Wayne Boy Scouts will perform the last part of their annual Good Turn clothing drive for Goodwill Industries Saturday.

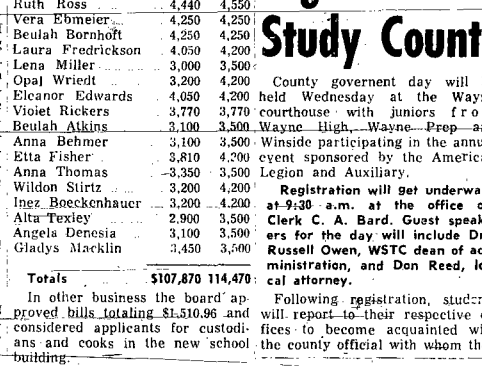
Hoskins Man Enters Race for Unicameral

Wayne's trip is eighth to the Class B tournament since 1942. The Blue Devils won the state title in 1942 and 1956 and were runner-up in 1944 and 1951. Wayne also garnered a third state title, Class B in 1919.

Stricken corn and from sorghum. "The two silages appear to have about the same feeding value, but the yield per acre of sorghum in a dry year was considerably greater than that of corn," Dr. Olson said.
In other talks Emil Muller, Wakefield farmer and feeder and association president, discussed the station's building program. Last year the association raised \$8,000 for buildings at the station.
Dr. E. F. Prolik, University of Nebraska Agricultural Experiment Station associate director, showed colored slides emphasizing recent research trends and developments.
"By eliminating hog diseases, production was increased 30 percent with disease-free swine on 35 eastern Nebraska farms," said James Caldwell, member of the University veterinary science department. "The principal source of this advantage was in saving a higher proportion of pigs which grew at a faster rate, more efficiently."
Dr. R. M. Koch, University animal husbandryman, explained the current research program for better beef. He said it deals with consumer acceptance, factors affecting carcass value and the relation of measures in the live animal to carcass characteristics.
Dr. John Lonquist, University corn breeder, discussed the current program for corn improvement. Crop variety recommendations for NE Nebraska were reported by Dr. Dale Flowerday, station superintendent. Walter Toiman, station staff member, discussed pellets vs. hay.

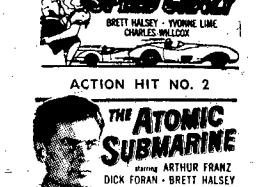

Blue Devils Cop Seventh District Crown

Wayne High's Blue Devils copped their seventh straight district Class B basketball title Saturday night by overwhelming Laurel 70-39 in the tournament finals at WSTC's Rice gym.

The win moved Wayne into the state Class B tournament which opens at Lincoln today. The Blue Devils will oppose the defending champions, Syracuse, at 8:45 p.m. today. Wayne dropped a 47-37 decision to the Rockets in the state tournament opener last year.

Wayne's victory Friday continued the Blue Devil domination of NE Nebraska basketball. The local quints have won 117 games while losing only 27 over a seven-year period. Teams directed by Coach Harold Maciejewski dropped first round games in the 1954, 1958 and 1959 state tournaments and copped the state B title in 1956.

Saturday's win over Laurel was an anti-climax to Friday night's 62-45 semifinal victory over Neligh. The Warriors had been rated tournament favorites after Wayne dropped five straight games at the end of the regular season. Laurel won the other semifinal 55-49 over Bloomfield on a late tip by Dale Erwin in the closing seconds.

In downing Laurel, Wayne showed a promising sophomore who could spell trouble for Blue Devil opponents in future years. Don Larsen, 6-5 center, entered the game with Wayne trailing 3-0. He promptly led Wayne to control of the boards and turned in his best performance of the season. He finished with 12 points.

Wayne failed to score from the field with its first seven shots, then hit six of the next eight to take a 12-8 lead at the first quarter break. There was no doubt as to the final outcome after Wayne rolled up a 36-14 advantage in the second quarter.

Capitol News

Campaign Oratory to Flood Nebraska in Coming Months

LINCOLN—Nebraskans will be inundated in the next two months by a flood of campaign talk from persons seeking public office from both parties. There probably will be more campaign oratory and printed material circulated than in any election in the last 20 years.

The next two months will only be a sample of what is to come after the May 10 primary when oratory is expected to be extra rough. At stake for the Democrats in the fall general election is retention of partial control of the statehouse. The Republicans want to get back in.

There has been considerable open scrapping between state officials of both parties in the Capitol since January, 1959 when the Democrats got into the structure. Also, observers report, there has been behind the scenes maneuvering on administrative problems that has caused friction between some of the elected officeholders.

The deadline for filing for the primary is Friday.

Federal Funds Nebraska is getting from 47 to 56 million dollars yearly in funds from the Federal government. That's the report of the Council of State Governments. The bulk of the money yearly is for highway construction and public welfare.

Meanwhile, the Nebraska Citizens council, a private tax research group, reports Nebraskans in 1960 will pay about 31 cents of every dollar to the local and state governments and the remainder to the federal government.

Ag Research

One of the most active groups in state government currently is the Agricultural Products Research committee, created by the last Legislature. Nebraska currently is the only state that has a budget for research in other uses for farm products, primarily grain surpluses.

The Legislature set up a state tax levy to finance research. This is expected to produce from \$300,000 to \$350,000 per year for six years.

One of the latest projects of the committee is formation of a cooperative organization with Iowa and Missouri to find new outlets for farm products. Research projects are also underway after approval of the Nebraska committee and it is hoped the three-state organization can do likewise, reports State Agriculture Director Pearl Finigan.

Road Speculation The Advisory State Highway commission has concerned itself with the problem of what to do about speculation on land earmarked for the Interstate highway.

The commission is expected to ask the 1961 Legislature to take some action to prevent individuals from buying land after the path of the Interstate is publicly known, developing on it and then getting a bigger price when the ground is bought by the state.

Currently, the legal division of the Highway department is studying a particular situation in Omaha where the city council has authorized a housing development on land designated for the Interstate. It will report officially to the commission at its next meeting later this month.

Airlines The State of Nebraska feels that Frontier airlines' operating certificate should be cancelled and another local carrier authorized to operate in the Cornhusker state.

Parolees

State Parole Officer Eugene Neal says he has had considerable success this winter in obtaining permanent employment for parolees in the penitentiary and men's reformatory. Finding work for these men saves the state considerable amounts of money, he commented.

For instance, Neal said, those on parole during January earned \$15,841 in jobs during the month whereas it would cost \$14,154 to keep them in institutions. That does not include what it would cost the state to care for their families through welfare payments.

Caucus Serves Good Purpose

Last week's Citizens' party caucus served one good purpose — it pointed up Wayne's need for a two-party system to afford the local citizenry a choice in selection of the persons who will operate their local government.

Local caucuses in recent years have been attended by only a minute portion of the city's voting population. Yet nomination at those caucuses virtually assured election. It is a sad state of affairs when there is so little interest in city government that only 30 persons are present to nominate the persons who will operate one of the

biggest businesses in the area.

Last Tuesday's turnout, oddly enough, was identical in number to the total number of votes cast in the 1959 municipal election. Only 25 persons attended last year's caucus. What can be said for a city of 4,000 when less than five percent of the voters turn out to nominate candidates and only 10 percent bother to turn out at the polls?

The solution must be one that will stimulate the interest of local citizens in their city government. A second party would seem to be part of the answer.
