street. Putting up the decorations is no small task for it includes decorating 50 light poles in the business district plus the five new cross-street decorations. Chamber Secretary K. N. Parke praised the light plant employees for their work in installing the decorations.

Council Asks Suggestions For Traffic Improvement

Suggestions from local citizens on means of solving Wayne's traffic problems were invited this week by City Councilman W. A. Koerber, chairman of the street committee.

Dr. Koerber and his committee, which includes Councilmen B. A. Meyer and William Pfaff, will make recommendations for adoption of some State Highway department recommendations at the council's Dec. 8 meeting.

The state recommendations were made following a traffic survey conducted in the city last year. They were presented to the council in July. Dr. Koerber said the council wishes to learn the attitude of local citizens toward adoption of some of the state proposals for reducing traffic congestion in the city.

The significant recommendations were:

- (1) Revision of the existing system of speed limits, retaining the present 25-mile limit in the congested downtown area but raising the limit to 30 miles per hour in outlying areas.
- (2) Removal of the stop lights at Second and Fourth street intersections with Main street and modernization of the Third and Main signal through installation of another light.
- (3) Reconstruction of the Seventh and Main streets intersection to provide adequate space for high-way travel.
- (4) Revision of parking in the downtown area to make more sight distance available to cross-street motorists and provide two lanes of

approach to traffic signals. This would also include reduction of angle parking to 30 degrees as used on Main street.

(5) Removal of the flashing stop at Eleventh and Main streets and installation of the state-standard school lane signing series. The same signing series would also be used at Tenth and Logan and Seventh and Walnut streets.

(6) Establishing additional preferential streets along which all side street approaches would be controlled by stop signs. Third, Ligdon, Window and Tenth or Eleventh streets were suggested.

New Board Election Slated At Annual Chamber Meet

1960 Soil Bank Will Idle 2,000 Wayne County Acres

Nearly 2,000 acres of Wayne county crop land will be idled under the 1960 conservation reserve program of the soil bank, ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell reported this week.

The 1960 contracts covering 20 farms will raise the number of acres taken out of production in the county to about 12,600 since the soil bank was initiated.

Sundell said the county recently received an additional \$20,000 allocation for the 1960 program which enabled 10 more farms to participate. The 20 farms involved in the 1960 conservation reserve will withdraw 1,975 acres from production for annual payments totaling about \$32,000, an average of about \$16.25 per acre.

In addition the operators joining the program in 1960 will receive about \$6,850 in payments for establishing conservation practices on the idle acres.

With the 1960 contracts, Wayne county will have 127 farms participating in the soil bank program, Sundell said.

Dr. Johnson Named to State's Newest Council

Dr. J. R. Johnson, WSTC social sciences division chairman, has received an appointment to a new state body, the Nebraska Historical Markers council.

Gov. Ralph Brooks named Dr. Johnson as the council member-at-large. The council membership also includes the governor, state engineer, State Historical society director and one member from each of the 43 legislative districts.

Fifty-one student council members from nine Nebraska colleges traded ideas on student affairs this weekend at WSTC. They had plenty of ideas and found most of their problems were common on all campuses.

The convention decided to meet next year at Concordia college. Action at the Wayne meeting included changing of the group's name to the Nebraska College Student Government association. This followed a decision of Concordia, Midland and Dana to leave the NCC in athletics.

Discussion sessions revealed some colleges are scheduling more activities such as club meetings and dances on weekends instead of in midweek. The idea is to relieve week nights for study and provide more weekend activity, thus giving students something to do. Many go home on weekends because of "nothing to do."

Some of the delegates reported their colleges have designated certain cafeteria meals for dress-up—no jeans and slacks permitted. One college representative said jeans and slacks cannot be worn until after 3 p.m.

Wildcats to Host Winona Warriors in Tuesday Tilt

Wayne State eaglers Monday night will launch their 1959-60 basketball season with the first of six pre-Christmas games, four of them non-conference affairs.

The varsity will square off at 7:30 p.m. in the Rice gym against Winona, Minn. State college, following a B squad tilt with Nebraska Christian college, Norfolk. The preliminary will start at 5:30.

Coach Allen Svenningson lists six players for possible starting assignments. Chuck Rackow and Larry Coney will operate from double post positions with Ron Raver at forward. Three guards who will see plenty of action are Jerry Wisnietki, Larry Berres and Ron Marcellus.

Also expected to play are Dick Pineda, guard, and Bob Schroeder and Bob Pilgel, both 6-3 freshmen forwards.

Interstate Highway Battles Still Mushrooming in State

LINCOLN — An announcement early in November by Governor Ralph Brooks that he was diverting Interstate highway funds from the Lincoln and Grand Island area...

are five different highway routes involved. They are: Route 1, the main east to west route to Wyoming, 436 miles, at an estimated cost of \$232,848,000.

Officials of the department indicate they may attempt to have Frontier kicked out of the state and replaced by another air carrier. Those mentioned have been Ozark Airlines, St. Louis, Mo., North Central Airlines, Minneapolis, and Central Airlines, Kansas City, Mo.

The super highway has had a stormy history the past couple years and is expected to have its same in the future. As a result of the protests which flared over transferring funds to Omaha, the governor reversed his order and let Lincoln's funds alone with the condition that right-of-way purchasing for the Lincoln access route must begin by next June 1.

Route 2, the cut-off from near Big Springs to the Colorado border, 10.2 miles, at an estimated cost of \$3,353,000. Route 3, the downtown Omaha route, 3.9 miles at an estimated cost of \$34,708,000.

