Candlelighters were Dianne Mann, Winside, and Cynthia Miller, Vandalia, Ill.

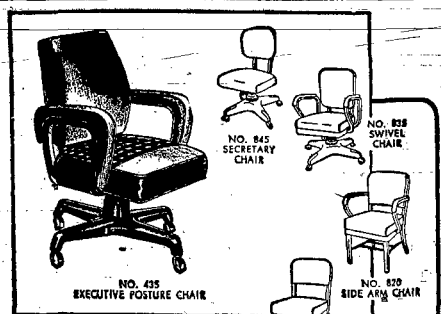



Capitol News

Increasing Old Age Problem Slated for State Conference

One of the big problems that will face Nebraska soon is how to deal with the growing number of people classified as "old" or "aging."

The problem is becoming acute, observers say, for two reasons—people generally are living longer because of new medical aids and Nebraskans specifically have a better life expectancy than in the bulk of the other states.

Little has been done for the aged on a wide spread scale in Nebraska, other than privately operated nursing homes. Some communities are sprouting homes for elderly people. But the number of those reaching retirement age is mushrooming.

The problem is acute nationally, also, and the President has arranged for a White House conference on the aging, similar to previous ones on children and youth. Gov. Balgove Brooks has named a committee and slated a state conference on the matter some time in early spring.

Mrs. Brooks, wife of the governor, is aiding in the work. She says the myriad problems growing out of our aging population have grown like Topsy, often evolving slowly and quietly without our being aware of them. Yet, she says, over all the problems are developing rapidly and call for much greater attention than they have received.

Only by thinking about older people as live human beings can society help them achieve the rich, full life to which they are entitled during their later mature years. Mrs. Brooks said.

Higher Education

The outline of a study of higher education in Nebraska has taken shape. It was proposed to a committee of state senators by Dr. Lyman Glenn, Sacramento, Calif. The committee, headed by State Sen. Richard Marvel, Hastings, wants Glenn to conduct the study and make recommendation to the senators. They would in turn study

the Glenn report and submit their recommendations to the next session of the Legislature.

Glenn has proposed a study to cover these areas:

- 1. Programs, enrollment and population.
2. Student affairs.
3. Building utilization and needs.
4. Facilities.
5. The place held by the state in financial aid to public institutions and its ability to finance higher education through 1970.
6. Junior colleges.
7. State administration and control dealing with coordinating budgets, plans and programs.
8. Finances of institutions.

Marvel's committee was appropriated \$50,000 by the last Legislature to make the study. Glenn proposes to use people from the institutions to be surveyed to cut costs and said he may call in outside consultants also.

Records And Space

Nebraska has a space problem. But it isn't outer space. The problem is crowded conditions in the Capitol where thousands of documents are stored in rooms by each of many departments in the skyscraper.

A committee of state senators is studying the feasibility of micro-filming records and destroying originals in order to save room in basement vaults and offices. There are already offices in the building's basement originally constructed for storage.

The study is more than a casual one. It will require checking of law books since many departments are by law required to keep some documents indefinitely, others for specific periods of time.

Even if there were microfilming on a mass basis, some records would be turned over to the State Historical Society, the committee headed by Sen. Otto Liebers, Lincoln, was told. The committee was informed

best guesses are 80 to 90 percent of vault space could be saved by microfilming. There would also be savings in above-basement offices where many records now are kept. Some documents now preserved in the statehouse date back to the 1850s.

Legislative Council

The executive board of the Legislative council says it doesn't feel at this time that a committee of state senators should investigate the Highway department. The board's ruling came after controversy over the Interstate highway, primarily.

The four members, Sens. Don Thompson, McCook, chairman, and H. K. Diers, Gresham, William Moulton, Omaha, and Harry Pizer, North Platte, have authority to name a committee to study any phase of state government. It is the governing board for the council which is composed of all members of the Legislature who sit between sessions as study groups.

In a statement, the board said it feels "that time is too short at this stage for such a major undertaking and that probably little could be accomplished."

