Combine all ingredients in large saucepan. Heat over moderate heat until piping hot. Garnish each serving with chopped parsley or paprika.



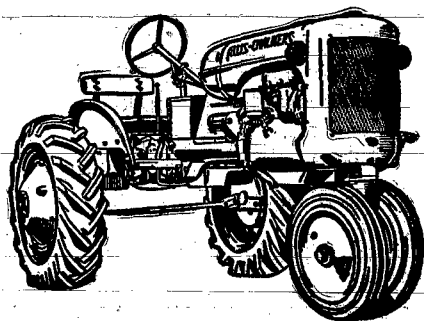

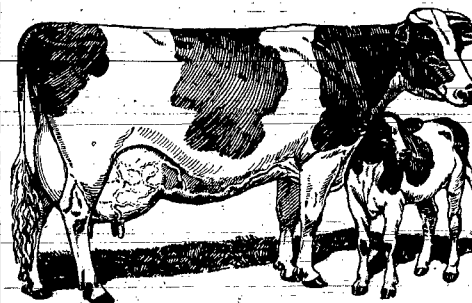
