## Explain Disability Proof Needed for Social Security

Disabled farmers are asking how they can prove to the Social Security administration that they are so disabled they can no longer do a substantial amount of work, according to Clifford Kittelson, Norfolk SS office manager. Applicants are asked to furnish evidence needed to support their applications for benefit payments. It is not necessary to bring the medical evidence when first contacting the Social Security office. At the proper time applicants will be given medical report forms which they leave with their doctors or hospitals for completion.

Copies of the last two years' income tax returns, evidence of the age of disabled applicants and birth certificates for their minor children will also be required.

## Police, Sheriff to Start Drive on Trash Violators

Wayne police and Sheriff Don Weible this week announced the start against offenders of the state law prohibiting dumping of trash or garbage in streets, alleys or highways.

County Judge David J. Hamer said his office will cooperate with the officials in enforcing the law which carries a minimum fine of \$25 for each violation. The maximum fine is \$100.

## WSTC Students Complete Teaching In Area Schools

Sixty-one WSTC students have completed two weeks of full-time teaching and living in other towns and Dr. Joe Nichols calls it the best experience yet in five years of the program.

The program provides an excellent link between WSTC and the schools. Dr. Nichols says, and it helps round out the students' teaching experiences.

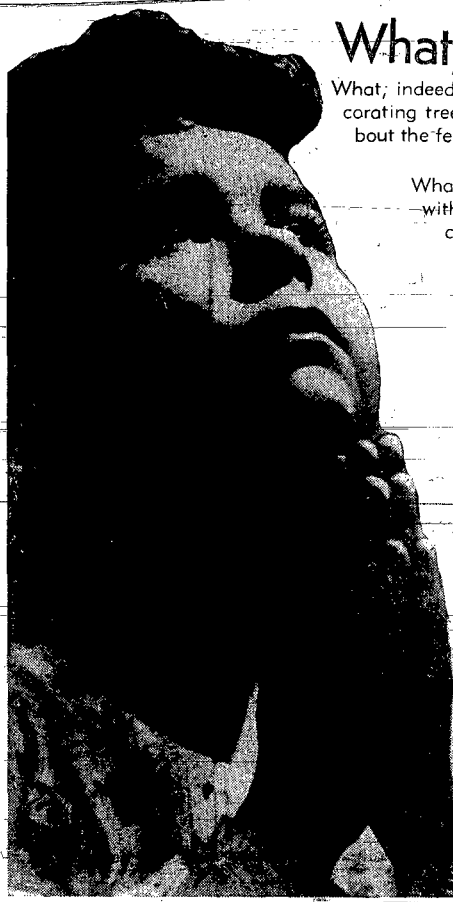
## Allen Student Vies for Scholarship at Oxford

## Vehicle Owners to Receive 1960 Tax Bills Next Week

Wayne county taxpayers will receive their 1960 motor vehicle tax statements next week, County Assessor Henry Arp announced this week.

The taxes will become due when the vehicle owners purchase 1960 license plates. County Treasurer Leona Bahde said sale of plates will start Jan. 2.

Both officials reminded taxpayers that it is necessary to bring both the 1959 registration certificate and 1960 tax statement in order to purchase new license plates. Motorists have until Mar. 1 to secure the new plates.

There is no change in licensing procedure or fees on passenger cars, farm trucks or trailers. Passenger car plates remain at \$8.

All commercial truck plate fees are also the same. Such trucks licensed for eight tons or more may secure a license for the first half of the year only.

Another new law is the license prorating law with other states for owners operating three or more trucks in Nebraska and other states.

All prorating information must be secured from Director Alvin Scissors, Nebraska Motor Vehicle department, Lincoln. This information will not be available at the county treasurer's office.

The table below gives a comparison of the taxes in Wayne on four-door, V-8 sedans for 1959 and 1960.

Wayne taxes on 1960 model cars range from \$56 for a two-door in the low priced field to \$131 for one of the luxury cars.

## Four States Represented In Holiday Cage Tourney

Basketball teams from four states will compete for the championship trophy in the second annual WSTC Christmas holiday basketball tournament Tuesday and Wednesday at Rice Memorial auditorium.

Entered in the meet are Gustavus Adolphus, St. Peter, Minn.; Augustana, Sioux Falls, S. D.; Morningside, Sioux City, and Wayne State.

Morningside and Gustavus are paired in the 7-30 Tuesday opener. Augustana will meet Wayne in the second game. Tuesday's losers will battle for consolation honors at 7:30 Wednesday, followed by championship tilt between the Tuesday winners.

Dakota Wesleyan won last year's tournament, downing Westminster in the finals. Wayne finished third ahead of Buena Vista.

None of the four teams in this year's tourney have met yet this season, making comparisons difficult. Wayne, however, boasted the best record a year ago, 17-8. Morningside won 14 games and represented the Iowa district in the NAIA Tourney at Kansas City. Gustavus finished strong, winning 16 of its last 13 games.

Gustavus is coached by Whitty Skoog, former University of Minnesota and Minneapolis Lakers star. He is in his third season as the Gustie mentor.

Two players who made the all-year will compete in the tourney. They are Morningside's Ken Stripling, who was second in top scoring a year ago, and Augustana's Bob Swanhorst, who was fifth in the scoring race.

## Hearing Planned Saturday Morning At Courthouse

Residents of four Leslie precinct school districts lashed out this week at the State Reorganization committee's disapproval of their plan for merger of the four schools.

