## Need Cited For Future Expansion

Wayne State's campus will soon expand by 47 1/2 acres to accommodate future growth of the college, President W. A. Brandenburg announced today.

As soon as legal formalities are completed, the college will take possession of farm land adjoining the football field to the east and north. The owner is Aletha Johnson.

The State Normal board approved the purchase at its Jan. 14 meeting and Gov. Ralph G. Brooks later added his authorization. Money for the purchase will come from the state institutional and military building fund.

The new land, Dr. Brandenburg said, will permit future growth and also relieve present crowded conditions on the campus.

"The college expects an enrollment of not less than 2,000 students by 1970," he said. "This is based on careful study of the school population in the area served by our college and on enrollment trends of the past 10 years."

"If the college is to serve the larger enrollment, it must make additions to its physical plant. The land purchase is essential for this growth."

The south border of the new land lies along an extension of the north campus road (formerly Fourteenth street) east to include a grove of trees and an abandoned farm house.

The present campus covers about 60 acres.

## Leslie School Merger Gets Approval; Effective May 17

County Supt. Gladys M. Porter Tuesday took final steps for approval of the merger of four Leslie precinct school districts.

Recovering her Jan. 12 hearing, Mrs. Porter declared petitions from residents of the four districts were valid and sufficient. She set May 17 as the effective date of the merger.

The reorganization will merge Districts 4, 27 and 73 with District 25. Information circulated with the merger petitions included a proposal to build new schoolhouses centrally located in the new district. The construction must be approved at a special meeting of voters of the new district, however.

There is the possibility of legal action to stop the merger following Mrs. Porter's decision Tuesday. Gordon Nuernberger, District 27 resident, had challenged the signatures of two voters, Mr. and Mrs. Milford Kay, on the District 27 petition at the Jan. 12 hearing.

However, the Kay's offered sworn affidavits they were legal residents of District 27. Without the Kay signatures, the District 27 petition does not contain the necessary 55 percent of legal voters in the district.

The combined valuation of the new district would be about \$950,000. Current enrollment in the four schools is about 40 students.

## Charges Pending on Iowa Youth After Saturday Accident

County Attorney Charles McDermott was expected to file charges in Wayne County court later this week following a two-car crash at Seventh and Windom streets Saturday.

Cars driven by Kenneth Fuhrman, Sutherland, Ia., and Mrs. Vermer Fischer, Wakefield, collided at the intersection about 9:45 p.m. The two cars are pictured in the photos at left.

Safety Patrolman Donald Matejka said he was pursuing the Fuhrman vehicle into Wayne from the east when the accident occurred. Fuhrman said he passed a car in town, could not get back into his own lane and applied his brakes. His car then skidded into the path of the Fischer vehicle.

Matejka said skid marks from the Fuhrman car melted the ice on the street for 110 feet. Fuhrman was treated at the Wayne hospital for facial cuts.

Mrs. Fischer is hospitalized at Wakefield with multiple bruises and lacerations of the right arm and knee.

Thomas O'Boyle, Hornick, Ia., a passenger in the Fuhrman car, was unharmed.

## Judge Hamer Files for Second Term in Primary

Mar. 11 is the deadline for filing for the primary election. Incumbents who intend to seek another office must file by Mar. 1.

## City School Board Approves Annexation of 30-Acre Plot

A petition asking for transfer of approximately 30 acres of District 88 land to District 17 was approved by Wayne City Schools board Monday night.

Nearly 63 percent of the District 88 patrons signed the petition releasing the land. A minimum of 55 percent is required by law.

The county reorganization committee will now have to set a date for hearing on the proposal following which the plan will be submitted to the state committee. Action in the state committee will probably come at the March meeting, County Supt. Gladys Porter said.

The land is a tract at the northwest corner of Wayne recently purchased by Carhart Lumber company from Frank Gilbert. Carhart's will take possession Mar. 1.

In other action the board offered Supt. E. W. Willert a three-year contract and approved bills totaling \$3,867.37.

Two musical programs are on the WSTC convention schedule Tuesday. Both concerts at the administration building auditorium are open to the public.

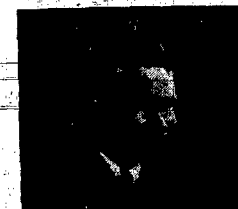
The first, at 10 a.m., brings a familiar performer back to Wayne pianist Theodore Ullman. This will be his third campus concert, including one last year.

