Hearing Set Here Dec. 26

A hearing on the proposed merger of four Leslie precinct rural schools will be held by the Wayne County Reorganization committee Dec. 26, Chairman Gordon Nuernberger announced today.

The hearing will be held at 10 a.m. in the district courtroom. The call for the hearing followed strong disapproval of the proposal by the State Reorganization committee at a meeting Thursday in Lincoln.

The plan would dissolve Districts 4, 27 and 73 and attach them to District 25. Petitions requesting the merger were signed by more than the required 55 percent of eligible voters in the four districts.

In a letter to the County Reorganization committee, the State group said school district changes should be made only after careful study is made of the kind of education program which will result for the children involved. It emphasized the fact that construction of a new building should not be started.

The text of the State committee's letter, written by Acting Secretary Hubert H. Wolfe, is as follows:

"At its meeting Dec. 10, 1958 the State committee reviewed the petitions to dissolve Districts 4, 27 and 73 and attach them to District 25, Wayne county.

"The committee voted to express strong disapproval of the proposal. Changes in school district boundaries should be made only after careful consideration of the kind of educational program which is going to result for children involved.

"When changes are made, and especially when new facilities are contemplated, the legal voters should most certainly have assurance that plans fit into comprehensive planning for the entire area. Construction of a new building should not be undertaken under any circumstances.

"With high school students in this area attending two different high schools it is extremely difficult for the committee to see how this proposal will result in this area ever fitting into comprehensive districts in the future or ever being able to provide the advantages of a junior high school.

"The legal voters in this area should most certainly begin working toward the organization of a comprehensive district which can provide a complete program for all the pupils residing therein.

"Your committee should proceed with the hearing and other requirements necessary to complete action on these petitions as prescribed in the statutes.

"The County committee is required to hold the proposal 10 days following its hearing. It is then filed with the county superintendent who must hold a hearing to determine the validity of the petition. The districts can then be merged.

Wildcats to Battle Strong Plainsmen Quintet Friday

Wayne State players will travel to Lincoln Friday night hoping to break a jinx that has carried Nebraska Wesleyan's Plainsmen to six straight wins over the local crew.

Wayne has not beaten Wesleyan in basketball since their first game of the 1936-37 season. Wayne owns a 3-2 record thus far this season. Wesleyan was 2-2 before games with Omaha Tuesday and Deane tonight.

The Wildcats will face probably the most potent player in the NCC—Wesleyan's 6-5 Rudy Stoehr. Wayne broke into the conference race Thursday night with a 74-41 victory over Dana. The Viking visitors made it a contest until midway in the first half. Then Wayne's offense clicked to build a 33-22 lead at intermission.

Jerry Wisniewski turned in one of his best games in four years, hitting 21 of his 25 points in the second half.

Monday night the Wildcats outlasted a stubborn Westmar quintet 81-69. Neither the final score nor the 38-29 halftime margin indicated the closeness through most of the game. Though Wayne led most of the way, Westmar tied the count or went ahead briefly eight times. Larry Coney hit six fielders in the first 20 minutes, added seven more in the last half and dunked five free throws for a 31-point performance. That is one share of the local game record set by Bob Ennis in 1955 and equaled by Jim Whitney in 1957.

The 6-6 Pillger pivot mixed his shots, using his favorite overhead hook and several tip-ins. He also collected 16 rebounds. Ron Marcellus rebounded 12 times before leaving the game on fouls.

Ability to Handle People Is State Engineer's Big Asset

LINCOLN—How does a man in his 70's stand the rigorous job of managing Nebraska's multi-million dollar road program?

State Engineer Roy Cochran, who will be 74 Jan. 28, says he guarded his health well in his first year in office and got along fine. Cochran is nearly a lifetime of public service and from that he has learned by experience how to handle the pressure of such work.

A Democrat and as such governor of Nebraska for three terms—the first man in the state's history to claim that distinction—Cochran has been associated with road building for a quarter of a century. He was recently honored by the American Association of State Highway Officials for 25 years in the road construction profession.

Those who know Cochran well say his greatest asset besides his technical experience is his ability to handle people. They say he has a great capacity for understanding the other man's point of view even when his decision must be against the man with a problem.

The strain of office of state engineer—one of the busiest in the Capitol—is heavy, even for a young man. But Cochran says he has a cardinal rule—"I never do anything myself that someone else can do better."

In order to devote his full energy to the strenuous job, Cochran has made only one speech since being appointed state engineer a year ago. Whenever possible, he takes daily naps during his lunch hour. Every morning his wife drives him only half way to work and he walks the remainder of the distance. Also, when he can, he will take a walk at noon as well as at night.

