 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
 1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
 1 egg, slightly beaten
 1 1/4 cups egg nog
 1/4 cup butter, melted
 1 cup drained crushed pineapple
 Sifted confectioners' sugar-cinnamon mixture.

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and spices. Mix in brown sugar. Combine egg-egg nog and butter; add to dry ingredients, mixing just until moistened. Fold in pineapple. Fill greased muffin pans half full. Lightly sprinkle top of each muffin with confectioners' sugar-cinnamon mixture. Bake at 375 degrees for 20 minutes.
