At Annual Chamber Meet 1960 Soil Bank Will Idle

Nearly 2,000 acres of Wayne county crop land will be idled un-der the 1960 conservation reserve program of the soil bank, ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell report-ed this week.

ed this week.

The 1960 contracts covering 20 farms will raise the number of acres taken out of production in the county to about 12,600 since the soil bank was initiated.

Sundell said the county recently received an additional \$20,000 allecation for the 1960 program which enabled 10 more farms to participate. The 20 farms involved in the 1960 conservation reserve will withdraw 1,975 acres from production for annual payments totalling about \$32,000, an average of about \$16.25 per acre.
