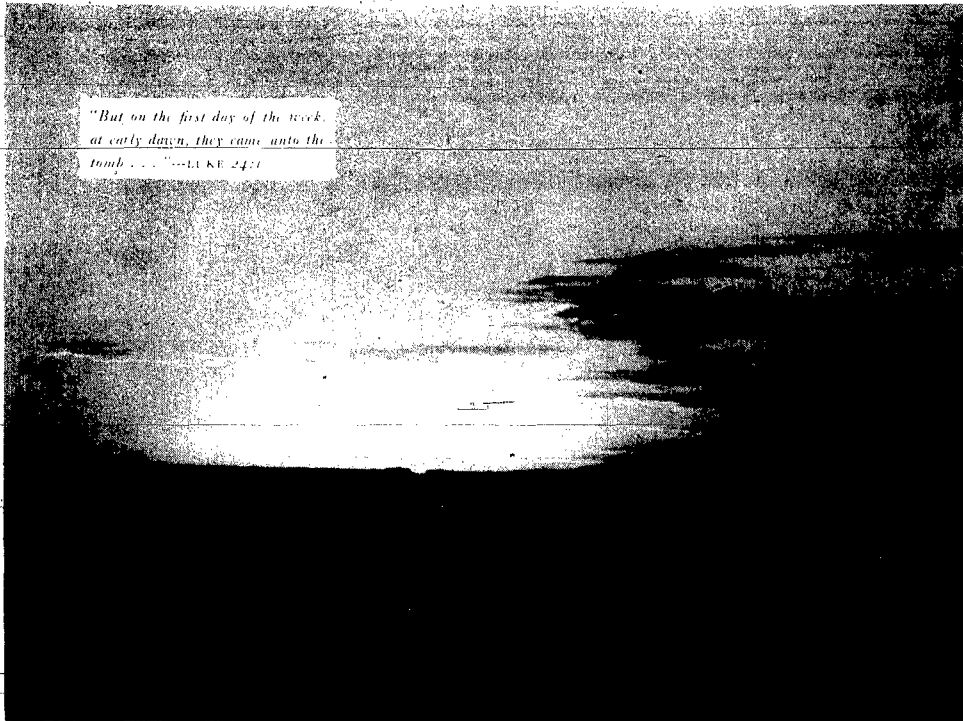


"But on the first day of the week at early dawn, they came unto the tomb . . ." — LUKE 24:1

Easter has meaning in this year of 1960 in three directions. Obviously, the historical event of Easter should be retold and commemorated.

The disciples, who were convinced Christ was the Messiah and thought the world too would in time recognize this, felt themselves fooled and misled when the crucifixion brought to an end their dreams.

Easter also has significance for our day. The Christian faith stands solidly upon the reality of Jesus' resurrection.

Here is the fountain of hope we need in our day. When evil and corruption, at home and abroad, cause one to almost teeter on the brink

of despair, the Easter message rings out, assuring us of the ultimate triumph of that which is good, strengthening us to hold on a little longer.

Those whose consciences speak loudly in the quiet hours of the long night, confronting them with missed opportunities for service, words said in anger, selfishness, mistakes, sins against their fellow man and God, need not grieve hopelessly for peace of mind.

Easter not only speaks of events happening long ago, but also provides inspiration for the present by its emphasis upon the quality of life here and now.

Christ was not held in the grip of death because of a quality of His life — He took His life from God in humility, and lived it in faith. Christ's life and resurrection makes crystal clear that what is God's cannot be taken from Him by death — that our cannot escape from God, even in death.

Therefore, at this commemoration of the resurrection of Our Lord, let us earnestly strive to daily live our resurrection faith. Christ died to enable us, by His dwelling Spirit, to form a new fellowship of Christian brotherhood dedicated to the service of our fellowman and to the glory of God. His death and resurrection can free us from the fear of death.

Christ the Lord is risen today, Alleluia!

