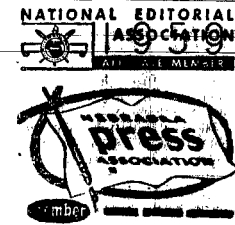

Wildcats Await Results in League; Fifth Place Sure

WSTC's Wildcats waited this week to find out their final standing in the Nebraska College conference ratings. Two games this week will affect the top six places.

Wayne now holds fifth place with a 4-1 record. However, Wesleyan can move into a tie with the Wildcats by defeating Doane Friday night.

The top four places remain in doubt. Part of that doubt will be cleared tonight when Chadron enters Peru in a snow-delayed game. Peru must win to equal Kearney's 7-0 record and share the championship.

If Chadron beats Peru, it will finish with a 5-2-0 record. Doane, now 5-2-1, must defeat Wesleyan to stay in third place.

Wayne's season record (4-1) is half a game better than last year's 4-2. The team finished sixth in the 1958 conference standings.

The Wildcats improved their loop mark despite lack of scoring punch. Only in Saturday's finale against Midland did they mount a real attack, downing the Warriors 31-8. Wayne had scored only 50 points in its first eight games and only once had counted over seven points in one game.

For three quarters the Midland attack looked like another low-scoring match with the outcome in doubt.

Wayne led 7-0 at intermission and 9-6 after three quarters. But the final quarter's first play produced a touchdown when John Bernthal churned six yards through the mud.

After that, the Wildcats added two points on their second safety of the game, and Bob Tietz and Merlin Mitteis scored touchdowns. It was Mitteis' second tally of the game and fifth of the season. His 30 points is tops for the team.

Mitteis also gained 133 yards for his best performance of the year, raising his season total to 613. This is the best on the team in rushing and total offense. Bernthal added 95 yards for a 332 season's total.

Wayne's rushing total of 296 and Midland's 16 passes for 132 yards were very credible considering the sloppy condition of the field.

Bill Nelsen, Midland's freshman quarterback who ranks No. 2 in national NAIA passing statistics, lofted 25 aerials. He connected on 12 of 14 in the first half. Most of the misses could be blamed on a slick ball or slick footing under receivers.

Nelsen's long pass to Halfback Bob Kappmeyer scored Midland's lone touchdown in the third quarter as the receiver raced 46 yards untouched.

Wayne tallied first in the second quarter when Mitteis broke loose on a 29-yard run. Skeeter Mahler added the first of three extra point kicks. Mitteis broke away for 65 yards on the second half's first play from scrimmage, being hauled down from behind on the Warrior 10. A fumble three plays later thwarted the touchdown but Wayne's defense soon caught Nelsen in his own end zone for a safety. Rod Tietzort tackled the Warrior quarterback.

The second safety came in the final stanza when Rollie Kaup and Joe Sowokinos chased Keith Johannes into the end zone and downed him.

Capitol News

Education Board May Advise Increased Aid to Handicapped

LINCOLN—The 1961 Legislature will be faced with the problem of expanding financial aid to local school districts for teaching the handicapped child. This prediction was made at a meeting of the State Board of Education.

The board has concerned itself with the problem of special education and directed State Education Commissioner F. B. Decker to study the problem. Thus, the board may be in the position of recommending to the Legislature that it expand state aid programs to the handicapped.

Now, schooling for those children who are physically handicapped or mentally retarded but educable is financed in part by the state. But Decker and other board members say the Legislature has not appropriated enough funds for the State Education department to pay the amount of money the law says it will for educating the handicapped. Thus, a bigger burden than anticipated has fallen upon the shoulders of local districts who want to educate the children.

The board was told that financial aid will be needed in the coming years for educating the emotionally disturbed child and the mentally retarded child that can be trained.

The problem of the growing need for special education is not a new one to the State Education department. Decker said growth of the program, inaugurated in 1949, was predicted by the department in an appearance before a legislative committee that year. Decker said a tremendous job has been done in educating the handicapped, but more work remains.

Daugherty Named

Gov. Ralph G. Brooks has named William E. "Pat" Daugherty, Lincoln, to an untitled position in the office of State Tax Commissioner. The 47-year-old certified public ac-

countant will hold the duties formerly handled by Wilber Houtchens, who resigned to re-enter military duty.

State Tax Commissioner Fred Herrington's resignation becomes effective Dec. 15. No one had been named to the \$10,000 per year post at the time Daugherty was appointed.

Daugherty was born at Wahoo, was graduated from David City high school and received his bachelor's degree from the University of Nebraska in 1934. He holds master's degrees from the graduate school of arts and sciences at the University and from Harvard.

