City Council Opens Generator Bids; Letting Slated Tuesday

Bids on a new generating engine for the municipal light plant were opened at a special meeting of the Wayne city council Tuesday night.

Five manufacturing firms submitted six bids on the project estimated by city engineers at \$380,000, plus \$22,000 if an optional cooling radiator is purchased.

Awarding of a contract for the new engine is expected at the council's regular meeting Tuesday night. A special session is planned at noon Tuesday in order that councilmen may hear bid evaluations and recommendations from the city's consulting engineers.

Both the County and State committees are able to hold the petitions 40 days according to law, he pointed out.

Navy Band Concerts Attract 4,000 at WSTC Thursday

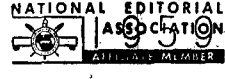



State to Get King-Size Share Of Politics in Coming Months

LINCOLN — Nebraskans will be treated to a king-size helping of big politics in the next six months.

The first two will involve a struggle between the Democratic and Republican parties for control of all state and national offices.

On the presidential scene, Sen. John F. Kennedy, Massachusetts Democrat, has a head start in the stump campaign.

The other approach will be by those who plan to work on possible delegates only, not entering primaries.

The big fight at the state level will be by Republicans to try to capture the fancy of voters with a good primary candidate for governor who can translate his popularity into victory in the fall.

Control of the governorship breathes life into a party because the governor is the top man in discharging patronage or in other words, jobs—considered a necessary part of politics.

Democrats will be pushing to retain the two Congressional seats they got last time and whittle down GOP Sen. Carl T. Curtis, who will bid again for the U. S. Senate.

The State Liquor commission says its biggest continuing problem is drinking by minors.

So far this year, the commission has arrested 253 under-age persons for drinking, and Chief Enforcement Officer Edward J. Nicolite says the problem is "terrific."

There will be two types of attack in Nebraska. One will be the Kennedy approach which the senator admits is fraught with "peril."

Preble said the "anti-labor atmosphere" in the 1959 Legislature was a "shame and a disgrace."

Farm News and Views... Widespread Vaccination Neglect Brings Major Hog Cholera Outbreak in Midwest

VACCINATE EVERY HOG on your farm for hog cholera on a regular basis—caution farm editors. Widespread neglect by farmers to do this recently resulted in the first major outbreak in 20 years.

Veterinary officials say nearly all areas in the Midwest are similar—too few hogs being vaccinated. Experts emphasize vaccinating all pigs at the time recommended.

WATCH FOR STORAGE problems in fall-harvested grain, warn agricultural field editors.

Check any corn, soybeans or other crops still in the field for quality before storing. Grain containing mold at harvest time will spoil quickly in the bin.

Use supplementary heat only during periods of high humidity. Heat speeds up mold growth.

TIME CLOCK FEEDING should be considered as you plan mechanical livestock feeding devices, according to agricultural engineers.

Recent tests with beef cattle at the University of Illinois show significant gains by feeding six times a day rather than the usual twice a day feeding.

New equipment for fully automatic feeding of poultry, cattle and hogs is coming on the market continually. Consider it on any remodeling job you do in your feed lot.

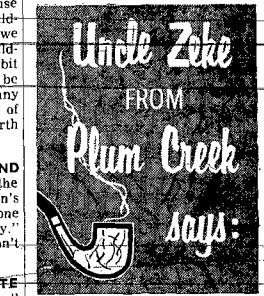

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County Agent's Column... Coffee Breaks Can Reduce Farm Mishaps; Rooters Day Scheduled at Lincoln Oct. 30

Wives of Nebraska farmers can help their husbands get through this fall's crockery season without an accident. Best way to help is through a mid-morning and mid-afternoon "break," says Delbert Lane, University of Nebraska agricultural engineer.

Naturally, Lane says, the best way to get a busy farmer to stop for a short relaxation period is to tempt him with some refreshments—hot rolls and coffee, maybe.

Reasons behind this advice are records that show a distinct peak in corn harvest accidents about 10 a. m. and 4 p. m. each day. With several hours of picking already behind him and quitting time still a long way off, a farmer tends to get careless and may actually be "lulled" into an accident.

Lane says the little time lost for the breaks can easily be paid for by the accident that doesn't happen and in cleaner, safer picking by a more alert operator. The important thing is to get the operator to take a brief rest, even if it takes your best dessert to do it.

New Rooters Day Feature When swine producers converge on the college of agriculture on Oct. 30 to attend Rooters Day they will find a new wrinkle at the 24th annual event.

Time has been set aside for producers to have individual visits with various scientists on specific swine problems.

It is hoped this feature will make it possible for producers to get answers to their specific questions on swine health, reproduction, housing, testing, breeding and nutrition.

Rooters Day will begin at 8:45 a. m. Oct. 30, with swine displays and swine production outlook charts. There also will be research reports on protein sources and feed additives for swine; methods for carcass evaluation; a swine breeding research on carcass merit

and mating behavior and the effect of nutrition on carcass merit. Guest speaker at the event will be Dr. J. F. Lasley, University of Missouri. His topic will be "Factors Affecting Swine Reproduction."