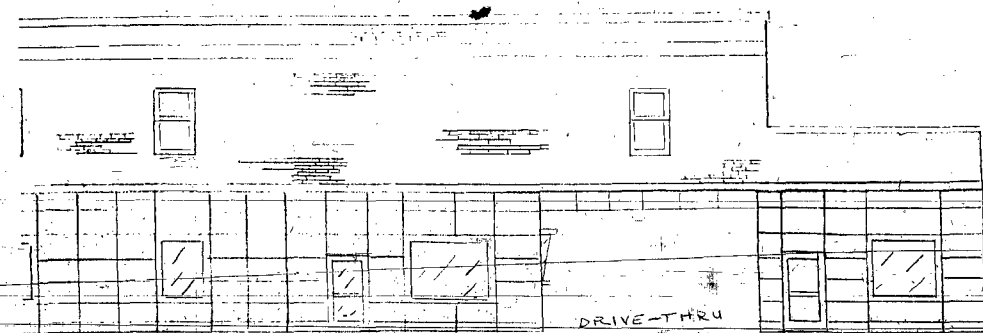
Rural Homemakers to Hold District Meeting Wednesday

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Candidate Honored at Reception

Wayne's city council Tuesday night accepted bids totalling about \$15,500 for a new fire truck.

The council's acceptance followed recommendations of the local Volunteer Fire department. The accepted bids are about \$730 over the lowest combination received at the letting Mar. 29.

The Fire department said the second low bid was preferred because they feel Luerne equipment is superior and better service facilities are available. They also pointed out that Luerne equipment is on the present truck and would be familiar to the firemen using the new truck.

The council also accepted the bid of Coryell Auto Co. for a new police car. The bid for a 1960 V-8 4-door Chevrolet was \$815.53 plus an additional \$30 for a non-slip differential.

Other bidders included: Wortman Auto Co., Wisner, 1960 Dodge, \$899.50; Seyler Motors, 1960 Ford, \$1,160; and Herb's Buick, 1960 Rebel, \$1,198.90. All bids included trade-in of the present police car.

In other action the council approved renewal of a bingo license for St. Mary's church and approved Ivan Creighton and Paul Koplin as members of the Fire department.

A new agreement with the Wayne Country club for operation and maintenance of the municipal golf course was discussed and tabled for further study. Also tabled for additional study were plans for a kitchen addition on the north side of the city auditorium.

The council tentatively approved a plat of the Cecil Wriedt subdivision which included nine lots in a tract located between Seventh and Ninth streets between Walnut street and Pine Heights addition. Formal acceptance will probably be made at the Apr. 26 meeting.

An ordinance was passed establishing one-way traffic going west in the half-block of alley east of Main between First and Second streets.

Two permits were granted for fire zone construction. They were to the State National bank for a \$25,000 remodeling project and construction of a drive-in banking window, and to Wayne Grain and Feed for a \$6,900 feed mill on East Second street between Logan and Nebraska.

Other permits issued by City Clerk Howard Witt included: Louis Meyer, \$15,000 residence, Lot-17, Pine Heights addition.

Richard Carlson, \$15,000 remodeling for multiple dwelling, 922 Walnut street.

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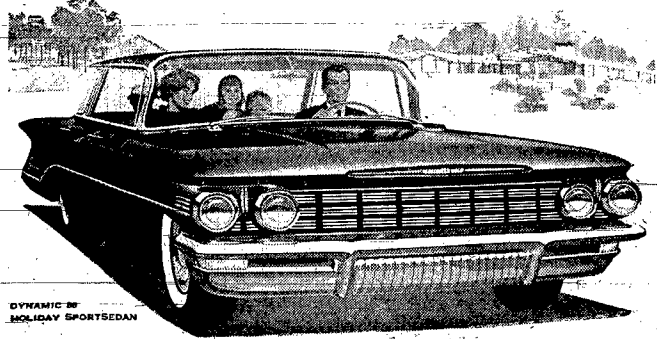
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WSTC Trackmen Are Second At South Dakota Invitational

WSTC trackmen showed surprising depth of talent Saturday to gain second place in the South Dakota University invitational track meet at Vermillion.

The Wildcats did this without winning a single first. Six second places and five third places and a scattering of fourth and fifth place wins gave Wayne 42 1/2 points for its best showing at this meet in several years. In 1959 they placed fourth.