In August, 1958 he received his certificate as a certified public accountant. Daugherty has had experience in Grand Island and Scottsbluff in internal revenue offices and did private accounting work in Lincoln and Scottsbluff.

Small Cars

The trend toward smaller cars in this country is causing plenty of headaches for the engineers who design highways. Roads have been planned for the normal size autos, but because of the rush towards smaller, lower vehicles, highways are becoming obsolete quicker.

The Nebraska Highway department has been lengthening yellow no passing lines in some places on roads because of the smaller cars. Another problem which has developed is snow removal. State Maintenance Engineer John Meekins says as cars become lower to the ground the need becomes greater for quick removal of snow. The little cars and those close to the ground become stuck quicker, thus blocking highways, he said.

Bingo Proceeds

The state may come close to realizing \$50,000 for the current fiscal year as its share of the levy on playing of bingo.

That's the report from State Agriculture Director Pearle Finigan. Finigan says with first quarter collections still not completed, Nebraska received \$8,565 from the tax.

Finigan said first quarter returns are small because a goodly number of the 432 licensees have not conducted any games yet. The number who do is expected to increase with cold weather.

Presidential Parade

Nebraska has become a favorite delegate hunting ground for potential Democratic candidates for President.

Sen. John Kennedy, Massachusetts, already has made an extensive speaking tour of the state. Sen. Hubert Humphrey, Minnesota, has been in the state. A Missouri senator, Stuart Symington, is expected in Nebraska after the first of the year.

All are being welcomed by Democratic officials who say all possible nominees will be given equal treatment in order that potential delegates may make up their minds on whom they will support.

Farm News and Views

CATTLE CLEANING Corn fields after picking will put on an added 1/2 to 2/3 pound gain a day if fed extra protein.

Agricultural editors say an easy way to provide protein is in hard blocks, like salt blocks. These blocks are available from several manufacturers. They have been used quite successfully by western ranchers the past two years.

They contain cottonseed and soy bean meals, plus molasses and a salt-mineral mix. They are hard enough to withstand cold, wet weather. The cattle get all the protein they need by licking the block.

CHECK INSURANCE coverage on your buildings. Farm experts point out that following fall harvest, the contents in your barn and cribs will often be worth a bit more than that covered under your insurance. Since winter always in-

creases risks from fire and other losses, you'll want to make sure you have adequate coverage.

BUGS TROOP indoors when weather cools off. This problem can be particularly bad if you have box elder trees in your neighborhood.

These bugs live off the trees in summer and then crawl through cracks and crevices around doors and windows when weather cools.

To stop them, mix one pint of lindane with five gallons of water and spray around outside house walls and tree trunks. Those bugs that do come in the house can be picked up with a vacuum cleaner.

Seldom is spraying inside the house warranted, but in severe cases pyrethrin household sprays can be used.

County Agent's Column

Observation of Corn Ears Can Provide Much Information During Fall Harvest

Observation of ears at harvest can tell you much. Ears should average about 1/2 pound in weight. Larger ears mean there are too few plants and a thicker stand is needed. Small ears with unfilled tips indicate nitrogen is needed. Small ears poorly filled on one side indicate a phosphorus shortage. Dry weather can likewise be a contributing factor to small and poorly filled ears.

Check Progress

Napoleon's adage that "an army moves on its stomach" is just as true of nations today whose growth is dependent upon progress in agriculture.

Millions of non-farm people also are affected by what happens in agriculture. By the same token, much of the success of farmers in achieving greater production is tied to the work of non-farm people.

Farms and farm people use products and implements produced in the chemical, machinery, oil, electrical, automotive and other industries as well as scientific discoveries in private and public research laboratories. Millions of people are engaged in the processing and distribution of food and other materials on farms.

During the past two decades, agriculture in the U. S. has undergone a technological and scientific revolution. Within a third of a lifetime, the most spectacular changes in the technology of agricultural production the world has ever seen have occurred in the U. S.

Agricultural production has been affected by widespread and sweeping changes in mechanization, nutrition, genetics and sanitation. Since 1940, the production per man-hour has doubled. The increase in production per man-hour since 1940 is as great as the increase in production in the 120 years from 1820 to 1940.

A nationwide census is the only way to obtain up-to-date facts on a widespread and an increasingly complex agriculture. It encompasses more than four million farms ranging in size from less than one acre to more than 100,000 acres. That's agriculture today.

Like an army of men, everyone in a nation is affected by agriculture because all need food and clothing. Living would be impossible without the production of agriculture. Most families spend
