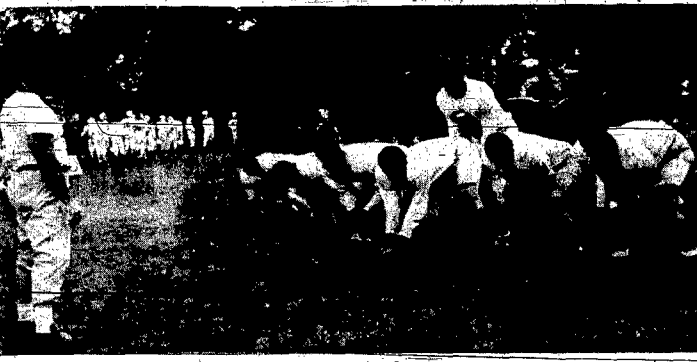

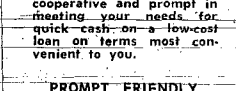

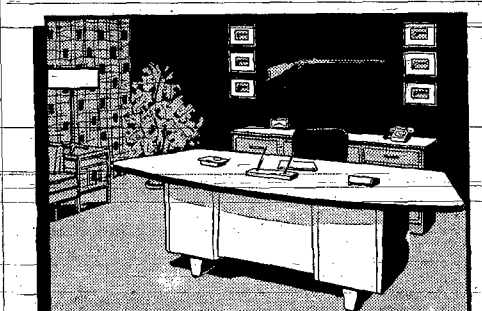

State Survey Says Traffic Volume Too Low for Stop Signals on Main Street

(Editor's Note—This is the second of a series of articles on Wayne's traffic system as observed in a survey by the traffic engineering section of the State Highway department.)

Traffic lights at the intersection of Second and Fourth streets with Main are not warranted by vehicle volume and should be removed.

This was the recommendation of the State Highway department after a thorough survey of traffic flow through Wayne's business district. In order for local citizens to more clearly understand the thinking behind this recommendation, a little history of traffic signals should be presented.

Traffic signals have been used, and in many instances misused, to control traffic for many years. Their fundamental function is to mechanically and automatically assign the right-of-way at intersecting streets where, without such control, a continual flow of vehicles on one roadway causes excessive delays to vehicles, or pedestrians waiting on the side street. The whole virtue of signals lies in that function, chiefly because it assures drivers and pedestrians that eventually, short of an intolerable delay, cross traffic will be able to proceed.

It is unfortunate that traffic signals have come to be regarded by the public as a cure-all for any and all traffic problems at inter-

sections. In other words, they are considered by many as primarily a safety device. Actually safety, which is admittedly an important factor, is not the primary warrant for signalization. Safety is a by-product of the basic purpose of traffic signal control—attainment of orderly traffic movement.

Unwarranted traffic signals cause more accidents than they prevent. Such accident experience usually develops during periods of low volume, in many cases by drivers willfully or unintentionally running the red light. Another unsatisfactory feature of unwarranted signals is the needless delay forced by obedience to that signal. This cost and delay can breed disrespect toward traffic signals in particular and all control devices in general.

A careful analysis of conditions at a large number of traffic signal installations has resulted in the following factors for setting minimum warrants:

- (1) Vehicle volume approaching the section;
- (2) opportunities the side street traffic have for getting onto or across the major roads;
- (3) pedestrians volume at the intersection; and
- (4) the accident experience in the vicinity.

The minimum for vehicle volume at an intersection is 750 vehicles per hour for each of any eight hours of an average day. The

average hourly volume for the three Wayne intersections on an average day are all under 500 vehicles. None of the three even reaches the 750 peak, which is the must average for the minimum warrant.

From these comparisons it can be seen that the present fixed-time signals are unwarranted at all three intersections. Not only is the total volume below that warranted, but the amount of side street flow is under that necessary to require mechanical assignment of right-of-way.

Actually the signal installations in Wayne are working to the disadvantage of all road users. The signals are timed such that Main street speed is limited to 15 miles per hour if a driver is to clear the three intersections after stopping at only one of them. The signal phasing allows equal time to both the Main and cross streets, although the demand of Main street is from two to three times that of the cross street.

It is the time required by a pedestrian that dictates the signal phasing as the cars don't require as much as allotted. Unfortunately, during many periods of the day, volume is so low pedestrians indicate their concern by crossing against the red light. The need for control signal must not be too apparent.

While the installation at Third street does not completely fulfill the minimum warrants, it more nearly approaches them than the other two. It is probable that additional cross street traffic will be attracted to the intersection. Third street if the other two signals are moved. This will have the beneficial by-product of reducing the cross-street traffic at Second and Fourth streets to further reduce need for existing signals at those intersections.

The present 40-second cycle is the minimum and most efficient for the volume, but it is reduced to three seconds, giving the additional time to Main street as green time. The signal timing would then look like this:

The 16 seconds cross-street green is more time than necessary for the vehicle volume, but it is pedestrian crossing time. Upon removal of the signals at Second and Fourth streets, limited sight distance may become a problem to side street motorists waiting at stop signs. A similar problem is being experienced by First street motorists.

