Praise Police Alertness in Burglary Attempt Monday

Alert action by Wayne police was credited this week by a Wayne store owner in preventing possible heavy losses in a burglary attempt early Monday morning.

The thieves made off with only a small amount of change and an undetermined amount of cigarettes in the break-in at Arnie's Superette, Wayne County Sheriff Don Weible and State Trooper O. J. Knotwell made a thorough check of the premises Monday in a search for fingerprints and other clues.

The burglary was discovered by Policeman S. C. Thompson about 1:30 a.m. Monday. Thompson was making a routine patrol of the area when he noticed one of the rear doors of the store was ajar.

The thieves gained entry to the building by forcing a rear door. They knocked the combination dial off the safe in an unsuccessful attempt to get at weekend receipts. The burglary attempt is believed to have occurred between midnight and 1:30 p.m. Policeman E. L. Hailey had made a check of the store about 11 p.m. Sunday and found nothing amiss.

Store Owner Arnold Reay said he was very gratified that the local police discovered the break-in as soon as they did. "It is my opinion they probably prevented them from doing more damage. Without their alertness, we might have had a much greater loss. Just a small break might have afforded them the opportunity to catch the burglars on the scene," he said.

Experiment Station Group Sets Annual Meet Mar. 7

Details of the program for the NE Nebraska Experiment Station association's annual meeting were announced today by Dr. Dale Flowerday, station superintendent.

The meeting will be held Mar. 7 at the Laurel city auditorium. The morning program opening at 10 a.m. will be devoted to crops research reports, following a film, "Dynamic Careers in Agriculture," and a report on association activities by President Emil Muller, Wakefield. Talks include "Agriculture Research at Nebraska" by Dr. E. F. Frolik, Nebraska Agricultural Experiment station associate director; "Corn Improvement," Dr. John Lonquist, university corn breeder, and "Crop Varieties for Northeast Nebraska," Dr. Flowerday.

Dr. Lonquist recently attended the Central American Corn conference at Managua, Nicaragua and is expected to touch on findings of this trip as well as current research at the Northeast Nebraska station.

Attention during the afternoon program will be focused on animal husbandry research.

Topics and speakers are: "Pullets vs. Hays," Walter Tolman, NE station animal husbandryman; "Silage Research at the South Dakota experiment station," Dr. Oscar E. Olson, South Dakota State college; "Swine Disease Control through Repopulation," James D. Caldwell, University of Nebraska; and "Research for Better Meat," Dr. Robert Koch, UN animal husbandry department director.

In other action the council tentatively set Mar. 29 for the opening of bids on a new fire truck for the city. Specifications on the new truck are now being completed by the city's engineers.

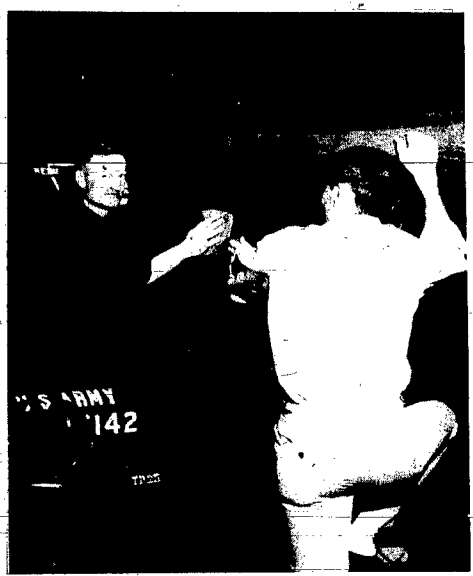
Purchase of a new bookkeeping machine for the city clerk's office was tabled for further study. One firm offered a unit to the city which was priced at \$6,600.

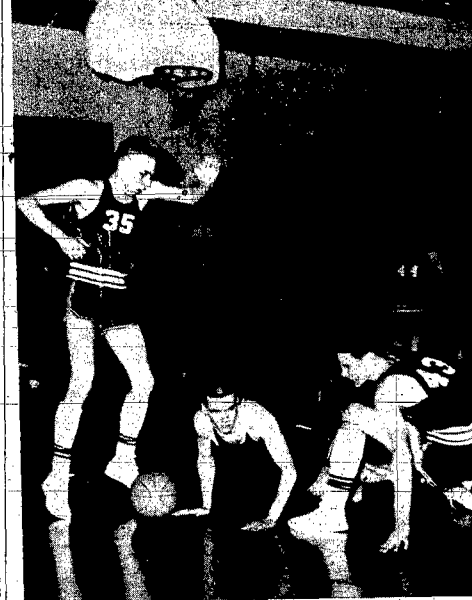

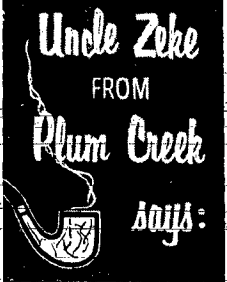
Several factors point toward better days for farmers. First because of the predicted huge increase in population. Then too, much farmland is being taken for roads, residential areas and industrial sites...

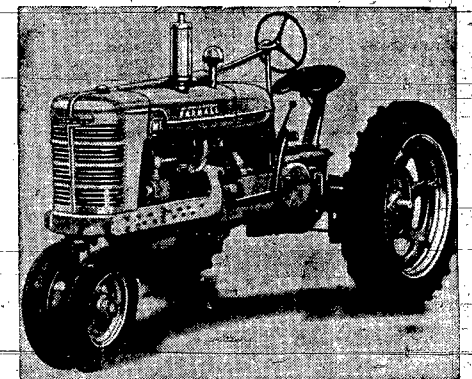
