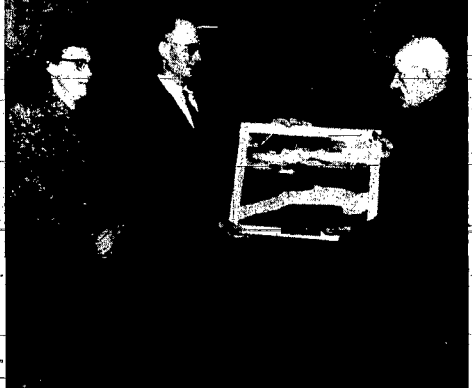

Electric Heat No Thing of Future for County Family

Electric heating is no longer a thing of the future to one Wayne county farm family. And according to them it's a source of heat that's here to stay.

The Ray Agler family is now living in their new farm home 2 1/2 miles northwest of Wayne. The eight-room home, completed after nearly two years of construction, is heated entirely by electricity.

Each room has its own individual heating unit and automatic thermostatic temperature control. Baseboard units are used in the upstairs bedroom and living room. Fast-heating wall units have been installed in the bathroom and near the front door to provide extra, quick heat.

Basement rooms, including the recreation room where the Aglers' three children, Johnny, Lou Ann and Donna Rae, spend much of their time, also utilize wall-type heaters.

The first question asked by most people about the house and its heating system is the cost of operation. The majority are somewhat amazed by the figures, Agler said.

Economical operation is insured by adequate use of insulation. Cost of heating the eight-room

house in November was estimated by Agler at \$14. The cost for December was \$24.

Adequate insulation is an essential prerequisite to prevent heat loss. Both polyethylene and styrofoam were used liberally in the Agler residence to guard against dampness. Six inches of carefully placed ceiling insulation and three inches of wall insulation reduce heat losses to a minimum.

During the recent power stoppage, temperatures inside the Agler home dropped only 17 degrees in 17 hours. Inside temperature was still 55 degrees when electrical service was restored.

A conveniently located control panel in the basement gives positive control over all electrical circuits on the farm.

Exhaust fans in the kitchen, bathroom and basement, plus an automatic dehumidifier in the wash room keep moisture at a comfortable level.

Months of planning, combined with information supplied by the Wayne County Public Power District, went into the design of the Agler home.

Completed costs of the heating system, including wiring and installation of heating units, was approximately \$1,250, Agler said.
