

The price of the 1960 crop of soy, beans will be supported at a national average of \$1.85 per husbalt, according to the ASC office. This is the same level in effect for the 1959 crop. The support represents 61 percent of the Pebruary parity price. Soybeans must grade No. 4 or better and contain not more than 14 percent moisture to be elicible.
