

KOPLIN CITY'S NEW MAYOR

Narrow Superintendent Field To Five at School Board Meet

Wayne City School board members Monday night waded through a lengthy agenda contacting applicants for superintendent and teaching positions. Cooks and custodians, among other curriculum and buying equipment for the new elementary school.

Applications for the superintendent were narrowed to five of 18 applicants. Those still in the running are Lloyd Texey, Lincoln; Ernest Davis, David City; Stanley Westergard, Osmond; Farmer Stroh, Bloomfield, and Wayne Benton, Horton, Ia.

Cooks and custodians for the new school also were named. They are Mrs. Abbie Isaac, Mrs. Coon, and Mrs. Edna Nissen, second cook. Their salaries were set at \$135 per month and \$115 per month, respectively.

Hired as custodian was Leonard Schwanke at a salary of \$250 per month. Schwanke has several years experience in custodial work in schools. Salaries for cooks and custodians were set only with provisions for adjustment in the future when exact requirements are learned.

Two teachers were elected at salaries of \$4200 per year. They include Harlan Schmaddeke, biology and shop, and Richard Oxenford, elementary. Resignations of Mrs. Wildon Stirtz and Richard Mitchell were accepted.

Supt. E. W. Willert Wednesday said he had received the resignation of Band Director Harold Olson.

As of Monday 25 teachers had signed and returned contracts for next year. Positions yet to be filled include elementary, physical science, mathematics and commerce-English.

In discussing applicants for the positions, no teachers were considered who did not hold degrees. The board seemed unanimously agreed that a degree would be necessary.

In other action the board approved bills of \$1,345.27 and approved purchases of a new sewing machine for the home economics department and playground equipment for the new school.

Added to the industrial arts department for next year were welding and drafting. Supt. Willert said parent-teacher conferences had shown that welding was desired by many farm parents. Because of the increasing importance of welding to the farmer, the subject was added.

Willert said equipment for the welding course would cost only about \$450. The drafting course would require an expenditure estimated at \$1,200.

Action on a proposed change in the revamping of the old building was tabled until a conference could be held with the architect. Principal Fred Rickers had requested a more central location for his office on the third floor.

A request for bids for furniture for the new building will be sent out soon, Willert said. The bids will be for 120 tablet arm desks for

204 Votes Cast in Emerson Election

A surprisingly heavy vote was cast in Emerson's village and school elections Tuesday. Even though no special proposals appeared on the ballots, 204 voted in the village election and 226 cast ballots for school board members.

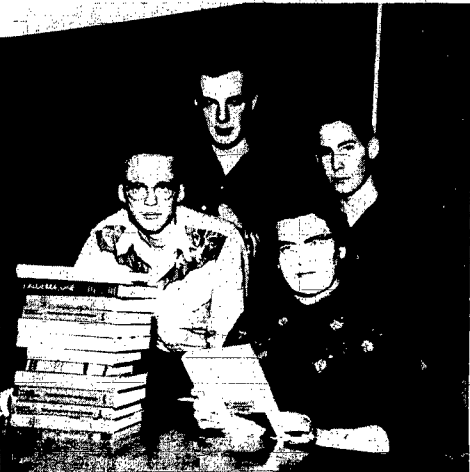
Elected to the village board of trustees were Edwin Vraspir and William E. Kellogg. Vraspir led the ballot, 7 with 115 votes, followed by Kellogg's 110. Both will serve two-year terms.

Unsuccessful candidates were Dale Warren with 96 votes and Forrest Renander with 67. Returning members on the board are Gerald E. Loyd and Ray Hill.

No name appeared on the ballot for police magistrate, but Ralph Hunt had 13 write-in votes to treat the field, should he care to qualify for the position.

Robert V. Johnson was high man in the balloting for school board members with 132 votes. Walter Gohrman, incumbent, pulled 127 votes to retain his place on the board. Trailing were Ted Habrock, incumbent, with 102 votes, and Florence Winslow with 86. Johnson and Gohrman serve three years.

Wendel Elected to Mayor Position by Wakefield Citizens

Harry Wendel, unopposed Citizens party candidate for Mayor at Wakefield, was swept into office in Tuesday's election. Only eight scattered write-in votes opposed him; George Grimm, police magistrate, was re-elected to a two-year term. He was backed by both the Civic Enterprise and the Citizens party. Wendel had a total of 222 votes, while Grimm had 118.

In the race for the first ward councilman post, Paul Bleimeister, Citizens, defeated Dan Gardner, Civic Enterprise, 80-53, for the two-year term. Dale Anderson, Civic Enterprise, was winner over Merle Schwartz, Citizens, in the race for the one-year vacancy.

In the second ward contest, Civic Enterprise candidate Norman Swanson defeated Roy C. Holm, Citizens, 81-44.

Charles Soderberg, Civic Enterprise, gathered 141 and Waldo Rognene, Citizens, 169 to win the three-year terms on the board of education. They defeated Alfred Benson, Civic Enterprise, 72, and Ed Schnasse, Citizens, 129.

Slonimsky to Play At Concert Monday

Nicholas Slonimsky, nationally noted pianist with a reputation for wit as well as musicianship, will present a concert at WSTC Monday night.

