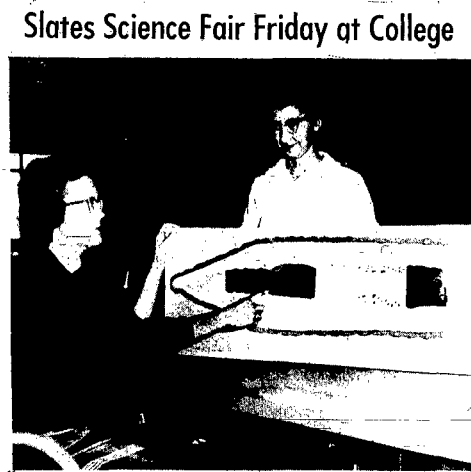

PRIMARY ELECTION

By virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the State of Nebraska, I, Ralph G. Brooks, Governor of the State of Nebraska, do hereby direct and proclaim that a primary election will be held in the several voting precincts throughout the State of Nebraska on the 10th day of May, 1960, during the hours designated by law for the following purposes, to wit:

(1) To express a preference, if so desired, by each political party for President of the United States.

(2) The election by each of the political parties of delegates and alternates to the National Political Conventions, as provided by statute.

(3) The nomination by each political party of one candidate for United States Senator.

(4) The nomination by each political party of one candidate as Representative in Congress from each of the four Congressional Districts in the State.

(5) The nomination by each political party of candidates for state offices, to wit:

- One Lieutenant Governor
- One Secretary of State
- One Auditor of Public Accounts
- One State Treasurer
- One Attorney General
- One Railway Commissioner

(6) The non-political nomination of two candidates for Judge of the Supreme Court from each of the First, Third, and Fifth Districts.

(7) The non-political nomination of two candidates for the office of Member of the State Board of Education for each of the Third and Fourth State Board of Education Districts.

(8) The non-political nomination of two candidates for the office of Member of the Legislature for each of the forty-three Legislative Districts.

(9) The non-political nomination of two candidates for District Judge for each of thirty-five Judicial Districts in the eighteen Judicial Districts of the State.

(10) The non-political nomination of two candidates for Regent of the University of Nebraska for each of Regent Districts Nos. One and Two.

(11) The non-political nomination of two candidates for the office of Director, for the number of Directors to be elected, of Public Power and Irrigation Districts, created in accordance with the provisions of Article 6, Chapter 70, R. S. (Reissue 1950).

(12) The non-political nomination of two candidates for the office of Director, for the number of Directors to be elected, of Reclamation Districts, created in accordance with the provisions of Article 5, Chapter 46, R. S. (Reissue 1952).

(13) The nomination of such other candidates for State or County offices or offices of any other subdivision of the State as the law provides shall be nominated at the General Primary Election to be voted for at the General State-wide Election to be held November 8, 1960.