County Agent's Column

Wayne county farmers have already ordered over 7,000 Clarke-McNary trees for planting in the spring.

A farmer thinking of planting trees may ask himself, "what kind should I plant." The answer depends upon the purpose of planting. Here are some suggestions on tree varieties, best adapted to the intended purpose of the planting:

For windbreaks: At least the north or west row should be evergreens. Evergreens are dense to the ground and permanent and are the backbone of any windbreak. Evergreen species include: Redcedar—ideal for windward row of belt or single or double row planting. Very hardy. Drought-resistant and have dense foliage which is retained close to the ground.

Rocky Mountain juniper—slow-growing but redcedar; therefore more compact. Retains green color throughout the year. Somewhat less susceptible to cedar-aphid rust. Ponderosa pine—native to Nebraska. Recommended throughout the state. Rapid growing tree when well established.

Deciduous (broad leaves) trees provide quick but temporary protection. They are faster-growing. Species available in the medium to tall category.

Green ash—very hardy and long-lived. Dense foliage. Recommended throughout the state.

Honeylocust—thornless variety recommended on statewide basis. Hackberry—native to Nebraska. Does best in deep, fertile soils. Slow-growing for a broadleaf tree, but relatively long-lived.

Cottonwood—very rapid growing tree. Recommended only on moist, well-drained sites with water table 15 feet or less.

Chinese elm—rapid growing and drought-resistant.

In the short, broadleaf category, the following species are available and are recommended as follows: Russian olive—attractive, very dense foliage, shrub-like growth, hardy, rapid growing.

Russian mulberry—recommended for eastern two-thirds of state. In addition there are several hardy fast growing shrubs available.

Farm News and Views RENTAL OF farm machinery on a temporary basis benefits both farmers and dealers. They feel that rental of farm machinery on a daily or weekly basis will be most popular. Thus farmers can get rush jobs completed without tying up working capital in equipment. So far, there is little long-term rental of farm equipment except for bulk milk tanks and in some cases LP gas storage tanks. Guides developed by the National Farm Equipment Retailers Association suggests one percent of the new delivered cost of the equipment for each 10-hour day, five percent for a week's rental and 15 percent for a month's rental. These rates must be modified to fit individual situations. NON-FARM ASPECTS of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's spending were emphasized by the Administration this year as they prepared the annual budget for submission to Congress. This is often a sore point among farmers and farm-minded businessmen. More than a half billion dollars of the fiscal year's budget goes for services such as school lunch, school milk and overseas crop disposal which benefits all taxpayers.

Mocha Bavarian Mold

(Six servings)

1 envelope (1 tablespoon) unflavored gelatin
1/4 cup cold chocolate milk
2 egg yolks, slightly beaten
1/4 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon instant coffee
2 cups hot chocolate milk
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
2 egg whites
1/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup whipping cream, whipped

Stir gelatin into 1/4 cup chocolate milk; let stand to soften for 5 minutes. Add 1/4 cup sugar, salt and instant coffee. Beat egg yolks, beat until well mixed. Slowly stir in hot chocolate milk. Cook over boiling water until slightly thickened, stirring constantly. Add gelatin mixture, stirring until gelatin is dissolved. Remove from heat. Add vanilla. Chill till slightly thickened. Beat until frothy. Beat egg whites until frothy. Add 1/4 cup sugar, a little at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat until stiff and glossy. Fold into chocolate mixture. Fold in whipped cream. Pour into heart shaped mold and chill until firm. Unmold on dessert plate. Garnish with moist flaked coconut.

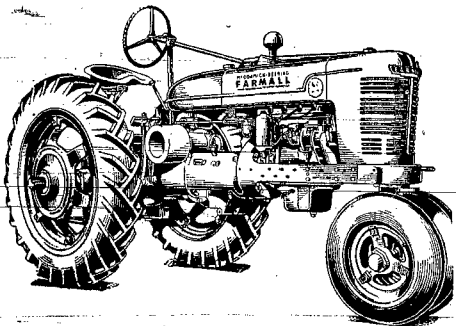
