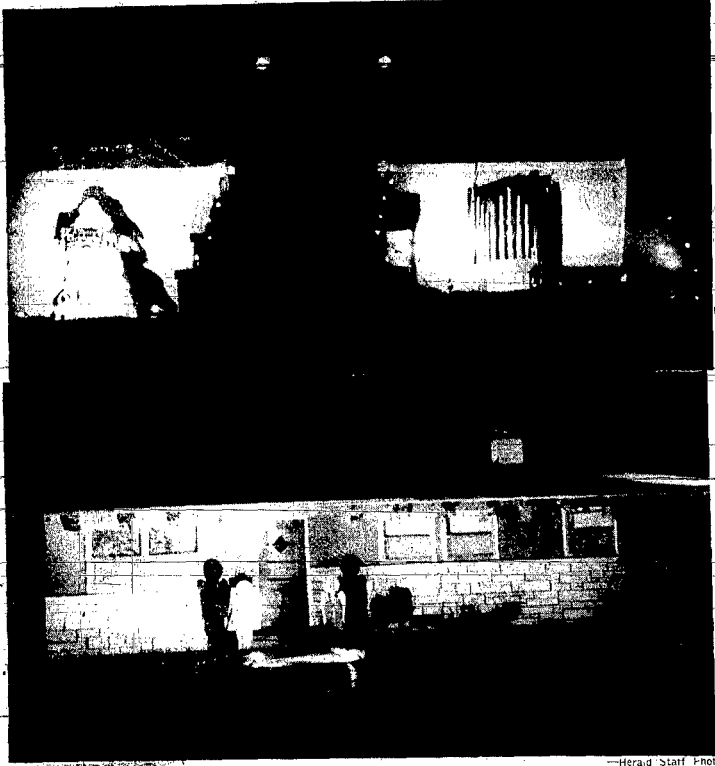

Plan Jan. 12 Final Hearing On Merger of Leslie Schools

A final hearing on the proposed merger of four Leslie precinct schools will be held Jan. 12, County Supt. Gladys M. Porter announced today.

The hearing will be before Mrs. Porter to determine the sufficiency of signatures on the petitions requesting the merger of Districts 4, 27 and 73 with District 25.

The petitions are now being held by the Wayne County Reorganization committee following a public hearing by that group Saturday morning at the courthouse.

The County committee is required to hold the petitions 10 days after its hearing to allow names to be added or withdrawn.

Residents of the districts have until Tuesday to add or withdraw their names from the petitions.

Saturday's hearing was conducted by Vice Chairman James Troutman, Winside, after Chairman Gordon Nuernberger with Drew Nuernberger is a resident of one of the districts involved.

Troutman read a letter from the State Reorganization committee strongly disapproving the merger proposal and any possible building program.

John Addison, attorney for the four districts, explained that the merger has been planned for several months. He pointed out that the valuation of the proposed new district would be over \$900,000 and that reductions of about \$6,000 could be made in current operating expenses of the districts through the merger.

Present buildings in the districts are old and do not meet the state fire marshal's specifications, Addison said.

The attorney further stated that no present comprehensive reorganization plan would solve the immediate problem of the four

districts. "In the event of such reorganization," he added, "the new building could serve as a K-4 or K-6 attendance unit."

An explanation of the present Wakefield school bus system was presented by Supt. Ross Korsgaard. He said the Wakefield school would be happy to set up a dual system to determine how bus could serve the four districts if the merger proposal is not carried out.

Nuernberger was the only spokesman for opposition to the merger. He said the reorganization would lump patrons from three communities into one district. He also pointed out that the state fire marshal's regulations would apply to new as well as old schools.

He asked the group not to take issue with the State Reorganization committee for expressing its opinion of the merger. "The majority rules and we can still do what we want," he declared.