The sign distance can be improved by restricting parking back from all intersections. At the signalized intersection, parking should be eliminated at least 40 feet back from the crosswalk to permit two lanes of approach at the signal. This setback provides room for moving traffic to get past left or right turners who may be delayed by opposing flow or pedestrians.

Wayne Tops Wisner 12-0 in Grid Opener Friday Night

Wayne High's Blue Devils used the reliable passing arm of Roger Denesia and an intercepted pass to successfully open the 1959 football season Friday night at Wisner.

Captain Harold Macejewski's charges extended their winning streak to seven games by downing the Bulldogs 12-0. Wayne reeled off six straight victories last season following a 14-7 loss to Pierce.

Denesia completed 11 of 20 pass attempts and his pass interception set up the second Wayne touchdown. The senior quarterback played the entire game.

The Blue Devils took a 6-0 lead on the second play of the second quarter. Sophomore Marlin Lessman crashed over from eight yards out to cap a 32-yard drive.

Wayne had gained possession on the Wisner 32 after a bad pass from center had forced Wisner back to his one-yard line. Denesia hit Buster Likes with a pass good for nine yards on the first play. Bill Witt then crashed over center to the Bulldog 8. Lessman made it from there. Likes attempted to sweep left and for the extra point but was nailed short of the goal line.

Wisner threatened briefly as the game opened when Lessman, starting his first game for the Blue Devils, let Jerald Kersten's kickoff bounce off his chest. The Bulldogs recovered on the Wayne 37 and moved to the 26 before Pat McGill fumbled and Captain Burnell Baker recovered for Wayne.

A fourth-down gamble nearly brought a second Wayne touchdown shortly before the half. With fourth and six on his own 20, Denesia faked a punt and hit Monty Schram with a pass good for 36 yards. Three plays later he hit Schram again on the Wisner 3 but the play was called back by a penalty. The half ended one play later.

Wisner rebounded after the intermission and threatened to tie the score. McGill ran the kickoff back to the Wayne 38 and the Bulldogs

moved to the Blue Devil 8 before being halted. The remainder of the third quarter and the start of the fourth were played around midfield with neither team mustering a threat.

Midway in the final period Denesia pirated a McGill pass on the Bulldog 35 and returned it to the 2.

He scored on a quarterback sneak on the next play. His pass to Witt for the extra point failed and the score remained 12-0.

The game was a surprisingly good opener for the local eleven. The Blue Devils had only the opening kickoff fumble for a ball-handling miscue. There were several backward motions penalties which nullified good gains, however.

It was evident Coach Macejewski is faced with a problem of depth. He substituted sparingly as Wisner's running attack pressed the Blue Devils for a wall throughout most of the game.

Denesia drew a big assist in the line this week with the return of Bill Koeber to the squad. The senior tackle was a standout on defense in his sophomore year. He did not join the squad last season.

Wayne enjoyed a big advantage in the statistics, rolling up 269 yards to 112 for the Bulldogs. First downs were 10-8. In addition to his pass completions, Denesia averaged 27½ yards on four punts.

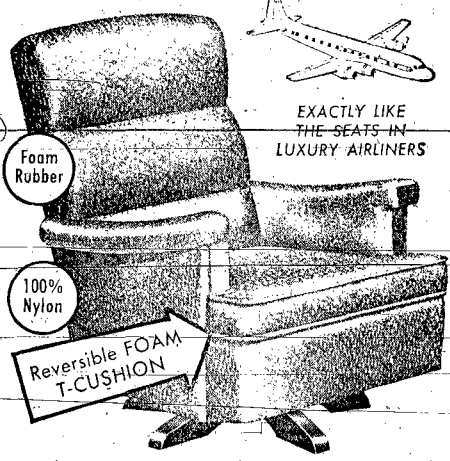

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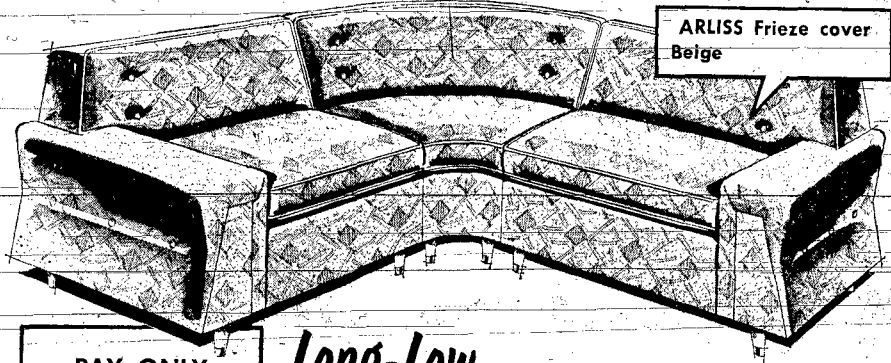
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
