Wildcats to Open Four-Game Homecoming Slate Saturday

Wayne State's Wildcats Saturday will start a four-game series of homecoming games—one of them their own, the other three on for other fields.

The Wildcats will be Chadron's homecoming foe Saturday afternoon, Peru's the following week and Hastings' the last Saturday in October. Coach Gwynn Christensen's squad will entertain Concordia Oct. 24 for the local homecoming.

Both Wayne and Chadron will go into Saturday's game, starting from defeats last week. Kearney romped past Wayne Saturday night at Memorial stadium after Chadron was upset 14-0 by Dodge Friday.

Christensen plans two changes in his starting lineup at Chadron. Don Potter, veteran quarterback, will start after trying out his injured leg for part of the Kearney game. While not up to full power, he found his knees could stand the pounding. He should help bolster Wayne's leaky aerial defense.

Bob Tighe will start at right halfback, otherwise the offensive starters remain the same.

The Wildcats proved one thing Saturday — they could shackle Kearney's vaunted ground attack.

Gene Lawhead hit Bob Campbell for a 15-yard passing score in the first quarter and Larry Holland kicked the first of his four conversions.

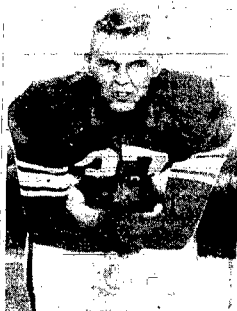
Wayne had one series of plays after the next kickoff, then punted to Jacobsen, who returned the ball 45 yards to the Wayne 20. A Lawhead-to-Johnson pass gained 15 more and Campbell plunged a yard for the second TD four plays later.

Another Lawhead-Jacobsen pass late in the second quarter gained 17 yards and a touchdown. The half ended 21-0.

The teams traded two punts apiece in the third quarter before Jacobsen intercepted a Potter pass and raced 30 yards to the Wildcats' 3. Lawhead plunged for the touchdown.

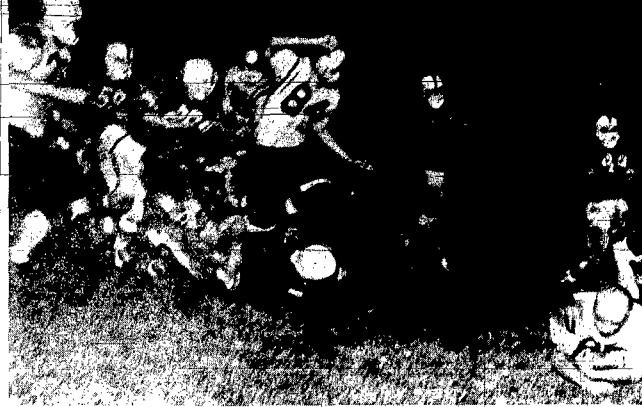

Wayne High will entertain Neligh's Warriors in the annual homecoming game Friday night at WSTC's Memorial stadium. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

Coach Harold Maciejewski's squad will be making its third straight Husker conference victory after a 13-12 squeaker with Pierce Friday night. Wayne now leads the West division with a 2-0 record.

Wayne must defeat Neligh and Stanton to retain hopes for a spot in the league playoffs. Plainview is also unbeaten in conference play. Neligh gained its first victory of the season Friday night, downing Albion 19-0.

Marlin Lessman's plunge for the extra point following Wayne's first touchdown provided the margin of victory in Friday night's game. Lessman, a sophomore, also tallied Wayne's second touchdown. Pierce took a 6-0 lead in the opening period with a 44-yard drive following Roger Denesia's quick kick. The Bluejays ground out the yardage with Dick Zierke finally slanting over right tackle for the final two yards. Mark Gruett's plunge for the extra point failed.

