White Sox Coach to Speak at Old-Timers Baseball Meeting

Record Attendance Seen Wednesday at City Auditorium

Chicago White Sox Coach Don Guttridge will be featured speaker at the sixth annual NE Nebraska Old-Timers Baseball association meeting Wednesday night at the Wayne city auditorium.

Advance ticket sales point to a record attendance. Chairman Norris Weible said today. The meeting will start at 8 p.m. Registration for the "stag" affair will be held from 7 to 8.

Association officials stressed the point that the meeting is not a closed affair and is open to all persons interested in baseball. They particularly cited the fact that boys may attend. The association is planning to sponsor Little League baseball in the area.

A highlight of the program will be the presentation of special awards to five NE Nebraska old-time baseball players. District Judge Lyle E. Jackson, Neligh, will present awards to Marlin Ringer, Wayne; Perry Dunaway, Plainview; Fred Forsberg, Wilmot; Vac Kanda, Yorkville; and Frank Malone, Madison.

Genial Don Cunningham, Sioux City Livestock Exchange secretary and long-time supporter of area baseball, will serve as master of ceremonies. Chamber President Ted Armbruster will give the welcome. The business meeting will also include election of officers.

Musical numbers will be furnished by a WSTC quartet composed of Robbie Myers, John Bernthal, Clarence Schubert and John Kessler. Guttridge will conduct a question-and-answer period following his talk. Refreshments and a reminiscing session will conclude the program.

As a player, Guttridge was best known as a peppery second baseman for the St. Louis Cardinals in the era of the famous

"Gas House Gang" He joined the Cards in 1934 after breaking into baseball in 1932 with Lincoln of the old Nebraska State league.

During World War II, Guttridge closed out his major-league playing career with the St. Louis Browns. He managed Colorado Springs to Western league pennants in 1952 and 1953. After a successful year at the helm of Memphis he was called up to the Chicago board of strategy in 1955.

This will be the first time the annual meeting has been held in Wayne. The previous five meetings were held at Norfolk.

Alfred Sydow First to File for Primary Vote

Alfred G. Sydow, Wayne, this week became the first candidate to file for the May 10 primary election in Wayne county. He filed for re-election to a six-year term as director of the Wayne County Public Power district.

County Clerk C. A. Bard said Mar. 11 is the deadline for filing written applications for spots on the primary ballot. Incumbent officials who intend to seek another office must file by Mar. 1.

Only three other county offices will be included in the election. The term of Ed Grubb, Wayne, also expires as an REA director. Terms of County Commissioner George Stolz and Judge David J. Hamer will also expire.

County Clerk C. A. Bard was re-appointed board clerk. Archie Wert was renamed to a five-year term on the Soldiers and Sailors Relief committee.

The latter group will appoint the county veteran's service officer whose annual salary was set at \$1,650 by the commissioners. Other committee members are Jean A. Boyd, Winside; Gust Johnson Carroll; Fred Green, Hoskins; and Paul Mines, Wayne.

In other action Tuesday the board voted to set aside \$500 in the 1960-61 budget to match an Ak-Sar-Ben grant for new buildings and repairs at the county headquarters. The Wayne Herald was designated as the official county newspaper.

Appointed to the county board of health were Sheriff Don Weible, Dr. Roy Matson and County Supt. Gladys Porter.

City Council Adopts Three New Traffic Rules Tuesday

Three ordinances aimed at improving traffic flow throughout the city were passed at a meeting of the Wayne city council Tuesday night.

The new traffic rules will go into effect Feb. 11, 30 days after their passage. The changes adopted Tuesday were:

- 1) Increases the speed limit to 30 miles per hour on Seventh street through the city and on Main street south of First and north of Fourth. The limit remains at 25 miles per hour in the rest of the city.
- 2) Establishes First, Third, Pearl and Logan streets as arterial streets with side traffic controlled by stop signs at all intersections. Pearl and Logan will become through streets from Third north to the city limits.
- 3) Institutes 30-degree angular parking, as is currently used on Main street, on First, Second and Third streets between Pearl and Logan and on the east side of Pearl between First and Third.

The council also instructed Attorney Budd Bornholt to notify the State Highway department that installation of a school lane signing series be effected as soon as possible so that the stop light at Eleventh and Main can be removed

Recess Hearing on Leslie Precinct Merger Petitions

County Supt. Gladys M. Porter Tuesday called an indefinite recess of her hearing on petitions to merge four Leslie precinct school districts.

The recess was called after legal questions arose at the public hearing Tuesday morning at the Wayne courthouse. The hearing was called to determine the validity and sufficiency of the merger petitions.

The main question developed over the signatures of Mr. and Mrs. Milford Kay on the District 27 petition. Mrs. Porter had announced that signatures on the four petitions all met the 35 percent required by state law.

An affidavit was filed by Gordon Nuerbergen, District 27 resident and County Reorganization chairman, challenging the signatures of Mr. and Mrs. Kay. He asserted that the Kays were not legal voters of District 27 since they had moved to Wakefield Jan. 5.