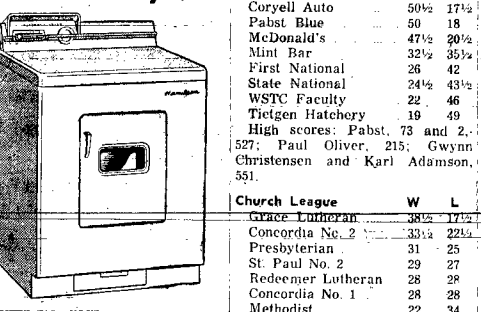

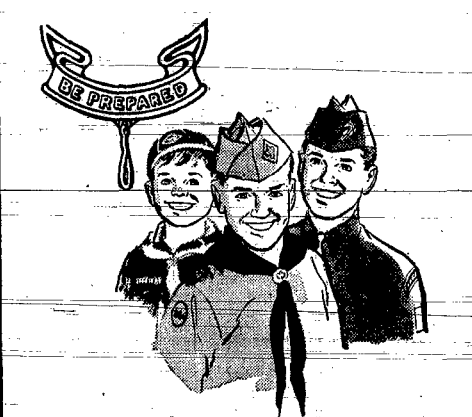

Capitol News

Railway Commission Affect Powerful Force in Nebraska

Three elected officials in the statehouse have much power over ordinary things in the daily lives of Nebraskans.

Powers of the commission are broad. They include regulation of rates, service and general control of transportation.

Commissioners are elected on political tickets for staggered six-year terms, receiving \$8,000 per year salary.

Larson will be up for re-election this year. Brower's term continues until 1965 and Swanson's until 1963.

Billboards

A group of state senators will again wrestle with the problem of billboards along the Interstate highway.

The question is one of many being considered by a group of senators, headed by George Syas, Omaha, which is studying outdoor recreation as a legislative council committee.

The council is composed of state senators who sit between sessions to study government problems in the fall before the session starts.

legislative action. Advertising interests have proposed that a council be established that could control billboards along the Interstate with the power to designate certain spots as scenic areas and prohibit signs in those regions.

Those opposing billboards on the Interstate right-of-way claim they would mar beauty of the state and possibly cause traffic hazards by obstructing view of motorists.

Proponents of the billboard ban say the 1961 Legislature must act in order to get a "bonus" offered by the Federal government. But opponents say the bonus is a "myth" since no funds have been set aside by the Federal government in its budget for distribution to states that prohibit the big signs along right-of-way.

Highway Commission

Ray Ogier, North Platte, has again been named chairman of the Advisory State Highway commission. Commission members re-elected J. R. McBride, Minden, vice chairman. Ogier was instructed to take necessary steps to obtain a full time secretary.

The commission also decided to continue meeting the fourth Monday of each month except in February when the normal Feb. 22 date was switched to Feb. 29 to avoid a conflict with Washington's birthday.

Politics

The Republican party has launched a series of events designed to put some money into its empty treasury to grid for the 1960 campaign. Kickoff event was in Omaha at which Sen. Barry Goldwater, Arizona, was a featured speaker. The \$50-per-plate affair produced a gross of \$77,250, party officials said.

National Committeeman Donald Ross, Omaha, tabbed the dinner as the largest political fund raising

dinner in history in either party in the state. There were some 1,250 persons on hand.

Democrats are not expected to be idle either in the gathering of money category. Traditionally it's been tough for the party out of power to get funds to take over government control again. It is expected that two battles will produce a lot of spending on both sides — governor and U. S. Senate — in the general election next November.

Education

Another petition drive aimed at making the office of state education commissioner elective instead of appointive may be in the works. Members of the Nebraska School Improvement association agreed to resume efforts to make the post elective through a petition drive to bring about a constitutional amendment.

The association undertook a similar drive before but failed to gather enough signatures. This year the group plans to start about Mar. 1, ending Apr. 1, to get names on petitions.

County Agent's Column

Results of 13 research experiments at midwest agricultural experiment stations compare the results of self-feeding and hand-feeding beef cattle.

In these experiments, self-fed cattle gained 1.3 pounds more a day on the average than hand-fed cattle, reports G. R. Carlisle, Illinois livestock specialist.

The self-fed cattle sold for slightly more per pound, cost 26 cents more for feed per 100 pounds of gain and returned a net of 87 cents a head more than the hand-fed cattle in these tests.

