

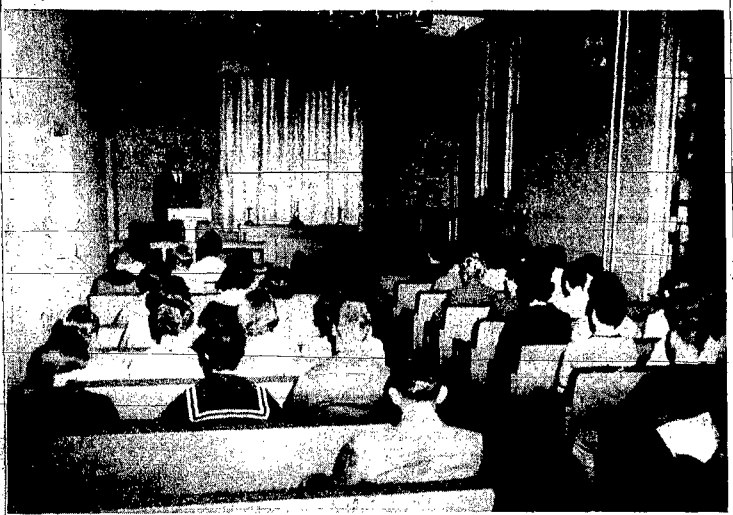

Dedication New Chapel Also Slated

Cornerstone laying ceremonies for WSTC's new residence hall will be conducted Tuesday afternoon by the Nebraska Masonic Grand lodge.

Guest speaker for the event will be Dr. Monk Bryan, pastor of the Missouri Methodist church, Columbia, Mo., and past grand orator of the Missouri Grand lodge. The rites will start at 2 p.m. Joseph C. Tye, Kearney, Nebraska Masonic grand master, will lay the cornerstone. Dr. Bryan will also speak at 5 p.m. ceremonies dedicating the local college's new interfaith chapel in the student union building.

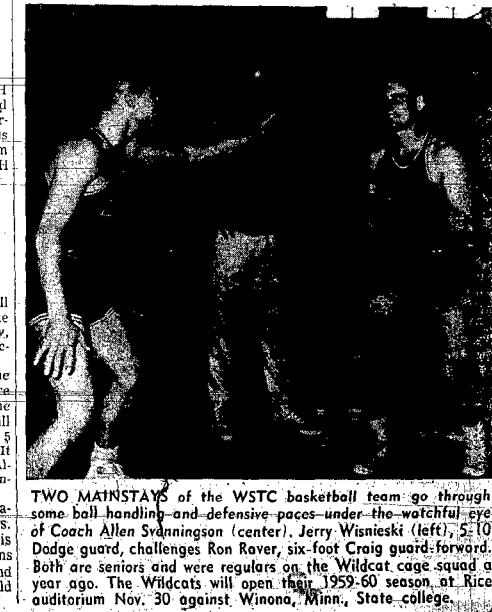
Area Fellowship's Crusade to Close At Wayne Sunday

Establishment of Preferential Streets Recommended by Highway Department

Editor's Note: This is the fifth of a series of articles on a traffic survey conducted in Wayne by the State Highway department. It is printed only to acquaint the local citizenry with the thinking behind the department's suggestions and should not be construed as a recommendation of approval. This week's article concerns local accident history and a suggestion for establishment of preferential streets. The reports indicate right angle collisions which usually means no time to avoid an accident, generally because of restricted sight distance. Parked cars seem to be the offender. Here again, allowing a car to park no closer than 20 feet from the crosswalk would provide adequate sight distance. The importance of modern parking practices can be shown at this intersection. Preferential Streets In practically every populated area, and certainly in cities the size of Wayne, there is a tendency for drivers to prefer to travel on certain streets. Their choice is promoted, in most cases, by the physical characteristics of the street such as surface condition, width, absence of hills and bad intersections. Also a factor is the directness of route between origin and destination. One very important consideration is the existence of whatever traffic control may be necessary to prevent accidents at intersections. In Wayne there also exists certain streets which could, and perhaps should be, adapted to serve as collector or preferential streets to serve traffic traveling between the business district and the out-

lying residential areas. At the present time such traffic gravitates the best it can under the prevailing conditions to Main and Seventh streets. People traveling on those two streets are aware of the fact that all side street approaches are controlled by stop signs. This causes their minds somewhat so far as probable accidents are concerned. It also means that once they are on those two streets they can generally keep moving except, perhaps, in the core of the downtown area where there are now three traffic signals. It would seem advisable to investigate the feasibility of establishing additional arterial or preferential streets along which all of the side street approaches would be controlled with stop signs. Some suggestions for such streets would be Third between Sherman and Window streets. This suggestion is enhanced by the fact that it is also being recommended that the traffic signal on Third and Main be retained. It would also seem advisable to have a north-south preferential street somewhere west of Main street. At the present time Pearl See TRAFFIC SURVEY — page 4
