Wayne Tips Winona 85-74; To Host Southern Monday

With one victory already in the record book, Wayne State's Wildcats travel to Maryville, Mo. Saturday night for a non-conference tussle with Northwest Missouri State. Wayne will host Southern Teachers at Rice auditorium at 7:30 p.m. Monday.

The Missouri quint will be the second newcomer to the Wayne schedule this season. The Wildcats downed Winona, Minn. State 85-74 Monday night at the Rice building by virtue of free throw sharpshooting.

The visitors tallied 28 field goals to Wayne's 27 but the Wildcats hit 31 of 39 charity tosses to Winona's 18 of 28.

Sophomore Larry Coney paced the Wayne attack with 28 points. He hit 12 of 18 gift tosses. Coney's overhead hook shot was his most potent weapon. Chuck Rachow added 20 points for the Wildcats.

Wayne performed without its top scorer, Bob Moore, who was sidelined with a knee injury. He may miss several games. Despite a lack of height, Winona battled the Wildcats on even terms in the first half

rebounding. Then Wayne's height advantage began to tell.

Except for an opening free throw by Wayne, Winona led until 2 1/2 minutes remained in the first half. Rachow then hit a fielder to put the Wildcats in front 31-29.

The victory was doubly satisfactory for Al Svenningsson, Wayne's new coach. This was his first college coaching assignment and his alma mater furnished the opposition. He played with four of the Winona seniors two years ago.

In the preliminary, Wayne's B squad downed Nebraska Christian college, Norfolk, 58-51.

Svenningsson announced before the Winona game that Moore and Ron Raver have been elected captains for the season.

Wayne High's Blue Devils came from behind to successfully open the 1959-60 basketball season Tuesday night, nudging a stubborn Hartington quiet 52-48.

Wayne travels to Tekamah for its second game Friday night.

Trailing by 30 points midway in the third quarter and six points with eight minutes to play, Wayne outscored the Wildcats 18-8 in the final period to gain the victory.

A layup by Bob Proett with five seconds remaining proved the clinching basket as Wayne finished the game without Roger Denesia and Bill Witt, who were ejected on personal fouls. Witt left with 1:43 remaining and Denesia with 38 seconds left.

Denesia, who led both teams in scoring with 17 points, hit 10 in the final period as Wayne rallied from a 34-40 deficit after three quarters. The Blue Devils pulled within two points in just 17 seconds as Denesia and Duster Likes hit layups. Burnell Baker knotted the score at 40-all with 6:36 remaining.

Twenty seconds later Wayne took its first lead since late in the second quarter as Denesia scored on the fast break. Baker added another basket at 5:33 to make it 44-40.

Ron Folkers pulled the Wildcats within one point as he hit a jumper and added a free throw when fouled by Bill Witt. However, Denesia's two baskets gave Wayne a 48-43 advantage with 2 1/2 minutes remaining. He made it 50-43 with 1:55 left.

Hartington, again threatened to send the game into overtime on baskets by Doug Olsen and Dave Loverson. Only 50 seconds remained as the score stood 50-48.

Capitol News

Refuse Use of Federal Funds Wayne One of 15 Counties to

LINCOLN—Since 1954 Nebraska counties have had available to them in federal secondary road funds \$16,974,363. These are funds to be matched on a 50-50 basis with county funds to improve county secondary roads.

Most of the counties have used some of the Federal funds during the period but 15 have not used a penny. Highway department records show. All but five counties have lost at least part of their allocations during the period by not obligating the funds before they lapsed.

The highway department allows a year and a half for a county to obligate its Federal funds. Those not obligated by then are brought in either to be redistributed to other counties or to be used by the state.