Babson's Forecast Predicts Narrow Republican Victory in 1960 U.S. Elections

Says School Teaching Will Become Part of Our National Defense

By Roger W. Babson 1. Naturally, as I am just back from Moscow and Berlin, my first thoughts are what will happen to Berlin in 1960. My answer is definitely, "NOTHING WILL HAPPEN." Mr. K will make no more ultimatums; President Eisenhower will continue his peace talks. Therefore the Berlin situation will be just the same in 1960 and 1961 as it is today.

2. There will be no World War started between Russia and the United States in 1960. This does not mean that such a war will not come within 10 years; but just now neither country is ready for it. I am convinced of this after my recent visit to Moscow.

3. Airplane warfare with the dropping of bombs is a thing of the past. We are turning to rocketry with pinpoint precision. Our expensive air bases may gradually be vacated.

4. Moscow is Mr. K's "pride and joy." It is a beautiful city with broad streets and thousands of new apartment houses. Mr. K does not want it destroyed. Furthermore, he wants a reduction in armaments so that he will have money to raise the standard of living in Russia. I forecast he will have to do this in order to hold his power.

5. We first feared a "shooting war," now we are in a "cold war," but we will soon be in an "educational war." In 1960 the United States will expend far greater effort on education.

6. Along with the effort to improve education during 1960, forecast that our teachers will be given a minimum salary of \$5,000 and that schools of all states will receive Federal aid.

7. I forecast that instead of spending so much money on new school buildings, municipalities will give more attention to disciplining, promoting and sifting the teaching of mathematics, physics and chemistry in both grammar and high schools.

8. I forecast that some of those who have gone into business will seek teaching jobs, which will be a major force in postponing World War III. School teaching will be a part of our national defense.

9. The Russians are afraid of China, which I hope to visit again in 1960. Hence, I forecast that more friendly relations will develop between China and the United States during 1960.

10. Space travel to the moon is largely for propaganda purposes and to take our minds off of the military phases of rocketry, submarines and breaking the earth's crust. Only the fear of retaliation will prevent the Russians from starting a world war.

11. I will now forecast who the Republican candidates in 1960 will be—Nixon and Rockefeller.

12. The Democratic candidates cannot now be forecast. Senator Kennedy thinks he has the nomination "sewed up"; but Johnson and Symington, and even Stevenson, have large followings.

13. I forecast that relations with Russia will become far more important than the question of inflation.

14. The Republican slogan in 1960 will be, "It is always dangerous to swap horses going across a rapid stream." I therefore forecast that the Republicans will have at least a 50-50 chance of success in 1960.

Wayne County Assessment Begins JANUARY 1

All Personal Property Owners and Those 21 to 60 Subject to Old Age Assistance or Head Tax Are Required to File!

Nebraska Revenue Laws:

- 77-409 County assessor shall examine and check all returns of personal property for taxation. He shall have the power to examine under oath the person making the return to determine that all personal property of the taxpayer is listed for taxation at its actual value.
- 77-1229 Every person owning personal property is required to make out and verify a statement of all such property, which shall be delivered to the county assessor on or before March 1.
- 77-1235 Where any person fails, or refuses to make out and deliver the statement required, the county assessor shall evaluate the article of property belonging to that person and shall add 50 percent to the value returned.

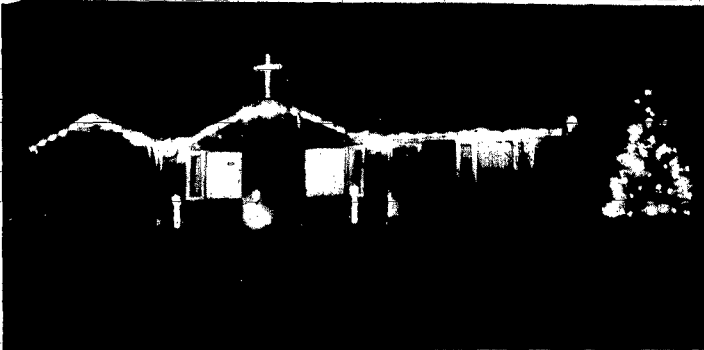

chinery should be higher because of the growing demand for automation to offset the rise in wages.