The program, open to the public, will start at 8 p.m. in the administration building auditorium. Slonimsky, of Russian ancestry, has been an American resident since 1923. He ranks among the world's leading musicologists. He serves on the advisory board of the Encyclopedia Britannica, has

School Race Close In Winside Contest

Alfred Miller, F. C. Witt and Carl Troutman were named to the village board of trustees for a two-year term in the Winside election.

Closest race of the election was between Warren Jacobsen and Norris Hansen for the position on the school board. Jacobsen won the contest, 42-40.

Charles Jackson drew 59 votes to place him in the second post on the school board. His opponent was George Voss, who collected 22.

Local Guard Unit Gives Flood Help To Stricken Area

Members of the Wayne National Guard were called July Thursday night to aid in the West Point area during the flood. The troops, with Lt. Mike Matuskins in charge, left Wayne at 8:30 p.m. The unit was ordered to secure the area from which families had been evacuated until gas leaks in the area could be found.

This was accomplished by Friday afternoon and the troops were ready to return home but were held for evacuation purposes due to an unexpected new crest of the Elkhorn. They remained on duty through Sunday to prevent sightseers from hampering the evacuation process and guard the deserted homes against theft.

The local unit was relieved by civil defense personnel at 4 p.m. Sunday. The 24 guard members were fed and housed by the Red Cross during the operation.

In what is believed to be the largest turnout in the city's history, Alfred Koplin was elected Wayne's new mayor in Tuesday's municipal election. Koplin polled 628 votes to 344 for Don Reed.

Koplin will succeed Mayor Willard Witte, who declined re-nomination for a third term. The new city officials will take office May 1.

All incumbents were returned to office as voters decided two other races in the Tuesday balloting. Wayne Marsh was returned as Second ward councilman with 237 votes to 132 for Dr. Joe Nichols. B. A. Meyer and Dr. Gordon Shupe were unopposed for First and Third ward council posts.

Re-elected to three-year terms on the school board were Edw. Seymour and H. E. "Jim" Hein. Seymour received 633 votes and Hein, 553. Other totals in the four-way race were Robert Merchant, 455, and Don Echtenkamp, 365.

Tuesday's turnout was the largest in a city election in 13 years and is believed to be the largest in local history. When absentee and disabled voters' ballots are counted in the official canvass Monday morning the final total will be 1,902 votes.

The previous high in recent history was the 937 votes cast in the 1954 election when voters approved construction of the municipal swimming pool. The only other election which polled over 900 votes was the 1958 ballot on construction of the new elementary school.

The city council will meet at 11 a.m. Monday to canvass the results, including the first counting of 17 absentee ballots. These include five in the First ward, three in the Second, eight in the Third and one other for school board.

There were the usual number of write-in votes Tuesday although only one was cast for mayor. Adon Jeffrey received one vote in the Third ward for that office.

Write-ins for First ward councilman included Leland Ellis, 3, and C. C. Powers, 1. Those in Second ward were Walter Bressler, 4, and Henry Ley, 1. Third ward council write-ins were L. B. McClure, B. J. Brandstetter and O. K. Brandstetter, two each, and C. N. Olson, Al Bahe, Dave Theophilus and Rowan Witte, one each.

Only write-in for the school board was John F. Einung, who received one vote in the Third ward.

Most social security beneficiaries whose earned income in 1959 was over \$1200 must file an annual report with the social security administration by Apr. 15, according to Clifford Kuttelson, manager of the Norfolk social security office.

Earned income is the total of wages before deductions plus net profit from a trade, business, profession or operation of a farm.

Beneficiaries who were 72 or over in all months of 1959 need not report. All others who earned over \$1200 are required to report unless they had their checks stopped for all months last year.

The annual report form is not sent to all beneficiaries. Any beneficiary needing a form should write his social security office.

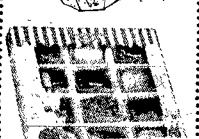

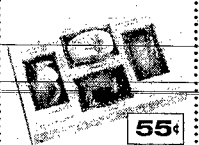

Here's a colorful, molded dessert with a look of spring about it which Ray Kling, local salesman of the Meadow Gold Dairy has sent to us. Cherry red gelatin and golden peaches are combined with a creamy custard to make this sweet treat for your family.

- Cherry Peach Dessert (Six servings)
- 1 package cherry-flavored gelatin
 - 1 cup hot water
 - 1 cup peach sirup
 - 2 egg yolks
 - 1/2 cup sugar
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 2 cups homogenized milk
 - 1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin
 - 1 No. 303 can sliced peaches, drained
 - 2 egg whites, beaten stiff
 - 2 tablespoons sugar

Dissolve cherry-flavored gelatin in hot water. Add peach sirup. Pour 1 cup gelatin into a one quart mold. Chill until slightly thickened. Chill remaining gelatin until slightly thickened. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Beat in sugar and salt. Stir in 1/2 cups milk. Cook over boiling water until mixture coats a spoon. Soften unflavored gelatin in remaining 1/2 cup milk for 5 minutes. Dissolve in hot custard mixture. Chill until slightly thickened. Beat until frothy. Reserve 6 peach slices for garnishing. Cut remaining slices into thirds. Stir into gelatin mixture. Add sugar to egg whites; fold into gelatin mixture. Spoon remaining 1 cup gelatin over top. Chill until firm. Unmold on serving plate.