In addition, Carlisle points out that a saving of labor is another advantage of the self-feeding system not covered in the research.

Tests have shown that 15 square feet total space per hog is adequate up to market weight. One-third of this should be bedded area. Under 100 pounds, 10 square feet of total space is adequate.

Locating hog feeders and waterers at the point on the hog feeding floor farthest from the bedded area so the area between the bed and the eating facilities can be most easily cleaned, will help to minimize hog chores.

According to a recent survey, more than 75 percent of the nation's husbands help with the dishes. Observation closer to home indicates that more farm wives help with the chores.

For many present day citizens, roughing it means turning the electric blanket down to medium.

One America farmer out of every six will suffer a disabling injury this year. The accident rate among farmers is four times as high as among factory workers.

Farm News and Views

YOUR CROP YIELDS may suffer from soil acidity unless limestone is applied. Heavy applications of nitrogen are building up soil acidity. It should be held to 6.5 to 7.0 to get best returns from fertilizer. Farmers should get soils tested now and apply lime to winter brooding order your chicks now to be started as soon as possible. Otherwise order started pullets now that will be of laying age next summer.

DAIRY BARN conditions can greatly affect the size of your milk check. Dairy cows produce best when the relative humidity is 75 percent and temperatures range from 45 to 55 degrees. Often during winter, dairy barns are cold and damp. Proper ventilation may give you four to five gallons more milk from each 20 cows, if barn temperature is kept above freezing, fans that deliver about 90 cubic feet of air per minute will prevent excess moisture.

# Business - Government - Agriculture Outlook For 1960

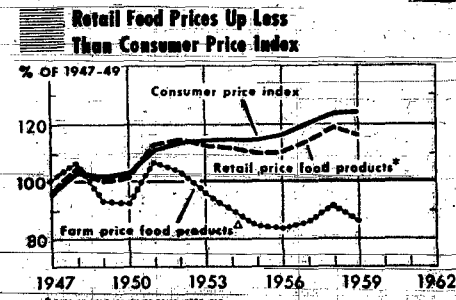
## Prosperity Assured for 1960

Higher rates of economic activity are expected in 1960 with moderate increases rather than an expansion of boom proportion. New records in gross national product, in employment and in consumers income are expected if major strikes can be avoided; otherwise "all bets are off."

The effects of the steel strike will carry on into 1960. A backlog of demand has been created to be filled during 1960, possibly carrying over into 1961. The strike apparently had little effect upon consumers spending; food sales, especially, held up high during the last half of 1959. The loss of wages associated with the strike may have been responsible for some of the recent weakness in the cattle market.

Business activity in Nebraska was sustained all through 1959 by record crops and fairly good farm prices; and by high levels of construction, manufacturing and retail sales. In 1960, towns which are dependent mostly on farm trade will feel the effects of declining net farm incomes. Prosperous conditions will prevail in the larger cities of this state.

Business investments are expected to be higher next year than during 1958 and '59. The tight money situation and high interest rates will cause the postponement of some business investment plans. The demand for credit will be so high that this situation is likely to get worse before it gets better. Inventory accumulation by business and industry will continue for several months.



Since the expansion rate is expected to be moderate, some unemployment beyond the irreducible minimum will continue but will not be high enough to cause much concern except among campaigning political candidates.

The American consumer will increase his spending during the year ahead. High employment and rising wage and salary rates will boost purchasing power. Confidence in the future will be manifested in a willingness to go deeper into debt for installment purchases of automobiles, appliances and other items. Higher interest rates will have little effect on consumer buying - except for houses.

The cost of living will rise slowly in 1960. Higher costs for services and for some non-food items will be partially offset by lower retail food prices. Demand for food will be strong but expenditures will not rise as much as income. City people will continue to enjoy an abundant supply of high quality food at reasonable prices, thanks to the productivity of the American agriculture.

The outlook for America's foreign trade looks better for the year ahead. Imports will continue high but will not gain at the rate experienced during the past two years. American exports are expected to increase during 1960 so the value of our imports and exports may come close to balancing in 1960.

Government spending will be high this year but the rate of increase will be slower than in recent years. Federal spending in the current fiscal year may be below that of 1958-59; receipts will rise with business activity and personal incomes.

State and local spending will be higher than in 1959 but be less than from 1958 to '59 because of rising interest rates and slow-downs in highway and school construction.

