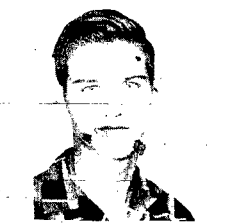
Nearly 250 NE Nebraska high school students will test their speech and dramatic talents in Wayne Saturday.

His interests include sports and music. He participated in football, basketball and track. He plays cello in the college orchestra and has the baritone lead in a forthcoming opera.

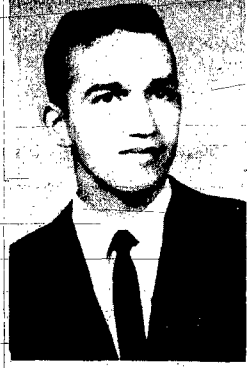

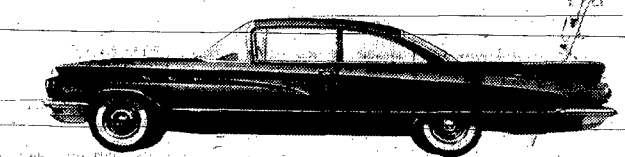

Torrid Syracuse First Quarter Tops Wayne

Denesia Ties Two Records

Coach Ron Wagner's Syracuse Rockets parlayed a torrid first quarter into a 75-64 victory over Wayne High's Blue Devils in the first round of the state Class B basketball tournament Thursday night at Lincoln.

Syracuse won the championship Saturday night by nipping favored Omaha Holy Name 55-53. The Rockets had tripped Holdrege 46-41 Friday afternoon in the semifinals.

Neil Nannen, Bruce Brandt and Don Thomson led the torrid Syracuse sport in the first quarter against Wayne as the Rockets built a 27-14 advantage. Wayne never fully recovered from this blow.

Syracuse hit 13 of 18 shots from the field in the first eight minutes with Nannen dropping six of seven. This led to 72.2 percent shooting compared with only 27.3 percent for Wayne.

Five Class B tournament records were tied or broken in the game. Syracuse's 75 total was a single team mark, exceeding the 68 scored by Holdrege earlier in the evening and by Lincoln University high in 1957. The total of 139 by both teams was also a record, topping the 128 scored in the Holdrege-Geneva tilt.

Wayne earned the distinction of scoring more points than any other loser in the Class B tourney. The 64 points by the Blue Devils topped the record of 56 set by Hebron in the 1956 finals against Wayne and the 62 scored by Vaughtine in Thursday's opening game.

Wayne's all-state candidate, Roger Denesia, tied two individual records. His 30 points equaled the output of University High's Larry Bauer in 1957. He hit 12 baskets to tie the record set by Geneva's Larry Fiedler in 1957. Denesia scored four points in the final 19 seconds to tie the old standards.

The Wayne-Syracuse tilt was played on even terms after the first quarter. Bill Witt hit five baskets in the second quarter to give the Rockets a 44-27 advantage at intermission. The Rockets hit 63 percent from the field in the first two periods to 27 percent for the Blue Devils.

Wayne mustered its most serious threat in the final half. The Blue Devils narrowed the margin to 54-43 after three quarters as Denesia suddenly started to find the range with his outside jump shots. He continued his rapid fire scoring in the early minutes of the final period with three baskets and Wayne was within four points, 54-50. This was the closest the Blue Devils were able to get.

The two teams traded baskets and the Rockets led 58-54 with 5:28 remaining. Then Syracuse got five straight points on an outside jumper by Bill Witt and a three-point play by Nannen. This made it 63-58 with 4:58 left. The teams matched baskets again in the next two minutes and Syracuse relied on free throws in the final two minutes to widen the edge.

Wayne called a time out late in the game to inform the team Denesia had a chance to tie the single game scoring record. The 5-10 sen-

ior had 26 points at the time. He drew a foul with 19 seconds left and calmly hit both charity tosses to run his total to 28.

Syracuse took the ball out of bounds and halfway to the center line Denesia stole the ball. He dribbled in for a layup and tied the record with only one second remaining in the game.

One of the most encouraging points for Wayne was the performance of Don Larsen, 6-5 sophomore. He entered the game in the second quarter and promptly overcame the Syracuse control of the boards. He added two baskets in the second quarter as Wayne struggled to stay in contention.

Larsen and Buster Likes are expected to form a nucleus for the Blue Devil squad next season. Others returning off the tourney squad will be Bob Johnson, Kenny Denesia and Marlin Lessman.

Denesia's 30 points ran his season's total to 538 in 18 games, an average of 29.9. In four years as a Blue Devil regular he scored 1,569 points in 82 games, an average of 19.1 for his high school career.

