

Social Security Deadline Apr. 15

Most social security beneficiaries whose carned income in 1959 was over \$1200 must file an annual report with the social security administration by Apr. 15, according to Clifford Kittelson. manager of the Norfolk social security office. Earned income is the total of wages before deductions plus neighboring from a trade, business, profession or operation of a farm. Beneficiaries who were 12 or over in all months of 1959 need not report. All others who earned over—\$1200 ard required to report unless, they had their checks stopped for all months last year.

The annual report form is not sent to all beneficiaries, Any beneficiary needing a form should write his social security office.

A recommendation for a revised code was presented to the city council several months ago by County Judge David J. Hamer. The matter was tabled to: study and suggestions. That is the curtem status of this major project.

Wavit is now operating, for the most part, under a code adopted in 1942. There have been some revisions through passage of new ordinances, but there remains a considerable number of laws which are contradictory, outdated and even unenforceable. We feel action should be taken to bring the code up to date.

One can cite a myriad of laws in the present code which are not being enforced. Many of them cannot be. This is no reflection on Wayne's police force or persons who might be violating certain portions of the present code. We only feel that laws are put on the books to be enforced. If they are not enforced, or cannot be, they should be taken out of the code.

Here are just a few examples of laws now in municipal code with which most residents are

unfamiliar:

It is illegal for any persofts to drive upon a street any vehicle with a sign, poster or other non-transparent material upon the front windshield, side wings or side or rear windows of such motor vehicle. It is also illegal for any persons to place any poster, sign, picture or advertising material on the windshield or glass of-either-his own motor vehicle or that of any other person. (This means any person distributing advertising literature on the windshields of parked cars is violating the law.)

For Curb on Spending — Item Veto

Every January, since the passage of the Budget and Accounting Act of 1921, the President has been, required to submit to Congress an estimate of the Federal Government's expenditures and receipts during the next fiscal year. But the results have seldom corresponded with his estimates. In 1959, for example, acual-expenditures were \$6,800,000,000 more than his estimate and receipts \$6,100,000,000 more than his estimate and receipts \$6,100,000 more than his estimate and

The extent of these errors was unusual. What s not been unusual has been the tendency of estilitives to exceed the incumbent President's estilitives to exceed the incumbent President's estilitive year after year — for the simple reason that President in fact lacks the power to control the

budget.
Today the President, House and Senate can all compete against each other in recommending or appropriating money to favored projects or groups. It is difficult to fix the responsibility for the resulting extravagance or budget deficits. The strongest arguments against the wastes in farm subsidies, veterans pensions, foreign aid or other programs are up to favor the spenders.

We averagely need a responsible budget organs

We urgently need a responsible budget system which the President and Congress are encourage to compete with each other in economy rather an extravagance. This is not a utopian dream.

Such a responsible budget system has existed for years in Great Britain. It has long prevailed in many of our own states. President Eisenhower, who asked in his budget nessage this year for power to yeto individual items in appropriation bills, point-

ed out that the governors of 41 states now have this power.

But to attain a truly responsible budget system, the President should be grafted even more power than this. He should have the power not only to veto any individual item in an appropriation bill, but any increase in any item beyond the amount first proposed by him in his budget message or in any special message.

If Congress wishes to increase an appropriation beyond his recommended by him at all, it should be constitutionally required to do so in a separate bill subject to his veto.

The late Senator Vandenberg, in advocating item veto for the President in 1938, wrote in The Saturday Evening Post;

"The item veto does not give the President one single addition affirmative power. He cannot start anything as a result. He can only stop something long enough to focus the attention of the country on it and long enough to force two-thirds of the House and Senare to garee to it in spite of him and his reasons, if they should persist in their adverse judgments. Its only harm, if any, would lie, in the temporary delay, while Congress and the country stop, look and listen.

The basic principle to be followed to attain a responsible budget swstem is clear. It is to reduce the power of either Congress on the President to spend without restraint and to increase the power of both Congress and the President to limit the spending of the other. Henry Hazlitt in Newsweek.
