Union Picketing Halts Work On New WSTC Dormitory

Picketing by the Ironworkers Union has halted work by all skilled crafts on the new dormitory project under construction on the Wayne College campus. The work, under contract to the Chris Hansen Construction Co., Sioux City, remained at a standstill Wednesday.

WSTC President W. A. Brandenburg said Wednesday morning however that if there is a settlement within the next few days and work is resumed it is possible to have all or part of the facility ready for occupancy next fall.

Dr. Freeman B. Decker, President of the State Normal Board had previously expressed "vital concern" about construction slow-downs on dormitory projects at Nebraska Teachers Colleges.

Work on a similar job at Peru State Teachers College was resumed after a stoppage due to a jurisdiction dispute between unions.

Decker also noted that the buildings are financed with revenue bonds on which payment must begin with money from rental fees starting next fall. "If the dormitories aren't finished on time, youngsters are going to be kept from going to college," Decker said.

Contracts call for the project to be completed by Sept. 1.

May 2 Deadline For Reports In Wool Incentive Program

Wayne County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell this week urged wool growers who sold wool of lambs during the 1959 marketing year which ended Mar. 31 to file their application for payment as soon as possible.

Information on applications is needed for use in computing the average price received by growers. This must be done before payment rates for shorn wool and unshorn lambs can be determined. Final date for filing application is May 2.

Under the wool program, payments are made to growers as an incentive to increase wool production. The payment rate is the percentage necessary to bring the national average price received by growers up to the incentive level of 62 cents per pound. Under the percentage system, the grower who receives the highest price for wool also receives the largest payment.

Wildcats, Dana Meet Friday To Open Conference Season

Wayne State's Wildcats will open their conference baseball season Friday against Dana with a double-header starting at 6 p.m. The Wayne ball park is ready, barring rain.

Another twin bill is scheduled here Tuesday night, also at 6, against Nebraska Wesleyan. This is a postponement of an earlier meeting that was snowed out.

The Wildcats lost a pair Friday at Laurel in a non-conference match with St. Cloud State. They led briefly in both games, but each time St. Cloud's slugging erased the Wayne lead.

The visiting Huskies poled four homers in the opener, two in the second. Catcher Dave Lesar swatted round-trippers twice in the first game, each time with one man on. And in the nightcap he hit a grand slam after a Wayne error filled the bases with two out.

St. Cloud tallied three times in the first, then Wayne scored twice on Ron Haver's homer. Two more runs in the third gave the Wildcats a lead that held until a pair of Wayne errors in the fifth helped St. Cloud to a 6-4 lead. The Huskies added two in the sixth before pitcher Jerry Wisnieski was relieved with two out. Lowell Zimmerman took the mound to face St. Cloud's Lesar, who already had hit two homers, but this time Lesar grounded out. Zimmerman retired the Huskies in order in the final inning.

Wayne scored twice in the sixth, but went down naplessly in the seventh. Wisnieski was charged with the loss, giving up seven hits. The Wildcats hit nine times off winner John Kilkelly.

Wayne started the second game with a six-run first inning on only one hit. The Huskie hurler walked six, hit one batter and threw a wild pitch with the bases loaded. One runner scored, then two throwing errors to the plate allowed two more runs.

Wayne scored three more times before the first out. However, the Wildcats managed only one more hit throughout the game.

St. Cloud tallied seven runs in the second. Both teams were charged with eight errors in the two games; Gary Zimmerman lasted the full seven innings and yielded
