners in the soil conservation contest sponsored by the Sioux City chamber of commerce and Sioux City Journal. Arthur Schellpepper and William Fenske, Hoskins, and Merle King, Wayne, were judged to have the most complete soil conservation programs applied on their farms. They and their wives will be honored at a banquet in Sioux City this fall.

Judges for the contest were Walter Moller, Emil Meyer, Herman Freese and George Noakes.

## Wade Recognized by Landrace Association

Harold Wade, Winside Landrace breeder, has been given recognition by the American Landrace association for litter production. To qualify for an award in the program, eight or more pigs must be raised with a total 56-day litter weight of 400 pounds or more.

Wade received recognition on four litters. The top was a 13 pig litter weighing 330 pounds at 56 days.

## Annual 4-H Baby Beef Sale Planned Saturday at Wayne

Wayne's annual 4-H baby beef sale will be held at the Wayne sale barn Saturday, Chamber Secretary K. N. Parke reminded today.

The event, sponsored by the local Chamber of Commerce, is open to all county 4-H club members. Entries will be limited to one calf per member. Entries must be in place by noon Saturday. Calves will be placed and ribbons awarded during the afternoon. Walter Moller has been named judge. No advance entry is required. Club members need only have their calves at the barn in time for judging.

A bid will be placed on each animal by a packer buyer. Local businessmen may purchase the animals outright or pay a premium over the packer bid. The sale will start at 7 p.m. Top price in last year's sale was \$36 paid for an 1,115 pound Hereford shown by Johnnie Claus, Wayne. A total of 53 calves were sold for an average of \$29.30 per hundredweight.

Money Needed

State Education Commissioner Freeman Decker says he probably will not have enough funds to operate the schools for the blind at Nebraska City and the deaf at Omaha. These institutions, formerly under jurisdiction of the Board of Control, came under management of the State Board of Education July 1.

Decker says the Legislature appropriated \$500,000 for the deaf school and \$160,000 for the blind school in order that the department may run the institutions for the second year of the current biennium. Thus, says Decker, he probably will ask the 1961 Legislature for a deficiency appropriation.

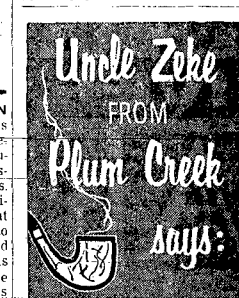

County Agent's Column ... Sacrifice Storage Space, Silage Quality, When Cutter Blades Not Properly Sharp

To cut corn or sorghum at the proper length, cutter blades must be kept sharp and set properly. When the cutter tears or shreds the silage, you are sacrificing storage space and quality of silage.

Proper packing and sealing silage helps ensure proper fermentation. Storage that is thoroughly tramped, weighted and sealed immediately usually will make good silage.

Top covering is also important on horizontal silos. The surface should be covered with an airtight seal and weighted down over the entire surface. Weighting the top cover helps eliminate air pockets as the silage settles and prevents spoilage on the top.



Uncle Zeke FROM Plum Creek Says: DEAR MISTER EDITOR: When the weather is right for it, I spend a heap of time just sitting on the front porch and rocking.

Either corn or sorghum silage makes an excellent feed for dairy cattle if they are properly harvested and stored. The feeding value of sorghum silage is generally slightly less than that of well cared corn because cattle will not chew the feed in sorghum silage as thoroughly as they do corn.

Properly packed and sealed silage all the oxygen should be used up by bacteria and plant enzymes within five hours. Then conditions are favorable for other bacteria to take over and start the preservation process.

#### Cottage Cheese Adds to Spaghetti Casserole

Cottage cheese can make a fine flavor contribution to lots of dishes other than salads. Here is a budget-wise Italian spaghetti-casserole recipe given us by Ray Kling, local salesman of the Meadow Gold Dairy in which the cheese is every bit as important as the ground beef.

Cottage cheese not only adds flavor but actually stretches a pound of ground beef so that this dish will serve eight persons generously, according to Beatrice Cooke, test kitchen director at the company's Chicago plant.

#### Italian Spaghetti Casserole (Eight servings)

- 1 pound ground beef
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1 small onion, chopped
- 1 1/2-cup can tomato paste
- 1 No. 302 can whole tomatoes
- 16 ounces (2 cups) cottage cheese
- 1 teaspoon soy sauce
- 1/4 teaspoon oregano
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 8 ounces thin spaghetti, broken and cooked
- 1/2 cup buttered coarse bread crumbs

Brown meat in butter in fry pan. Add onion, tomato paste, tomatoes, cottage cheese, soy sauce, oregano and seasonings; mix well. Cover and simmer for 15 minutes. 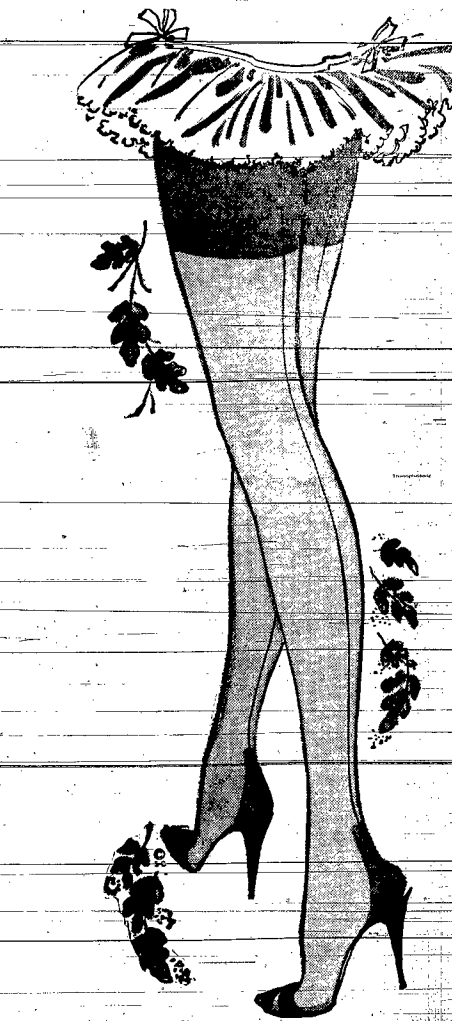