County Attorney Charles McDermott said the purpose of the hearing was to determine if Kays were residents of District 27 when the petitions were filed with Mrs. Porter Jan. 6.

John Addison, attorney for the school boards requesting the merger, then filed an affidavit from Kays stating they were residents of District 27 at the time of the filing with Mrs. Porter. Later Tuesday the Kays appeared before Mrs. Porter to take oral oaths to the effect they were qualified voters of District 27.

Following the introduction of the affidavits, the meeting was recessed to allow Mrs. Porter to study the information presented before making her decision.

McDermott told Mrs. Porter that it was his opinion the merger petitions were sufficient and legal as long as the Kays gave written and oral oaths that they were legal voters of the district.

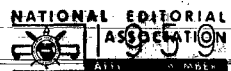

Blue Devils Hit New Mark; Overwhelm Madison 105-44

Wayne High's Blue Devils established their second school record of the week Friday night as they overcame hapless Madison 105-44 at the city auditorium.

The 105-point total broke the record set against Pierce Dec. 22, 1955 in a 101-36 victory. Last Tuesday night Roger Denesia scored 49 points to set a new school record for individual single-game performance.

The victory ran Wayne's Husker conference mark to 3-0 and gave the Blue Devils a 6-1 record for the season. Wayne leads the Husker West division standings and can improve its record Friday night against a potent Stanton quintet at Stanton.

Coach Harold Maciejewski made a vain attempt to hold down Friday's score by using 13 men, all he had suited for the fray. His efforts were useless, however, as the reserves poured in 27 points in the final period. Wayne's regulars sat out the final 11 minutes of the game.

The Blue Devils hit a torrid 53 percent for the evening, dropping 46 of 87 attempts from the field. Roger Denesia got the ball rolling in the first period, collecting 17 points. He finished the half with 25 and had a total of 31 for the night, playing only 19 1/2 minutes. The 5-11 senior now has 227 points in seven games, an average of 32.4.

Sparked by Denesia's 17 points, Wayne took a 29-11 lead in the first quarter. Denny Johnson came off the bench in the second quarter to lead another spurt. He hit four of five shots from the field as Wayne raced to a 50-26 advantage at intermission. The Blue Devils hit 10 of 18 shots in the second quarter.

Maciejewski started his regulars in the third quarter and they promptly hit six of seven shots from the field to widen the gap to 62-26. It was 71-28 when the reserves took over with three minutes left in the period.

Don Larsen, Buster Likes and Kenny Denesia took over the scoring duties in the final quarter as Wayne racked up 27 points. Denesia garnered 10.

There were several encouraging points for Maciejewski in looking forward to future games. Most promising was the improved play of Don Larsen, the 6-6 sophomore, and Bob Proett.

Larsen showed greatly improved rebounding ability although

his shooting still leaves something to be desired. He finished with nine points. Proett, who had his first starting role, hit 11 points, eight of them in the third quarter.

If Larsen continues his rapid improvement, he could well be the important factor in how far Wayne goes. His height solves the one major problem facing Maciejewski: lack of rebounding strength.

Third Place Wildcats Set For Two-Game Chadron Trip

Wayne State's Wildcats, currently tied for third place in the NCC standings, will travel to Chadron this week for a Friday-Saturday doubleheader.

Wayne ripped Hastings 83-51 Friday night, then traveled to Ainsworth and downed Kearney 91-78 Saturday night. The victories gave Wayne a 3-1 loop mark and a tie with Peru behind Wesleyan and Midland.

Wesleyan is expected to boost its record to 7-0 this weekend in games with Doane and Concordia. Midland, which met Concordia Tuesday night, must face Hastings and Kearney this weekend. Peru meets the same two teams.

Wayne displayed some of its best team action this season in rapping Hastings and Kearney. Though Larry Coney improved his scoring average (to 22 points) with 24- and 32-point performances, the Wildcats presented a balanced attack in both games. At Hastings Jerry Wisnieski contributed 15 points, Larry Berres 14 and Ron Raver 12. Against Kearney Wisnieski tallied 19, Berres 13 and Raver 12.

Hastings jumped to an 11-3 lead, then went cold as Wayne pulled out to a 36-21 advantage at intermission. The Broncos came within seven points, 49-42, midway in the second half. Coach Al Svenningsson poured in subs in the final five minutes and they continued the Wayne onslaught.

The Wildcats were never in serious trouble against Kearney, although the Antelopes made it tough all the way. Wayne led 44-28 at the half.

Dick Pineda, Wayne's pint-sized guard (5-8 and 140 pounds), played nearly half the game and drew praise from Svenningsson for his ball handling. It was Pineda's longest tour of duty in two varsity seasons. Svenningsson also cited Berres for deft play both on offense and defense.

Coney hit 16 of 17 free throw attempts and eight field goals to tie the Wayne single game record of 32 points set by Bob Ennis and Jim Whitney.

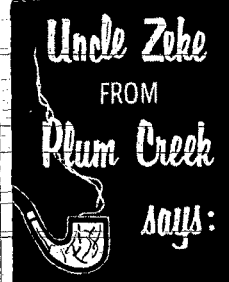