28. Steel products (especially stainless) — from the tableware used in homes to the steel used to build bridges — will be in greater demand in 1960.

29. The demand for most food products will increase during 1960. This should especially help the United Fruit company, as bananas give the most nourishment, at the least cost, of any known food.

30. I forecast increases in rents, maintenance and taxes. But super-markets will compete with one another and the housewife should benefit therefrom.

Florida is a good place for middle-aged people to buy a home in a small city as insurance for the time when they retire. Persons

buying such homes should depend upon a check from the North every month and not depend upon getting a job in Florida. Even today in Florida one person in 10 is over 65 years of age.

31. The price of city real estate will depend upon its parking privileges. Wise municipal officials will pull down old two and three story buildings to make parking lots and municipal garages much more plentiful.

32. The above also applies to suburban real estate. I forecast that new suburban zoning laws will require houses to have vacant adjoining lots sufficient for present and future parking needs.

33. The demand for modern styles and for centrally located apartments will continue to increase during 1960.

34. I forecast that those building a "single" house for their own occupancy will also provide an apartment for rent.

35. I forecast that large commercial farms should be profitable in 1960, but many operators of small farms, not properly located for suburban growth, will sell to some adjoining farmers.

36. Small farms on well-drained land and near enough to a city for future suburban developments should be held. I forecast such farms should some day sell for triple their present price.

37. Seashore property should be held. The government can print more bonds and corporations can split and declare stock dividends to make more stocks; but only God can make seashore property.

38. I forecast that real estate taxes will increase during 1960. Wise are property owners who make their rentals "plus annual taxes."

39. As the Russians gradually move westward like a glacier, taking ownership of all property, wise people in Europe will sell their present property and businesses and move to the United States.

40. I forecast that revolutions in mining will continue during 1960 and you may find that you are living on a valuable iron deposit, if not on a gold mine!

41. For the first time in the 40 years that I have been preparing these annual outlooks, I shall not take a position on the Dow Jones average for 1960. I am, however, inclined to believe that the stock market in general will hold up at least until after the election. Then there may come a break, which

ever party wins the election next November.

42. I forecast that 1960 will be the year to buy good bonds. United States Government bonds yielding five percent are a great bargain. Anyone buying them is bound to make money. I also like all non-taxable bonds and also some taxable but convertible bonds.

43. As I forecast some chemical stocks will still be a buy in 1960, although they yield little income and are good only as growth stocks.

44. There will be failures by the thousands among those companies now issuing electronics stocks. Electronics issues have become a popular fad. There is also unemployment ahead for many who are now working in electronics factories.

45. I forecast that the stocks of electric power companies, but not those of large cities, will be in greater demand in 1960.

46. Of all stocks, I forecast that United Fruit may be most in demand in 1960.

47. I predict that only a few railroads will be popular during 1960, such as Canadian Pacific, Union Pacific, Northern Pacific and perhaps Southern Pacific and Alchison Railroad, New York Central, New Haven and all short lines except for the Norfolk & Western, my "pet gravity road." I also fear a short railroad strike.

48. Failures will continue to increase during 1960.

49. I forecast that the huge national roadbuilding program will give an uplift to business as it progresses.

50. There will be no marked changes in money rates during 1960. Inflation will gradually continue, but may not be serious during 1960.

The best investment policy during 1960 will continue to be a well-diversified portfolio with one-third in stocks for possible growth profits, one-third in bonds for safety and income and one-third in cash in order to have funds available for investment in the severe and sudden drop in the stock market which will come some day.

CONCLUSION
The three handicaps to American business in 1960 will be increasing installment purchases, the unfair demands of labor union leaders and President Eisenhower's physical condition. The three hopes for America are our churches, our schools and our praying parents.