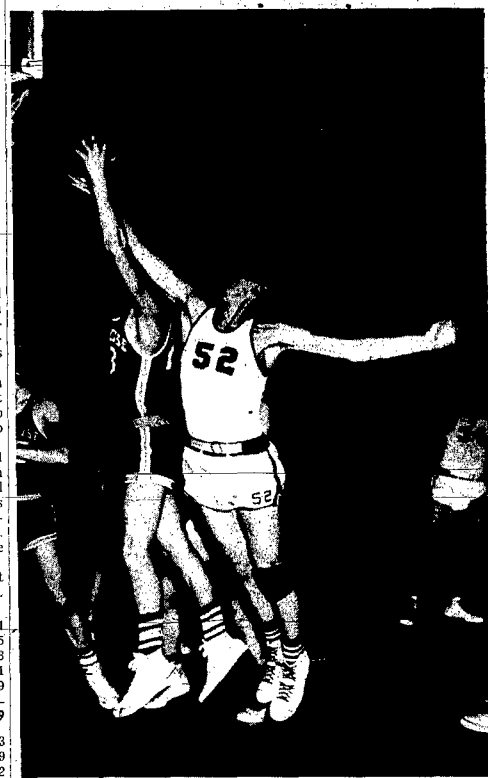

Some Wages Are Exempt from SS

If close relatives work for each other for wages, they should check to learn whether or not these wages are covered by social security, according to Clifford Kittelson, manager of the Norfolk social security office.

According to the social security law, wages paid to these classes of relatives are not covered: wages paid by a son or daughter to a parent; wages paid by a parent to a child under 21, or wages paid by a husband to a wife or a wife to a husband.

Any employer who has a question should contact the Internal Revenue Service for a decision.

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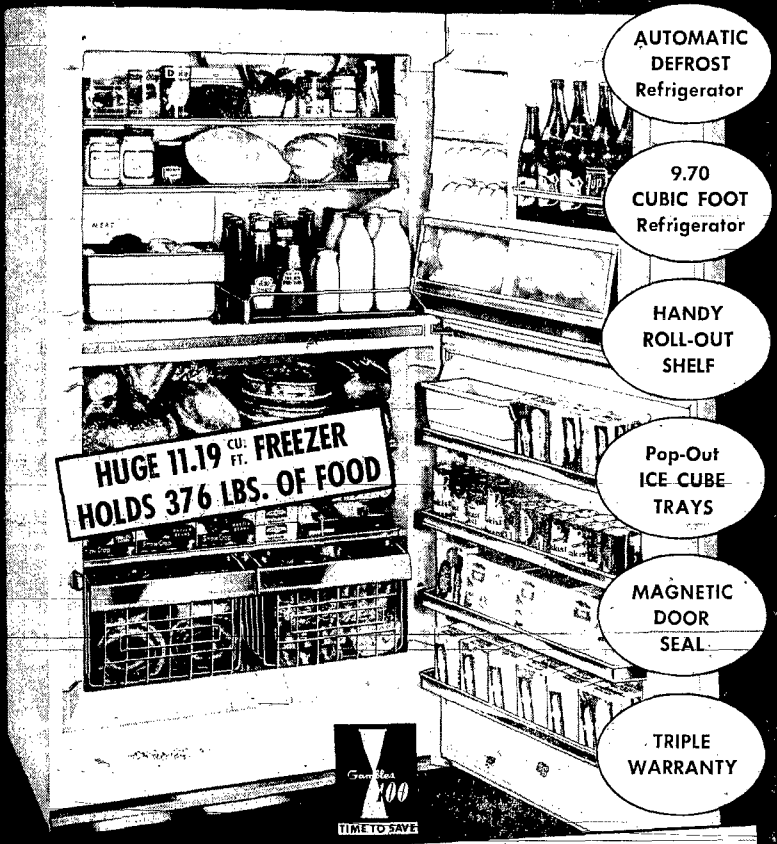

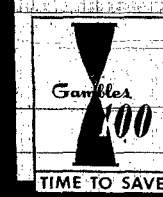

Capitol News

Nebraska Industry Promotion Vital to State's Advancement

LINCOLN—Can you fish out the prairies? That, says Dave Osterhout, chief of the State Resources Division, is typical of the lack of knowledge in many states of the benefits of Nebraska.

- 1. First and foremost, the search for new industry, and the development of existing industry.
2. Study and research on Nebraska's natural resources.
3. Promoting industrial uses for agricultural products in cooperation with the Industrial Uses Committee.

Government in Nebraska has grown by leaps and bounds over the past decade. This is not only evidenced by the huge increases in money spent for operating government, but by the large number of new boards and commissions that have sprung up in past years.

As an example, 10 years ago there was no Board of Education, Board of Health, Highway Commission, Board of Nursing, Wheat Commission, Oil and Severance Tax division, nor several others. Some close to the government scene point out that Nebraska must branch out into new areas to "keep up with the times."

Snow Removal

One of the big jobs around the statehouse this winter has been to keep the sidewalks and many steps free of snow.

The State Capitol is surrounded by eight city blocks of sidewalk, plus a mammoth flight of stairs on the north side of the structure, and entrances to the Statehouse from the sidewalks.