Rehabilitation Division
A record 623 persons took on employment during the year ending June 30, 1959 despite being disabled.

The job of the division of rehabilitation in the State Education department is to do just that—rehabilitate those physically or mentally handicapped to the role of self-supporting individuals. Fred Novak, division director, reports that 1,478 other persons were either receiving or about to get help to return them to employment. Additionally, another 1,157 individuals were awaiting investigations of their situations to determine their eligibility for state aid. Novak says the "backlog" of those seeking help is building up at about a 70-a-month clip.

Before rehabilitation, the 623 persons earned combined wages of \$389,475 as against \$1,364,948 after being helped by the division. Aid includes a medical diagnosis and individual counseling and guidance. Medical aid includes artificial limbs, braces, hearing aids and glasses.

There are five district offices—at Omaha, Lincoln, Norfolk, Kearney and Scottsbluff. The division spent an average of \$709 for each of the 623 persons of which 339 were men and 224 women.

Herrington Leaves
State Tax Commissioner Fred Herrington this week left the office he has held for five years.

He resigned last August, effective this week, to become executive director of the Nebraska Citizens council, a private research group. Herrington said he has enjoyed watching county assessors improve their assessment. He enjoyed several things," Herrington stated. "One is the complete cooperation on the part of assessors and county officials."

The office of tax commissioner is one of the most difficult in the statehouse because it directly affects a vital part of the Nebraska scene—the pocketbook. Herrington said in administering tax laws, toes are stepped upon. "It can't be avoided and that's un-

pleasant," he added. "It's not enjoyable to have to administer penalties and it is not real enjoyable to maintain delegations of angry taxpayers but someone has to do it," Herrington continued.

Respected in the statehouse, Herrington said that he hopes he has held his first public job in private life, Herrington stated, a mistake can be made and is not publicized. But in government, every tiny one is exposed to public view, he added.

He concluded—"But I wouldn't have missed this for anything. I've learned a lot about government, administration and legislation. I wouldn't take anything for my experience."

Farm News and Views . . . Name No Matter, Efficiency Importance Shown by Study of Farm Account Records

Some folks are saying that we over-emphasize efficiency. They don't call it good management. No matter what it is called, it's important.

Agricultural mechanization is rapidly changing the amount of work a farmer can handle. Higher costs and lower prices keep continuous pressure on net income.

The farmer of today cannot farm like he did yesterday. He must constantly raise his sights to keep up with competition. Just how high does a farmer have to shoot to make full use of his labor, management ability and investment? A recent study of midwest farm account records shows the top third had 384 work units per man and a labor income of \$8,508 per farm. The lowest third earned only 309 work units per man and \$217 per farm labor income.

The same source showed the top third gross \$2,615 per \$1,000 invested in machinery; the low third \$1,386 per \$1,000 invested. The top-ranking dairyman in this study milked 28 cows, which produced 32,000 pounds of milk per year. His labor income per cow was \$243.

County Agent's Column . . . Continuous Antibiotic Feeding May Cut Its Effectiveness, Rotation Will Pay

ANTIBIOTIC FEED additives are now used in over 90 percent of the poultry and 75 percent of the commercial swine feeds sold. Agricultural experts point out that continuous feeding of a specific antibiotic may result in a decrease in its effectiveness.

This can occur because microorganisms in the animals develop resistance to a particular antibiotic or may be replaced by organisms not affected. Under excellent management conditions on concrete or clean pasture, continuous antibiotic feeding may not always be needed. Where feeding is done in dirt lots or barn yards, a yearly rotation of antibiotic feeding will pay. Good producers keep a record for future reference or specific antibiotics used.

INCOME TAX TIME just ahead, but you can still influence this year's tax bill by what you buy or sell in the next 2 1/2 weeks. If income was higher in 1959 than you expect in 1960, holding off sales until after the first of the year can postpone income into 1960. It works the other way, too.

Yuletide Dessert (Six servings) 3 eggs, beaten 1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed 1/4 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon rum flavoring 1 teaspoon vanilla 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1/2 cups egg nog 2 cups cottage cheese, steamed Whipped cream Nutmeg Gradually add brown sugar to eggs; beat until well mixed. Add salt, flavorings, lemon juice and egg nog; mix well. Stir in cottage cheese. Spoon into buttered custard cups or a 1 1/2 quart casserole. Set in baking pan and pour hot water into pan, 1 inch deep. Bake at 225 degrees for about 45 minutes for custard cups and 1 hour for casserole, or until silver line forms and top edge comes out clean. Serve warm or chill before serving. Sprinkle with whipped cream and sprinkle of nutmeg.
