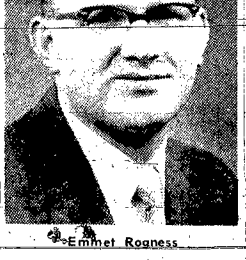

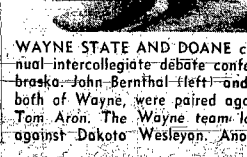

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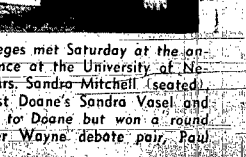

Hot Eggburgers (Six Sandwiches)
6 eggs
2 tablespoons butter
6 round buns
6 slices processed American cheese
1 medium onion sliced in 1/4 inch rings
Salt and pepper

Split buns, Lay halves, split side up, on baking sheet, place cheese slices on the top halves. Toast in 350 degree oven or under broiler until cheese begins to melt. Fry eggs medium firm, turning once. Season. Place eggs on toasted halves. Top with onion rings. Serve hot, open or closed.
