Wayne's city council last week passed a new ordinance giving the street and police departments authority to move parked cars to facilitate snow removal and street cleaning. The move followed recommendations of Street Commissioner Henry Victor, who said the parked vehicles are the biggest headache to his creys when clearing this season's heavy snows from the streets.

member Monday afternoon revealed 71 cars which most certainly had been parked on streets 24 hours or longer. A vast majority of them will have to be shoveled out before they-can be moved. One was even without 1960 license plates.

Wayne has needed this new ordinance for some time, but part of the snow removal problem could be alleviated with stricter enforcement of ordinances now in force. The new ordinance will not be effective until Apr. 8, when we hope most of the snow has disappeared.

There is a law in the present municipal code which says: "No person shall park any motor vehicle upon any street or alley in said city for a period of time longer than 24 hours." Elsewhere in the same chapter the present code gives authority to the local police force to tow in such illegally parked cars. The penalty specified for violation of the above section is a fine not exceeding \$100.

Second Party Easy to Form

With the mounting interest in this year's municipal election, the time appears ripe for the formation of such a party. Local voters will have a choice in contests on this year's ballot, but they have been brought about only by considerable leg work in petition drives. It would be much simpler to offer the voters a choice of condidates by having two parties nominate candidates at March

caucuses.

Formation of a second party is relatively simple. The time element is possibly the only reason why one was not formed this year. To form a new political party, state statutes specify at least 55 qualified electors must hold a convention at least 70 days prior to the election. In order to have a new party in Wayne for the 1961 election, this convention would have to be held no later than Jan. 23, 1961.

Citizens forming the new party must send written notice of the convention to the secretary of state and city clerk at least 10 days prior to the convention. Notice of the convention must also be published two weeks.