The South Dakotans won with 59 1/2. Hastings, last year's runner-up, came in third with 35 1/2. Omaha University was fourth with 29 1/2 in the 12-school field.

As expected, Wayne scored best in the distance runs. Don Weitzenkamp and John Kruse came in second and third, respectively, in both the mile and two-mile. Harley Gesirich and Bob Gemmill were second and third in the 800.

Chilly temperatures which hovered around the 40-degree mark handicapped performances and only one record fell in the college division. Nyal Brings, SDU's distance flash, won the mile in 4:28.7, erasing the old mark of 4:28.7 set by Wayne's Merle McGee, three years ago. Weitzenkamp clocked the unofficial 4:34 for second place. He finished the two-mile in 10:18.

In the 440, Joe Green and Dick Chochon placed third and fifth, respectively, for Wayne. Fred Fetrow finished fifth in the 100 yard dash.

Phil Hammitt, Gregg Nelson, Gesirich and Green placed second in the mile relay. The Wildcats also ran fifth in the 880 relay.

In field events Keith Towns heaved the javelin a commendable 170'6" — just 7 1/2 inches under the winning throw.

Elden Hobza vaulted 11'10" for second place, two inches below the winning jump. Larry McHenry

shared a four-way tie for fourth place.

Rod Elkins figured in an eight-way tie for third place in the high jump contest. Winning mark in that competition was 6 feet.

Fourteen of the 19 Wildcats earned points, an indication of balance that pleased Coach Carl Ellermeier. The squad placed in eight of the 16 events, missing in the 220, hurdles, shot, discus and broad jump.

Wayne entered the Midland Relays at Fremont Wednesday and will go to Kearney Saturday for the All-Nebraska relays.

Wayne High Eighth At Midland Relays

Witt also placed fifth in the 100 which was run in a record 10.5. Fischer garnered all of Wakefield's points as he finished fifth in both the high and low hurdles.

Capitol News

State Senators Give Preliminary Report On Controversial Brand Inspection Area

Lincoln—A committee of state senators studying a controversial subject — the cattle brand area — has come up with an initial report.

The committee, headed by Sen. J. W. Burbach, Crofton, probably will not recommend a change in the brand area. Cattle moved out of the area must be state inspected. The committee's report is the first completed of 16 similar committees studying other state problems.

Reports will be submitted to the Legislative Council in November at which time content of them will be made public. Other committees still are conducting hearings or in the process of making recommendations. Council recommendations carry considerable weight in the following session of the Legislature.

Big Summer Job
If you think you have troubles trying to put your front yard in shape to get a stand of grass, consider Manuel Kahler. He has a 10-acre plot, plus the grounds of the governor's mansion to look after.

It is not an easy job. Besides the lawn which requires cutting, weeding and fertilizing just like any home owner's front yard, there are many bushes and trees that need care.

Crews from the state penitentiary help when the weeds start getting away from Kahler. However, the general groundskeeper's assessment of when weeds are a menace would vary considerably from the average householder who begins to worry when about a third of the lawn is producing a good crop of dandelions.

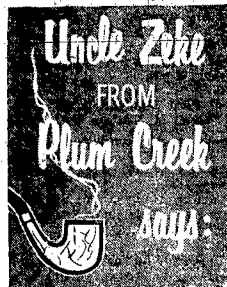
Road Damage
Floods caused an estimated half million dollars damage to eastern Nebraska state highways. Acting State Engineer John Hossack estimates it probably will take about two years to eliminate the flood damage.

Biggest single item will be a bridge over the Niobrara river near Niobrara, estimated to cost around \$400,000. John McMeekin, state maintenance engineer, figures it will cost about \$100,000 to repave, mark, flag and make temporary repairs to grades, surfaces and bridge approaches, just to get traffic moving again.

On Guard
Operation On Guard, Nebraska's flood preparation activity, was in effect 17 days in the statehouse. During that time, officials report, an estimated 3,200 man hours went into the operation. Workers consumed more than 900 cups of coffee.