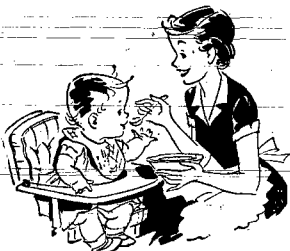

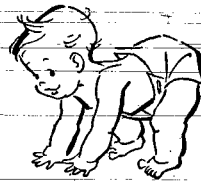

Capitol News

Delephant's New Year's Wish For More Capitol Visitors

LINCOLN—James Delephant says one of his New Year's wishes is for more Nebraskans to visit the state capitol. Delephant is superintendent of the statehouse and its grounds.

"We like to have people visit," Delephant says. "Our office is always open to tell of the fine qualities of the Capitol. We are doing everything to keep it in good condition."

There are some 1,800 persons in the building—more population than many Nebraska towns. Delephant has a staff of 67 men and women who help keep the building in operation.

Two persons are painting continually, year around, in the huge structure. There are electricians, plumbers, janitors, yard workers and others who clean windows and places not touched by janitors.

Delephant beams when discussing the building to anyone. He mentions the cleanup work he has done since assuming the position a year ago.

As many as 5,000 persons in a single day have tramped through the structure and take the trip to the tower to view Lincoln from the air, Delephant says. "All in all," the superintendent continues, "they are pretty careful of the building."

In 1959, Delephant twice opened the Capitol at night to give those who work in the daytime an opportunity to come see the structure and bring their families. Last April 9,700 persons visited the statehouse during five nights that it was open. This week Delephant opened the building at night for three days.

Gravel Roads
In one of his final statements before ending his second term as state engineer, Roy Cochran said he feels there should be more gravel roads converted to dustless surfacing.

Cochran said he thinks a half million dollars should be taken from Highway department maintenance funds in 1960 and be used

to put a light armor coat on gravel roads where this can be done. Kansas does this type of work and it has been quite successful, Cochran said.

The engineer said his proposal would cost about \$2,000 to \$3,000 per mile and the saving would be enough to return the investment in two or three years because of reduced maintenance costs.

Gravel roads require a heavy expenditure to keep them in passable condition.

Interstate Highway
Another study by the State Highway department has recommended location of the Interstate highway north of the Platte river between Grand Island and North Platte. However, the Advisory State Highway commission postponed a decision until January.

J. R. McBride, commission member from Minden, has been leading a move to get a route approved south of the Platte. He praised the department for its latest study. McBride said his only concern is that the commission does not make a mistake in locating the route and be sorry about it later.

Health Laboratories
At its January meeting, the State Board of Health is expected to take up recommendations made by the Kansas City regional office of the U. S. Public Health Service.

The office recommended that Health department laboratories in the Capitol be moved and that the board consider the possibility of dropping its branch laboratory at Scottsbluff.

Also suggested by the office which sent a team to survey the department was that pay should be hiked for laboratory personnel.

Truck Registration
Nebraska in 1960 will begin prorating registration of interstate trucks. Interstate truckers will pay Nebraska fees based on the amount of miles traveled in this state compared to the total a certain com-

pany travels in all states. For instance, if 10 percent of a truck line's traffic is in Nebraska, it would pay 10 percent of the amount it would cost to register the entire fleet in this state.

Alvin Scissors, State Motor Vehicle department director, says the law is designed to give to Nebraska revenue it has lost in the last four or five years to western and surrounding states.

There will be no change in distribution of fees to the counties and the State Highway department.

Political Decision
Secretary of State Frank Marshall's office, starting in January, will become the hub of much activity in the statehouse. That is where state office seekers must complete their filings.

Although the filing deadline is in March, many political decisions will either be made or begin taking form the first month of the new year. This has been traditionally the case in election years.

Some earlybirds are already in the ring. A flood of others will follow in the next three months.

Farm News and Views... Forecast Sluggish Winter Corn Prices; Jan. 31 Deadline for Decision on Taxes

LOOK FOR SLUGGISH winter corn prices say agricultural economists. It will be late spring before the loan program can tie up enough corn to put upward pressure on the market.

The high moisture content of the crop in the western Corn Belt has definitely delayed the movement of new corn under the loan program. The same delayed harvest kept prices high enough in November so that many central and eastern Corn Belt farmers sold some of their new crop, partially satisfying the early needs of the trade.