Brooks' Illness

The illness of Democratic Gov. Ralph G. Brooks has posed some

new problems for statehouse newsmen. Brooks was hospitalized 3 times within a year, once for a mild stroke, once to have some teeth removed and then for a series of ailments combined.

This opened up a new area in government reporting in Nebraska in the last 20 years. This has produced some problems, such as how much detail should be gone into on specific ailments, and phraseology in describing them.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

A Matter of Enforcement

Wayne's city council last week passed a new ordinance giving the street and police departments authority to move parked cars to facilitate snow removal and street cleaning.

Wayne has needed this new ordinance for some time, but part of the snow removal problem could be alleviated with stricter enforcement of ordinances now in force.

There is a law in the present municipal code which says: "No person shall park any motor vehicle upon any street or alley in said city for a period of time longer than 24 hours."

A check of city streets by a Herald staff

member Monday afternoon revealed 71 cars which most certainly had been parked on streets 24 hours or longer. A vast majority of them will have to be shovelled out before they can be moved.

A recent editorial in the Omaha World-Herald pointed out that Chicago and New York had greatly aided their snow removal crews through strict enforcement of parking ordinances.

Wayne can achieve the same effect. If a few of the 71 cars parked over 24 hours were ticketed and their owners made to appear in court, it is very possible the remainder would be moved in a hurry.

A city can pass any number of ordinances to facilitate the smooth functioning of its government, but such ordinances are useless if they are not enforced.

Second Party Easy to Form

Last week this newspaper advocated formation of a second political party in Wayne to stimulate the interest of local citizens in their city government.

With the mounting interest in this year's municipal election, the time appears ripe for the formation of such a party. Local voters will have a choice in contests on this year's ballot, but they have been brought about only by considerable leg work in petition drives.

Formation of a second party is relatively simple. The time element is possibly the only reason why one was not formed this year.

Citizens forming the new party must send written notice of the convention to the secretary of state and city clerk at least 10 days prior to the convention.

When the convention is held, the first order of business is to elect officers. At least 35 electors must be present and participating in the convention to make it legal.

Officers of the convention must keep a roster of the convention in the form of an agreement to form the new party and support its nominees at the next election.

After these simple steps are accomplished, only one more move is needed. The notarized convention agreement must be filed with the city clerk. The new party is then officially formed.

So Your Roof is Leaking!

It would be hard to say "Why worry" if your roof is leaking. Such a condition causes plenty of concern.

Business buildings, as well as homes, are having their troubles. Farmers in some NE Nebraska areas are reporting outbuildings, especially the less sturdy ones, are caving in under the heavy snow.

Snow is piled so deep on most roofs that the cold, outside air is well insulated from the snow which is down next to the roof.

The building is melting the snow close to the roof, but the water is unable to get away because there is a place where outside air meets the water and forms a dam of ice.

The solution is to clear away the snow. But it's risky to chop ice from a roof. One misplaced whack may open up still another leak.

Warm weather and no more snow would do the job best.

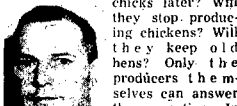

Get the most out of your freezer by a constant turnover. March is the time to take a look at the frozen food supplies in your home.

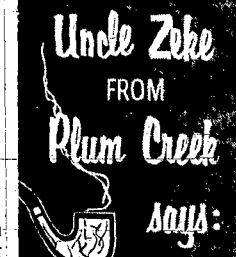

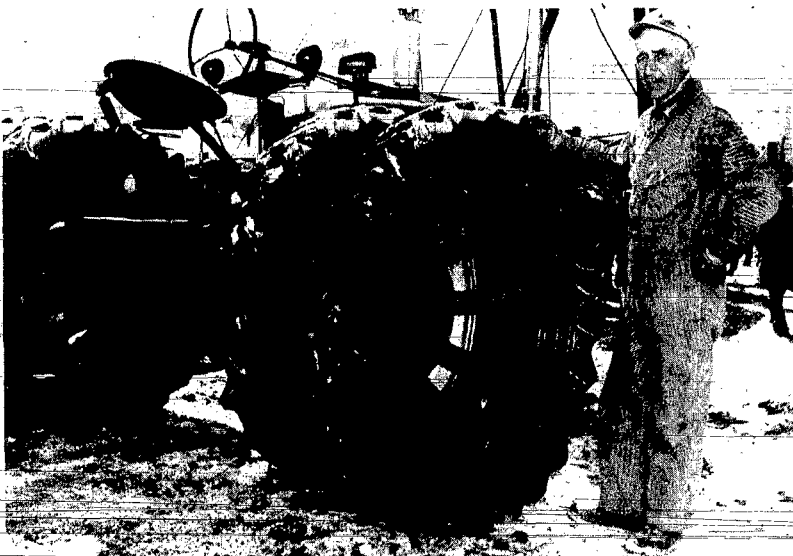