The expansion phases of postwar business cycles have been running about three years. This would mean that the year 1962 might bring some slowdown in business activity and economic growth. Major sources of concern are: (1) the increasing growth of consumer debt in relation to their incomes; and (2) the decline in net farm income which began this year and is expected to continue throughout 1960.

## Agriculture - The Squeeze Is On

A further decline in prices farmers receive for their products and additional increases in farm costs are expected in 1960. Net farm income will be down by 7-8 percent from 1959, but the decline will be somewhat less than from 1958-59. Food supplies will be abundant at reasonable prices to consumers.

Net farm income in the United States declined 15 percent in 1959 from what farmers received in '58. The reasons for this decline are:

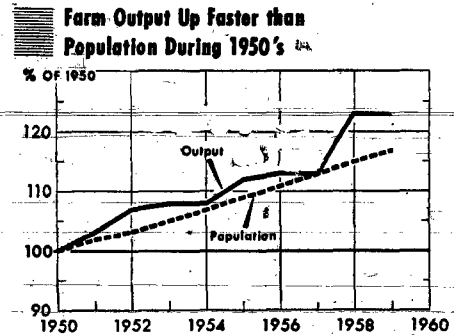
- (1) lower prices received for farm products;
- (2) higher costs of production and marketing;
- (3) reduction in government payments under the soil Bank.

The demand for farm products continues to be strong, but the supply of food is increasing faster than population and demand.

Production continues to be the big news in the farm outlook picture. Total farm production set new records in 1958-59 resulting in lower farm prices, increasing stocks of farm products owned by government and lower food prices for consumers.

Production will stay high in 1960 unless widespread drought or other natural disasters should

reduce production. Underlying the increase in agricultural output are the gains made in yields per acre of important farm crops. In the past 10 years, grain sorghum yields have increased by over 70 percent; corn and wheat yields by 35-40 percent; potatoes, 35 percent; sugar beets, one-fourth and soybeans one-fifth higher than in the 1947-49 period. The increased production of feed grains is now being transferred into expanding production of livestock and livestock products.



The potential for further increases in livestock to utilize large feed supplies is now a source of major concern when we size up the agricultural outlook for 1960 and over the next five years.

The demand for farm products has been strong most of the time since World War II, especially here in the United States where population has grown faster than expected. Consumers incomes have been at high levels, a situation expected to continue through 1960.

The demand for meat and for fruits and vegetables has been especially good since 1945, but American farmers have been able to increase production faster than the demand has grown. The population growth will continue and during the next five years will include increasing numbers of heavy-eating teenagers.

Government programs also move substantial quantities of food through the school lunch and milk programs and through aid to needy persons. Exports of farm products at \$4 billion in the 1959-60 period will be the third highest in history. Domestic and foreign demand for farm products will not expand enough in 1960 to prevent a further

decline in the average level of prices farmers receive for their products.

The price-cost squeeze will continue to reduce net farm income during 1960. Farm product prices have, for the most part, moved downward since 1951. Other prices have moved upward, increasing the costs of producing farm products and also the costs of marketing those products. This squeeze on net farm income has been partially off-set by the movement of farm families to cities and by the increase in the non-farm income of farm people.

Costs are expected to rise a little further in 1960, especially for industrial goods, labor and borrowed money. Farm produced items will cost less, especially feed and replacement livestock. With a high level of farm production next year, farm prices will continue to decline and net farm income will be less than in 1959 by 7-8 percent and less than 1958 by about 25 percent.

Here in Nebraska the weather will be quite important in determining the net farm income situation, especially on our dryland farms. Cattle ranchers can expect to receive lower prices for feeders and for hog producers. Grain prices will be a little lower in 1960 because of slight decline in support levels unless the Plains area should be hit by drought.

Government farm programs in 1960 will be about the same as this year with no major changes expected, except possibly for an expansion in the Conservation Reserve. This will mean further accumulations of government-owned stocks in farm commodities, especially in wheat and corn.

Since 1960 is a Congressional and Presidential election year, the type of changes in farm programs needed to bring supply more into balance with demand will be postponed until 1961.

Tighter production controls seem almost inevitable by 1961 since neither domestic nor foreign demand are likely to increase sufficiently during the next two to five years for continued production even at present levels.

Farm land values, farm assets and rural living levels continue to improve despite lower farm prices since 1951. The rise in land prices now appears to be ended although the pressure for farm enlargement will continue to provide a strong demand for available farm land.