About 20 officers and men man the office in shifts of up to 25 consecutive hours. The operation began in the rotunda of the Capitol on the second floor, then shifted to the civil defense headquarters on the ground level after heavy flood activity.

Refunds
Farmers got \$695,136 in refunds in March of taxes they paid on gasoline used in agriculture, the State Treasurer's office says. Staff members reported this was one of the largest monthly refund totals ever recorded by the office. It was authorized that the reason for this was that farmers were handicapped with work by the long winter and took time out

Secretary of State Frank Marsh says there still are some important election deadlines before the May 10 primary election.

Marsh added that Apr. 30 is the first day-county clerks will receive applications and deliver disabled voters ballots. It is also the first day for publishing the sample ballot.

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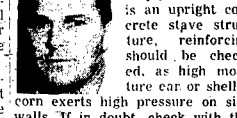
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County Agent's Column

WET CORN PROBLEM
Many Nebraska farmers are facing the problem of what to do with wet corn. Moisture content of ear corn must be down to 18 percent by Apr. 30 to qualify for government loan. Shelled corn must have a moisture content of not more than 14 percent regardless of the time of year.

HIGH MOISTURE GAIN?
This has real possibilities for the livestock man if the silo is nearly empty. If the silo is an upright concrete structure, reinforcing should be checked, as high moisture ear or shelled corn exerts high pressure on side walls. If in doubt, check with the silo manufacturer. A pit silo can also be used.



WHAT MOISTURE FOR SILO STORAGE?
Shelled corn should have 25 to 30 percent moisture for good results. If below this level, add moisture at the blower or elevator as feed is put into the silo. For shelled corn with 20 percent moisture, add 100 gallons of water for every 100 bushels to bring moisture up to 26 percent. It is easier to add water to ground corn. Both ear and shelled corn keep much better when ground.

AIRTIGHT STORAGE?
Yes several metal silos on the market are designed for this purpose. But your upright silo, if in good condition, or a pit silo, can be pressed into use. Air leaks on the side walls of an upright silo may cause localized spoilage around the edges.

REDUCE SPOILAGE?
Spoilage around doors can be reduced by using plastic polyethylene sheets over the door opening and extending about one foot beyond. After filling the silo, seal top of corn with black plastic film down and against side of silo walls. Stay off top of corn until ready to start feeding.

HOW FAST TO FEED?
Most reports show that three to four inches need to be removed every day during the summer to prevent spoilage. Removal of only one inch per day during warm

months has not been satisfactory. Mechanical silo unloaders will reduce labor requirements imposed in digging corn out by hand.

NEW CIRCULAR AVAILABLE
A new circular on "Recommended Crop Varieties for Nebraska in 1960" has just been released by the University of Nebraska Agricultural Extension Service.

The circular includes recommended varieties of small grains, sorghums, soybeans, grasses, legumes and corn for the eight cropping districts of Nebraska. Copies of the circular, CC 178, may be obtained at county Extension offices in Nebraska.

Farm News and Views

DRYLOT DAIRYING may become an established practice in areas where cows are normally pastured, say farm experts. Major advantages are greater production from a given acreage of farmland, perhaps slightly higher production per cow and more complete utilization of expensive fixed facilities. Major disadvantages are mature disposal and labor required to either cut fresh forage each day during summer months, or distribute forage from storage to the cows. It appears likely that compared to pasturing, as much as 30 percent more milk can be produced per acre of forage if it is fed to cows from storage.

FARM RESEAL program may be in for changes. It appears very likely that USDA will follow through and reduce payments to elevators by nearly 20 percent for storage and handling of CGC grain. This could be followed by some adjustment in the rates paid farmers for storing CCC grain an extra year or more on the farm. However, costs of storing grain on the farm are normally somewhat greater than in large specialized grain storage facilities. Also, there is no significant amount of ear corn stored in commercial facilities. This makes up a considerable portion of the grain now resealed on the farm.

EARLY LAMB prices may hold up a little longer this spring because of slow range development in the Southwest. Earlier, some experts felt this area would produce more fat lambs than usual for early spring markets, but late winter snow and cold set pastures back considerably. In spite of this, it looks like lamb prices will begin to weaken shortly after the end of this month.