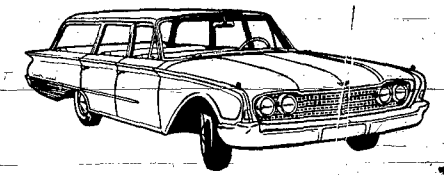

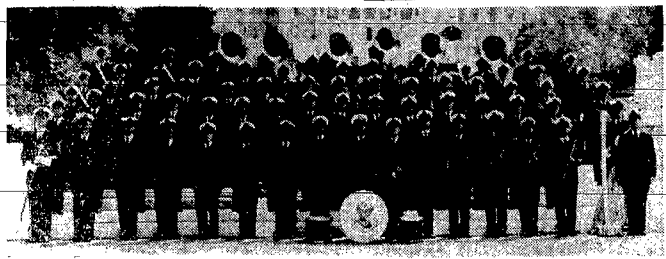

Board Rules Out Masonic Rite for Elementary School

Wayne city school board Monday evening fixed salary for a substitute teacher and officially made record of its decision against having the new school's cornerstone laid in a Masonic ceremony.

Salary at the rate of \$3,200 per year was set for Mrs. Cecil Wriedt, who is acting as substitute teacher for Mildred Agler. Miss Agler has a contract to teach seventh grade, but has been unable to teach this year because of illness.

Salaries for substitute teachers is set at \$15 per day until the substitute has taught 20 consecutive days. Following this period, the board determines what the salary will be.

After pointing out that the new elementary school building will have no cornerstone as such, President Mrs. Wightman said the architect could change plans to use two facing stones to permit a cornerstone ceremony.

Masonic custom requires an inscription on the face of the stone and a cavity large enough to contain a sealed box of historical documents pertaining to the building.

Following a discussion of costs and problems involved in the ceremony, the plan was voted down 3-1. In other action the board approved three items of extra work on the new building totaling \$431.

Included were porcelain fixtures with receptacles in the school tunnel; increase in width from four to six feet for school sidewalks and removal of additional trees from the school site.

Estimated costs of each project were: receptacles, \$85; sidewalk, \$296; tree removal, \$50.

A breakdown of school expenditures comparing Wayne with the state average of Class III schools was prepared by Supt. E. W. Willert.

Salaries were only 50.6 percent of the local budget while state averages were 67.8 percent.

In two categories percentages were higher at Wayne than over the state. These were fixed charges and capital outlay. Fixed charges at Wayne account for 3.3 percent compared to 1.3 percent as a state average.

Capital outlay was much greater at Wayne with 21.6 percent as compared to 3.9 percent. Reason for the difference, Willert said, is the cost of furniture and equipment for the new building and lockers for the new shower room being added to the present building.

Capitol News

Decker Glad State Toughens Correspondence School Laws

LINCOLN — State Education Commissioner F. B. Decker says he is glad Nebraska finally has gotten tough on "fly-by-night" correspondence course operators.

One of the laws which became effective recently provides that any person operating a private school in Nebraska without a license from the State Board of Education is subject to a \$500 fine and 90 days in jail.

Decker notes the law applies to privately owned correspondence, business and trade schools maintaining a place of business in Nebraska from which or in which training is given for money. Until now, only persons selling such courses were required to have permits.

Decker said the licensing and bonding of private schools will protect citizens against the "substandard and fly-by-night" schools that spring up overnight, collect tuition fees in good faith by boys and girls and disappear again during the night. "The education commissioner commented that there have been a number of instances of this happening in Nebraska in recent years.

The law does not apply to public, parochial or denominational schools or those already licensed by another state agency, Decker said. Also excluded are operations primarily offering instruction in such fields as dancing, charm and photography.

In past years Decker has been an outspoken critic of the shady correspondence-type schools and periodically warned Nebraskans of them.

Study Committees

Study committees of the Legislature are hard at work on problems the 1961 Legislature may face. One major area of research is higher education, being studied by a committee headed by Sen.

Richard Marvel, Hastings.

The committee has voted to employ a professional consultant to make a preliminary survey of all public, private and church-related colleges and universities in Nebraska. Information provided by these schools will be evaluated by the educational expert. A report will then be made to the committee which will decide whether to employ a professional educational team to conduct a comprehensive survey of the institutions.

Meanwhile, the senators studying the Board of Control have tentatively outlined areas of research into that phase of state government.

Headed by Sen. Norman Otto, Kearney, the group will see whether the present system — whereby three board members are appointed by the governor — should be continued or whether there should be three separate state departments — penal, charitable and mental.

Otto says administrative procedure in other states will be scrutinized and past and present members of the board — which governs state institutions — will be called in for testimony.

