Opponents Still In Doubt; Wayne May Get Berth

Opponents for the annual Husker conference football playoffs were still in doubt at press time Wednesday with four teams still in contention for the two berths.

Wayne High, with its league season completed, awaited the outcome of last night's Pierce-Plainview battle at Plainview. A Pierce victory would assure Wayne of its second straight playoff spot.

If Plainview is the victor, the playoff representative may have to be selected by a computerized procedure since the two teams did not meet during the regular season.

League rules specify a point system to determine the champion if there is a two-way tie and the regular season game between the two was a tie. This would also apply if the teams have not played in the regular season. On the basis of four points for a win on the road and three points for a victory at home, Wayne and Plainview would be tied with 14 points.

The playoff berth then would be determined by drawing lots with the school first drawn being eliminated.

If Wayne does gain the playoff spot, the game will be played here Nov. 20.

The East division championship must await the outcome of the West Point-Lyons clash - Nov. 6. West Point currently leads the East with a 3-0 record. Pender has completed loop play with a 3-0 record.

West Point must defeat Lyons to gain its fifth straight playoff berth. Should the Cadets lose to or tie Lyons, Pender would earn the playoff since rules specify the most recent division champion is eliminated if the regular season game between the two was a tie. Pender tied the Cadets 13-13 earlier.

Pender stretched its unbeaten string to seven games Friday night with a 27-0 victory over Ponca. The Dragons have only a 1-6 record. Wisner and West Point to mar their 1959 record.

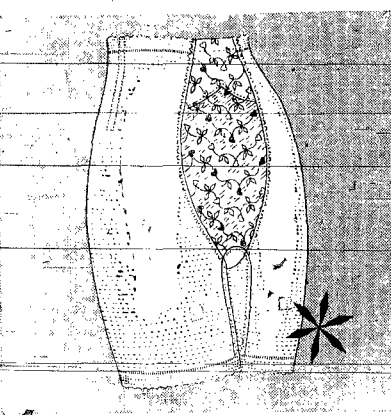

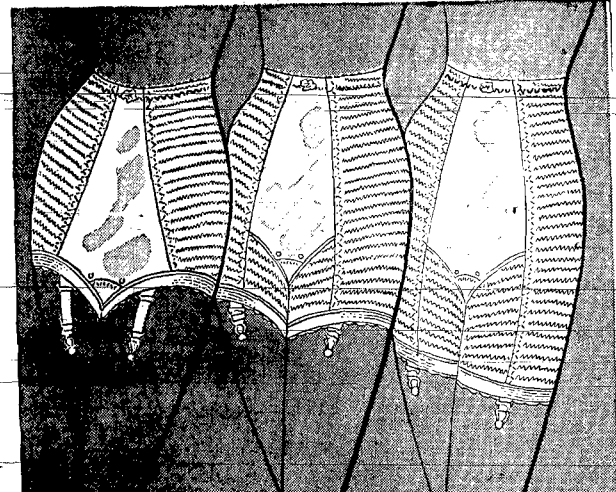

Questionnaires in Mail on 1959 Farm Census in County

Questionnaires for the 1959 census of agriculture are now in the mail and will be in the hands of local farmers within a few days, it was announced today by Owen Jones, Carroll, crew leader for Wayne and Thurston counties.
The farm census questionnaires are being mailed from Chicago with distribution timed so the report forms will reach farmers about a week ahead of the date when census takers will begin the field canvass.

The advance mailing is for the purpose of giving farm operators time to consult their records before filling in the answers required by the questionnaires and getting them ready for the census takers to pick up. This procedure is designed to insure greater reporting accuracy and to save time for both the farmer and census taker when the latter calls at the farm.

The 1959 census of agriculture is designed to provide information on the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, live stock production and inventories, selected farm facilities and equipment, selected farm expenditures, farm values and mortgage debt.

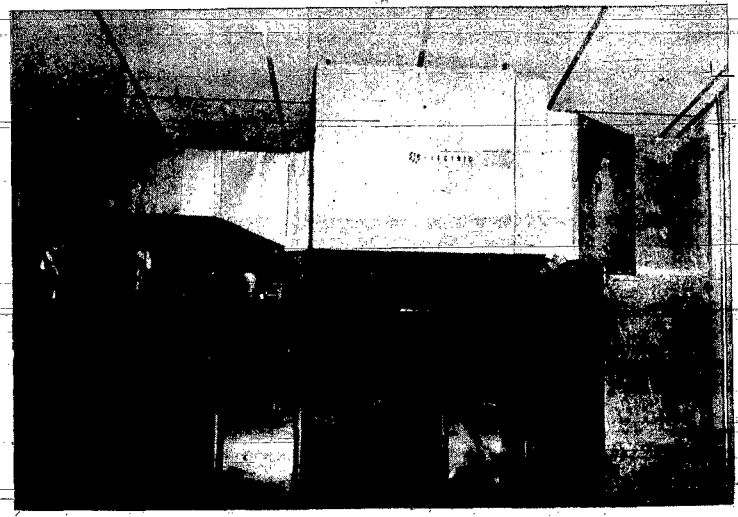
On the average, each farmer is asked about 160 questions, many of which can be answered by simply checking "yes" or "no."

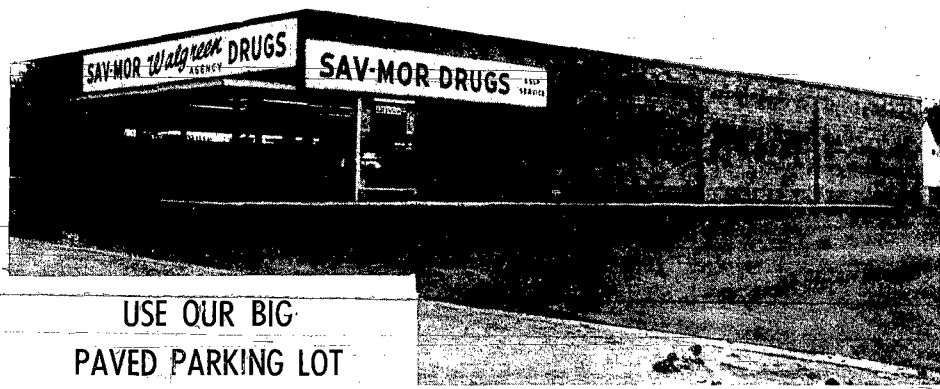