The State Board of Education has scheduled for public hearing Dec. 8 proposed new regulations for approval of schools to receive free high school tuition and to be exempt from the county tuition levy.

The controversial Grand Island to North Platte route is still mushrooming. The South Platte United Chambers of Commerce have been pressing for a route south of the river and even conducted their own study, coming up with a third route. A progress report on a study of that route was presented to the State Highway Advisory commission Monday.

Route 4, the Lincoln access route, three miles, at an estimated cost of \$9,398,000. Route 5, the route which skirts around Omaha, 13.5 miles, at an estimated cost of \$14,618,000.

The legislature authorized the board to make new regulations after old regulations were declared unconstitutional by the Lancaster county District court.

It was thought at one time the commission had settled the location of the road when last summer it approved the north bank route and refused to reconsider. However, the governor's office has never announced that it took any action on the commission's recommendation. Fearing that the support for the southern route was gaining momentum, supporters of the north route organized recently to fight to retain that choice.

Route 6, the Lincoln access route, three miles, at an estimated cost of \$9,398,000. Route 7, the route which skirts around Omaha, 13.5 miles, at an estimated cost of \$14,618,000.

The legislature authorized the board to make new regulations after old regulations were declared unconstitutional by the Lancaster county District court.

So far, the state has opened 12.1 miles of the four-lane highway to traffic. That section is from I-80 street interchange in Omaha to the interchange three miles south of Gretna.

The entire interstate system in Nebraska will stretch for 488.5 miles when completed. Its total estimated cost is \$294,925,000. There

County Agent's Column ... Good Farm Record Book Not Just Profit Statement; Should Help Spot Farm Ills

Most farmers agree that farm records are valuable. But what real value does a farmer get from keeping a record of his farming operation if the record is not complete, accurate, and above all, useful?

What was your net farm income last year? How does it compare with the previous years? Has your net worth been increasing from year to year? What enterprises on your farm are making you the most money? Would it pay to shift to another enterprise?

The most valuable use of farm records is for locating the ills of the farm business. A farm record book should help discover why the farm is a paying or losing business and not simply show a gain or loss for the year's work.

Quality, More Active Sales Program Open New Future For Nebraska Dairymen

Recently the Laurel Co-Operative Marketing Association of Laurel, Nebr., and the Osceola County Co-Operative Creamery at Sibley, Ia., consolidated and became one organization of producers. The merging together of these two groups into one efficient co-operative offers an entirely new future for the dairymen of Nebraska.

One of the most successful co-operative creameries in the mid-west straddles the western end of the Iowa-Minnesota line with processing facilities being set up at Laurel, Nebr.

This highly modern push-button plant has a completely diversified output: Grade A Milk, Cream, Butter, Buttermilk, Ice Cream Base, and Dry Milk Powder, on a present volume of over 500,000 pounds of milk per day.

What are the factors in this successful operation? How does a plant increase its volume 22% in one year? How does it find premium markets for manufactured products? Manager Don Gregg makes the

answers sound relatively simple: First, strict insistence on top quality; second, a willingness to swing to those products in heavy demand; third, aggressive and imaginative promotion and selling.

Actually the creamery sees quality and sales as practically a single factor. The Co-Op demands good quality milk and gets it with daily laboratory testing based on 5 1/2 hour Methylene Blue standards and cleared by a full-time U.S.D.A. inspector in the plant. Thus the creamery can and does offer a U.S.D.A. Certificate with all of its dairy products — a rarity in the dairy industry.

When a producer goes off grade,

the lab crew examines his milk to find the cause of quality loss and his route man is able to advise on corrective action the following morning. Producers are thus able to regain quality levels within 48 hours. Producers appreciate this help from their Co-Op.

The creamery finds that quality products have a ready market which makes sales blossom, often at premium prices. The creamery has pioneered the manufacturing of Ice Cream Base in the area and now supplies major ice cream manufacturers in several states. This latter product illustrates the

dependent on shipments from Wisconsin, often an 800 mile haul.

The creamery finds ready acceptance of this product with the end result that the farmer-producers have a steady new market at favorable prices.

Dairying has shown tremendous growth in Nebraska and Iowa in the past few years with producers increasing their herds and in many cases converting to Bulk Milk. All of the creameries' Grade A producers are on Bulk and the Co-Op furnishes Grade A to 12 dairies in its four-state area with current shipments running over 100,000 pounds per day. The creamery also ships Grade A milk to Missouri and is a qualified Co-Op in the Kansas City Federal Order.

Within the past year, the addition of a new drier and evaporator has doubled the plant capacity for dried milk products. More recently, a packaging line for Non-Fat Dried Milk was added to the plant. This packaging operation is now on a two-shift basis supplying powdered products for school lunch and overseas shipments. Plans call for the packaging of 20 million pounds of milk powder in 1960.

At present the creamery has 46 milk routes, 12 bulk and 7 cream routes covering an area nearly 150 miles from north to south. With the opening of the packaging department the creamery employs approximately 150 people.

What about the future? The creamery is completely optimistic. The future of the dairy industry lies in quality with a vigorous sales program to sell our way out of the surplus. This, coupled with expanding population and helped by technological developments in dairy processing, promises a tremendous future for the dairy farmer.

The Laurel and Osceola Co-Operatives are taking a strong lead in the move to make that future promise a happy accomplishment right now!