A public hearing on the merger proposal will be held at 10 a.m. Saturday before the Wayne County Reorganization committee. The hearing will be held in the district courtroom at the county courthouse.

The merger would dissolve Districts 27 and 73 and merge them with District 25. The combined district would have an assessed valuation of about \$950,000. Current enrollment in the four districts is 40 students. Information circulated with petitions requesting the merger included a proposal that a new schoolhouse be located one mile east and one-half mile south of the present District 73 schoolhouse. This would be 7 1/2 miles south and eight east of Wayne.

Residents of the districts spoke out against the state disapproval of the plan which urged the residents not to undertake construction of a new building.

In answering the state charges, Clarke Kai, District 73 president, said: "Our situation is an immediate one. We cannot wait for the comprehensive action which the state is advocating."

"Our present buildings are not adequate," he continued, "are not modern and they do not meet with the state fire marshal's specifications. I feel that if we proceed with this building program, we will be able to pay for construction of a new building within 10 years and thus provide for the immediate needs of our children in the way of a modern building and educational program."

"Combining the four schools would mean reduction of the teaching staff to 100 members and would mean maintenance of only one building instead of four. These reductions in operating costs, over a period of 10 years, would more than offset the costs of construction."

Mrs. Wendell Korth, mother of two District 27 pupils, is one of the more avid backers of the merger proposal. She attacked the state's stand on the type of educational program to be offered.

"The plan to merge the four Leslie precinct districts has been carefully studied by parents in these districts," Mrs. Korth stated. "The present plan, which is scheduled for hearing Saturday, is what we believe to be the best solution for our children."

"Our area is located in an extreme corner of Wayne county with a school operating in about every four sections of land. With the present trend toward larger farming operations, there are now not enough children in four sections to efficiently operate a school."

"We feel combining these four districts into one and building a new school approved by the state fire marshal will allow us to operate an efficient school with a good educational program NOW. At the same time it will be fair to our local taxpayers who must pay the costs of school operation."

"Our present buildings are old." Mrs. Korth continued. "If the state proceeds to enforce its fire regulations governing schools, most of our buildings would not pass a close inspection."

"Mrs. Korth was also one of several mothers in the districts to object to having their small children ride to school on buses. 'My own family is fortunate enough to live on a graveled highway and the Wakefield school bus goes directly by our farm,' she said, 'still our second grader and fifth grader would have to board this bus about 7:45 in the morning and would not return home until about 5:15 in the evening.'

"Most of the mothers in the four districts are opposed to sending their small children to school on a bus. I feel that for the taxpayers to furnish a good educational program for our children is enough to expect of them. I feel the taxpayers' money should be spent for education and not for transportation."

Backers of the merger proposal cited a letter from Dr. Freedom Decker, state education commissioner, to Emil Kai, a former District 73 board member. In the letter Dr. Decker told Kai that the move to merge the four schools and build a new schoolhouse is perfectly legal, assuming the people vote the







necessary bond to pay for construction.

He also added there is not law on the books which would enforce restricting in two or five years. He pointed to the fact that action by the state and county reorganization committees is merely advisory and despite their action, the plan could be put through if the people want it.

Delloyd Meyer, District 25 secretary, spoke out against the state suggestion of waiting for a comprehensive plan. "Parts of our area have never been included in any comprehensive plan," he said. "It appears none of the surrounding schools wants us. Dixon county's plan includes only a portion of our area. We cannot wait for a comprehensive plan; the needs of our children are immediate."

Meyer also pointed out that 85 percent of the eligible voters in his district signed the merger petition, despite the fact our district is in an extreme corner of the new area and therefore would have cause for the most objections.

Dwight Jones, Mrs. Dora Wood and Robert D. Hansen, District 73 Clement Jones, Wales, Ia., Mr. and treasurer, pointed out savings in Mrs. Roland Jones, McPherson, Kan., Mr. and Mrs. Paul Kirby, Omaha, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Ell-

talling slightly over \$12,000 a year. Reducing the staff to two teachers would save enough to more than offset new school construction costs over a 40-year period," he said.

Several other residents of the area attacked the state suggestions. Their comments included: Darrell Puckett: "We believe we are entitled to educate our own children in the way we see fit and don't want them forcibly, as I see it, put into a town school. I believe my children are receiving a better education than they would in any town school."

Emil Kai: "About 97 percent of the parents of school children in the four districts involved are in favor of the merger plan. It is what the people want."

Mrs. Clarke Kai: "We believe this is the best solution for our children. They would enjoy a very good school building and an expanded educational program. We need schools like this to provide the 'meat and potatoes' type of education advocated recently by President Eisenhower."

Henry Koepke: "There isn't a

town school that wants us. None of them could handle our present enrollment of 40 students in their present facilities."

Oswal Puckett: "I don't have any school children, but I'm definitely in favor of the plan. It will surely benefit my four grandchildren."

Mrs. Emil Kai: "We don't like the idea of being railroaded into town schools."

Mrs. Darrell Puckett: "The biggest percentage of our children are in the lower grades. Buses would keep them at school or on the bus about 9 1/2 hours each school day."

Following Saturday's hearing, the County Reorganization committee is required to hold the petitions 10 days. During this 10-day period, names may be added or withdrawn from the petitions. They are then filed with the county superintendent, who must hold a hearing to determine the sufficiency of the petitions.

State law requires that 55 percent of the eligible voters in each district must approve the merger in order for it to go into effect. All the petitions presently have the required percentage or more.