Seaton

A prominent Nebraska Republican, Secretary of Interior Fred Seaton, has again scotched reports he is a prime prospect for public office. "I've said it before, and I'll say it again," Seaton commented, "the only thing I'm running for in 1960 is home."

Seaton said he has been away from his Hastings publishing business since 1951 and wants to return. He told reporters he doesn't have "Potomac Fever" and anyone who "prints ink" is a good antidote for it.

The Secretary did say he would participate in the 1960 campaign

and would remain on under President Eisenhower until the Chief Executive's term ends, if that is what the President wants.

It appears to him, Seaton commented in answer to a question, that Vice President Richard Nixon seems out in front in sentiment of potential delegates to the 1960 GOP national convention.

Trembling Floors

The case of the "trembling floors" at the governor's mansion has been officially stamped "closed" by the State Capitol Building commission.

Architects told the commission, headed by Gov. Ralph G. Brooks, that it would be a major project to stop the shaking and require tearing out much of the interior of the new building.

Brooks commented the ailment came from a case of "faulty design." The governor brought up the matter when he noticed that floors shook and windows rattled when anyone walked across the carpet in an area of the mansion.

Interstate Highway

The problem of the location of the Interstate highway between North Platte and Grand Island has taken a new turn.

Controversial from the start, the route had been set as north of the Platte river by the Advisory State Highway commission. However, Gov. Ralph G. Brooks and the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads had not formally ratified this decision.

Attorney William Meier, Minden, appeared before the commission urging the south of the Platte route which he claims will save \$10 million. State Engineer Roy Cochran told the former Democratic party state chairman that the matter would be considered by the highway department and the federal government.

County Agent's Column ... Fall Season Good Time to Set Out Spring Bulbs; Early Harvest Cuts Soybean Loss

PLANT SPRING BULBS NOW

Your yard can be a flair of color or early next spring if you set out a variety of spring-flowering bulbs this fall.

University of Nebraska horticulturists say now is the time to get tulip, daffodil, hyacinth and crocus bulbs in the ground. Right now is also a good time to divide and transplant any old plants. Old bulbs usually need dividing every three to five years.

Bulbs require a well drained soil—they will rot if it isn't. Peat moss or sand added to the soil is a good way to improve soil structure.

Bulbs should be well lighted areas—they will grow in shaded areas—but the blooms will come a little later and will not be as large.

A good planting depth is two or three times the diameter of the bulb. They can be planted deeper in light sandy soil. In heavy clay soils they should be a little closer to the surface.

The closer you plant the bulbs to each other, the sooner you'll have to transplant them. They should be separated three or three times the diameter of the bulb. It may be necessary to place a

EARLY SOYBEAN HARVEST

Early harvest of soybeans as well as care in harvest can usually reduce seed losses according to the Nebraska Certified Seed News. This publication recommends starting a combining as soon as beans reach 14 percent moisture to avoid cracking. If drying facilities are available they may be harvested at moisture levels up to 18 percent. Harvesting beans that are too dry can result in excessive cracking which is difficult to avoid if moisture gets as low as eight percent.

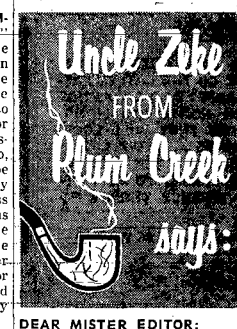
Soybeans will keep safely at 13 percent or less and are subject to injury for seed if dried at temperatures about 110 degrees Fahrenheit. About 10 to 18 hours of drying time will be required for beans of 18 percent moisture.

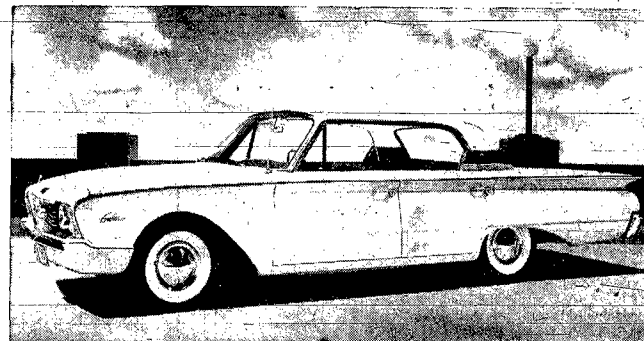