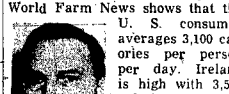
GOOD MILK production is due more to management and feeding than heredity, says an agricultural service. Research at Wisconsin and Minnesota shows inheritance alone accounts for only about a third of a cow's production. Now is the time of year when dairymen will be well paid for a little extra care in barn feeding and in their milking practices. Present grain costs make it poor business to skimp on feeding concentrates.

IS YOUR FARM incorporated? If so, and if your fiscal year ends Dec. 31, 1959, you have until Jan. 31, 1960 to elect whether to pay taxes on corporation profits or pass profits and losses directly to stockholders.

Generally, smaller corporations will benefit by doing this, says an agricultural tax specialist. Since this provision was written into the 1958 tax law, many farms have incorporated.

Spent Money to Make Money
Do you feed straight corn because you have a crib full and protein costs money? Do you skimp on fertilizer when ready cash is short? Do you buy a boar just because he sells cheap? Too many farmers do this and think they're saving money. Actually these are the kind of decisions that cost money.

One of the best money-making tools a farmer has is wise use of credit. Credit is available if you can show how it will make you money. A definite plan for repayment is a must. The interest you pay can be your best bargain.

1960 MOTOR VEHICLE LICENSE INFORMATION

- 1. The 1960 Motor Vehicle License Plates will go on sale at the County Treasurer's Office in Wayne on Saturday, Jan. 2.
2. New License Plates will be issued for all Motor Vehicles for 1960.
3. License fees remain the same as in 1959 on all vehicles.
4. There will be two plates for passenger cars, but only one plate for all trucks and trailer, motorcycles and dealers.
5. TO SECURE 1960 PLATES YOU MUST PRESENT:
A. Your 1959 registration certificate for the vehicle.
B. Your 1960 Motor Vehicle Tax Bill for the vehicle.
LICENSE CANNOT BE ISSUED UNLESS YOU HAVE BOTH THESE PAPERS. If the 1959 registration certificate is lost, a duplicate must be issued at a cost of \$1.00.
6. The Motor Vehicle Tax bills have been mailed to you by County Assessor Henry Arp. If your vehicle was licensed for 1959 in another county or another state, it will be necessary for you to secure a tax bill from the Wayne County Assessor.
7. SEMI-ANNUAL TRUCK PLATES: Commercial Trucks bearing licenses of 8 tons or more may be licensed for the first half of the year by payment of one-half the annual fee plus an added charge of \$5.00 per truck. Full year's tax must be paid on such registration, Special truck plates will be issued.
8. PRO-RATION TRUCK REGISTRATIONS: Fleets of three or more commercial trucks operating in Nebraska and other states may prorate their license fees with Nebraska and other states. Arrangements for such registrations must be made with Mr. Alvin Scissors, Director of the Nebraska State Department of Motor Vehicles, at Lincoln.
9. HOUSE TRAILERS: All House Trailers which are not licensed for 1960 must secure a special \$2.00 Permit Plate, and the 1960 tax must be paid at the same time.
10. All 1960 plates must be secured before March 1, 1960.

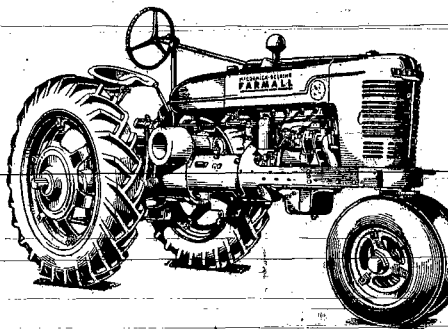

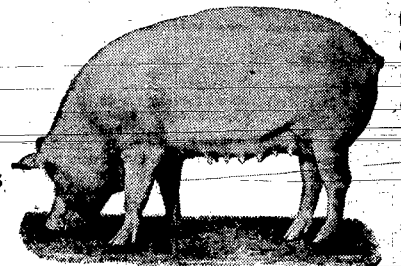
